By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

ADDRESSES.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the addresses or Petitions, with the names of the persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who shall read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, now met in General Assembly, have received with all loyal respect your Majesty's most gracious letter.

Assembled, in accordance with ancient usage, to take counsel regarding the affairs of our Church, we rejoice to know that our meeting has the sincere and cordial approbation of your Majesty, and we receive with peculiar pleasure the renewed assurance of the affectionate regard which your Majesty bears towards the Established Church of Scotland.

In entering upon the important duties entrusted to us, we are encouraged by the experience of your Majesty's unreserved confidence, and we humbly trust that, by the grace of God strengthening us, the zeal, prudence, and loyalty which have marked former Assemblies, may be so evinced in our present meeting, as to commend its proceedings also to your Royal approval.

It is our earnest desire and prayer that our deliberations may be guided by the spirit of wisdom and charity, so that they may tend, by the blessing of God, to the advancement of His glory and to the promotion of the best interests of the people committed to our charge.

We recognise a pledge of your Majesty's affectionate regard to the Church of Scotland, in the appointment of Lord Belhaven as your Majesty's High Commissioner, whose ability, courtesy, and tried attachment to our National Church have, in former years, received frequent acknowledgement at our hands.

We accept with heartfelt gratitude the gift of Two thousand pounds which your Majesty has been again pleased to place at our disposal for the reformation of the Highlands and Islands; and we

shall give our best endeavours to apply it faithfully in accordance with your Majesty's desire.

That the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the King of Kings, and Lord of Lords, in whose favour is life, may plentifully enrich your Majesty with the bounties of His providence, and with the especial gifts of His grace, that he may enable your Majesty to reign long and prosperously over a free, loyal, and devoted people, and that He may hereafter bestow upon your Majesty a crown of unfading glory in the Heavens, is the sincere prayer of,

Metropolitan Board of Works.

The whole of the lands, roads, streams, and places through or across which the said sewer and works will pass, are situate, respectively, in the counties of Essex and Kent, and in the several parishes of West Ham, East Ham, Barking, and Woolwich.

In connection with the culverts and works above described, the said Board will erect a pumping station, comprising steam engines, pumps, and other machinery, and all necessary buildings and works appertaining thereto, in and upon lands situate in the parish of West Ham, and in the county of Essex, in the occupation of Mr. John Honck, and near to Abbey Mills, in the said parish and county.

In connection with the same works, the said Board will also construct a covered reservoir in and upon lands situate in the parishes of Woolwich and Barking respectively, and in the respective counties of Kent and Essex, adjacent to Barking-creek and the river Thames, and in the occupation of Mr. — Offin.
