The Ladies to wear black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuffs, with black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black Coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Monday the 10th of September next, the Court to go out of Mourning.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

BOROUGH OF BRIGHTON, SUSSEX.

WHEREAS the Local Government Act, 1858, was adopted by the borough of Brighton, in the county of Sussex, on the 19th day of March, 1860, and notice of such adoption has been duly given in writing to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, as required by such Act; and whereas it has now been duly certified to me, that a copy of such notice has been advertised for three successive weeks in the Brighton Guardian, that being one of the Local Newspapers published and circulated in the aforesaid borough, and that copies of such notice have also been affixed to the principal doors of each church and chapel, in such borough, to which notices are usually affixed; and whereas, within the period of twenty-one days fixed by the said Act for appeal against the resolution for the adoption of the said Act, by such borough, an appeal has been duly presented, under section seventeen of the Local Government Act, 1858, signed by owners and ratepayers of the said borough, appealing against the resolution by which the aforesaid Act was adopted within such borough. And whereas I have directed inquiry to be made in the said borough, into the subject matter of such appeal, and such inquiry, after due notice, as required by the Act, has been duly held in such borough, by Henry Austin, Esq., the Inspector appointed for that purpose, and he has made his report thereon to me:

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, having taken the aforesaid appeal and report into consideration, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the Local Government Act, 1858, make order with respect to the matter in question, on such appeal, as follows:

That the aforesaid appeal be dismissed, and that the Local Government Act, 1858, shall, from and after the 3rd day of September, 1860, have the force of law within the aforesaid borough of Brighton, in the county of Sussex, upon the condition that the Town Council of the said borough will, with all convenient speed after such last mentioned date, apply for a Provisional Order, so far modifying their borrowing powers, under the Local Acts now in force within such borough, as to submit the exercise of those powers to the sanction of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in the same manner as borrowing

powers are exercised under the Local Government Act, 1858.
