(No. 15.) ATLANTIC OCEAN-WEST COAST OF Spain.

Fixed Light at Corcubion.

THE Minister of Marine at Madrid has given notice, that on and after the 31st day of July next, a light will be exhibited on Cape Cé, which forms the western point of entrance of the Ria de Corcubion, in the Province of Coruña, on the West Coast of Spain.

The light is a *fixed red* light, placed at an elevation of 82 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible from the deck of a ship in clear weather at a distance of 8 miles.

The light apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the fifth order.

The tower is octagonal, of granite, 25 feet above the ground, and adjoins the back of the keeper's dwelling, which is painted white. The lantern also is white. The building stands 36 yards from the extremity of the Cape, in lat. 42° 54' 50" N., long. 9° 10' 6" West of Greenwich.

Fixed Light on Cape Cala Figuera.

Also, that on the same day a *fixed white* light, placed at a height of 116 feet above the mean level of the sea, and visible 12 miles, will be exhibited from Cape Cala Figuera, which forms the western point of entrance of Palma Bay, on the south-west coast of Mallorca or Majorca, in the Baleares Isles.

The light apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fith order, and the light illuminates an arc of 295^o seaward.

The tower is circular, 45 feet high, and painted light yellow; the lantern is octagonal, and white. It rises from the middle of the keeper's dwelling, and which is square, and of the same colour as the tower, with green persianas or shutters. The building stands at 108 yards from the extremity of the Cape, in lat. 39° 27' 42" N., long. 2° 33 54" East of Greenwich.

Extension of Almeria Mole.

The Captain of the Port of Almeria, on the south coast of Spain, reports, on the 14th May, that the mole in course of construction at that port has been extended during the past year 100 yards in a direction S. 33° E. (true), having at its outer end a depth of 35 feet of water.

It appears, therefore, that this new mole, situated 634 yards to the westward of the Torre del Tiro, advances into the sea in the mean direction of S. 18° E. (true) to an extent of 598 yards.
