By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

ADDRESSES.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the addresses or Petitions, with the names of the persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who shall read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

The Queen has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal, appointing John Lewis Ricardo Esq. ; George Hay, Esq. (commonly called Earl of Gifford) ; Sir Henry Pollard Willoughby, Bart. ; Robert Spencer Robinson, Esq. ; Captain in Her Majesty's Navy ; and Robert Dalglish, Esq. ; to be Her Majesty's Commissioners to enquire into the system of control and management of Her Majesty's Dockyards, the purchase of materials and stores, the cost of building and repairing, altering, fitting, and refitting the ships of Her Majesty's Navy, and the best mode of keeping the accounts thereof ; and also to enquire into the expenditure of former years connected with the above subjects (not however including any period prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight), in order to ascertain whether the system of ship building in Her Majesty's Dockyards has been efficient, and whether the expenditure on the alterations of the ships of Her Majesty's Navy, either in converting them from Sailing to Steam ships, or on other alterations during the progress of their construction, has been judiciously applied.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, reporting that the French Government have agreed to permit, subject to the following conditions, the temporary importation, free of duty, at the three ports of Boulogne, Calais and Havre, of samples of British produce and manufacture transmitted to Paris, in connection with the enquiries now pending for assessing the new French Tariff, in pursuance of the provisions of the recent Treaty of Commerce between Great Britain and France :

- 1st. Custom-house marks or stamps will be affixed to the samples to prove their identity, in all cases where such marks can be applied.
- 2nd. A bond will be required in each instance undertaking that the goods shall either be re-exported within a fixed period, or pay the present rates of import duty, in the case of their being legally importable, or 30 per cent., ad valorem, if the importation be prohibited.
- 3rd. Any samples having no commercial value, can be entered free of duty and without formality, in accordance with the usual regulations.

FALMOUTH HARBOUR.

By the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

RULES, Orders, and Regulations for the preservation of Her Majesty's moorings, and for the

mooring, anchoring, and placing of all private ships of war, transports, and all other private and merchant ships and vessels, lighters, barges, boats, and other craft, whatsoever, in Falmouth Harbour, made and established pursuant to the Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, cap. 159, intituled "An Act for the better regulation of the several ports, harbours, roadsteads, sounds, channels, bays, and navigable rivers in the United Kingdom, and of His Majesty's docks, dock yards, arsenals, wharfs, moorings, and stores therein, and for repealing several Acts passed for that purpose."

ARTICLE 1. Every pilot bringing a ship or vessel into Falmouth Harbour is to berth her in such a position as will allow a clear passage for vessels entering or leaving the harbour.

The master or other person in charge of the ship or vessel (if without a pilot), will be held responsible for the observance of this regulation.

2. The deepest water is to be reserved for large vessels and vessels of heavy draught.

3. No vessel is to be anchored within one cable and a half's length of the bridles of Her Majesty's moorings in the cross roads. — The ground chains of these moorings are lying N.N.W. and S.S.E., and no vessel is to anchor within one cable's length of Her Majesty's naval establishment at Milor.

4. No vessel is to be anchored between the Fairway buoys.

5. No vessel, lighter, barge, or boat is to be moored in such a position as will interfere with the free access to any dock, wharf, or quay.

6. No vessel is to be laid up between Trefusis Point and the Green Bank Quay.

7. In order to keep the passage open for the ferry boat, no vessel is to anchor within one hundred yards north or south of a line drawn from the ferry landing place at the Green Bank to the ferry landing place at Flushing.

8. No ballast is on any account to be thrown overboard in any part of the harbour.
