The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Tuesday, August, 28, 1860.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

WE are commanded by Her Majesty to release you from further attendance in Parliament, and at the same time to convey to you Her Majesty's acknowledgments for the zeal and assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the performance of your important duties during the long and laborious session of Parliament now about to close.

Her Majesty commands us to inform you, that Her relations with Foreign Powers are friendly and satisfactory, and Her Majesty trusts that there is no danger of any interruption of the general Peace of Europe. Events of considerable importance are indeed taking place in Italy; but if no foreign powers interfere therein, and if the Italians are left to settle their own affairs, the tranquillity of other States will remain undisturbed.

The proposed Conferences on the subject of the cession of Savoy and of Nice to France have not yet been held; but Her Majesty confidently trusts that in any negotiations which may take place full and adequate arrangements will be made for securing, in accordance with the spirit and letter of the Treaty of Vienna of 1815, the neutrality and independence of the Swiss Confederation.

That neutrality and independence were an object to which all the powers who were parties to the Treaties of Vienna attached great importance; and they are no less important now than then, for the general interests of Europe.

Her Majesty commands us to assure you, that the atrocities which have been committed upon the Christian population in Syria have inspired Her Majesty with the deepest grief and indignation. Her Majesty has cheerfully concurred with the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of the French, the Prince Regent of Prussia, and the Emperor of Russia in entering into an engagement with the Sultan, by which temporary military assistance has been afforded to the Sultan for the purpose of re-establishing order in that part of His dominions.

We are commanded by Her Majesty to inform you, that Her Majesty greatly regrets that the pacific overtures which, by Her Majesty's directions, Her Envoy in China made to the Imperial Government at Peking, did not lead to any satisfactory result; and it has therefore been necessary

that the combined naval and military forces which Her Majesty and Her Ally the Emperor of the French had sent to the China Seas should advance towards the northern provinces of China, for the purpose of supporting the just demands of the Allied Powers.

Her Majesty, desirous of giving all possible weight to Her diplomatic action in this matter, has sent to China, as special Ambassador for this service, the Earl of Elgin, who negotiated the Treaty of Tien-sing, the full and faithful execution of which is demanded from the Emperor of China.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

Her Majesty commands us to convey to you Her warm acknowledgments for the liberal supplies which you have granted for the service of the present year, and for the provision which you have made for the defences which are essential for the security of Her dockyards and arsenals.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Her Majesty commands us to express to you the gratification and pride with which she has witnessed the rapid progress in military efficiency which Her Volunteer Forces have already made, and which is highly honourable to their spirit and patriotism.

Her Majesty has given her cordial assent to the Act for amalgamating Her Local European Force in India with Her Forces engaged for general service.

Her Majesty trusts that the additional freedom which you have given to commerce will lead to fresh development of productive industry.

Her Majesty has given Her ready assent to several measures of great public usefulness.

The Acts for regulating the relations between landlord and tenant in Ireland will, Her Majesty trusts, remove some fertile causes of disagreement.

The Act for amending the law which regulates the discipline of Her Majesty's Navy has established salutary rules for the administration of justice by courts-martial, and for maintaining good order in the naval service.

The Act bearing upon endowed charities will give means for a less expensive administration of the property of charities, and for the speedy and economical settlement of disputes affecting such property, while by another Act relief has been afforded to Her Majesty's Roman Catholic subjects with regard to their charitable endowments.

Several other Acts have been passed for legal reform, which must lead to the more satisfactory administration of justice.

Her Majesty has observed with deep satisfaction the spirit of loyalty, of order, and of obedience to the law, which prevails among her subjects both in the United Kingdom and in her dominions beyond sea; and Her Majesty has witnessed with heartfelt pleasure the warm and affectionate reception given to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales by Her North American subjects.

You will on returning to your several counties have duties to perform scarcely less important than those which have occupied you during the session of Parliament; and Her Majesty fervently prays that the blessing of Almighty God may attend your efforts, and guide them to the attainment of the objects of Her constant solicitude, the welfare and the happiness of Her people.

Then a Commission for proroguing the Parliament was read; after which the Lord Chancellor said,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

By virtue of Her Majesty's Commission, under the Great Seal, to us and other Lords directed, and now read, we do, in Her Majesty's name, and in obedience to Her commands, prorogue this Parliament to Tuesday the sixth day of November next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the sixth day of November next.

[The following Order in Council is substituted for that which was published in the Gazette of Tuesday the 28th August instant.]

AT the Court at *Balmoral*, the 27th day of *August*, 1860.

PRESENT,

The **QUEEN'S** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, sections one and two, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of certain benefices between your Majesty and the Bishop of Ripon.

"Whereas your Majesty is seized in fee, in right of the Crown, of the patronage of the several benefices specified in the two parts of the schedule hereto annexed, marked A.

"And whereas the several benefices so specified in the first part of the said schedule marked A, exceed respectively the value of twenty pounds in the King's Book, and the several benefices so specified in the second part of the said schedule marked A, do not respectively exceed the value of twenty pounds in the King's Book.

"And whereas the Bishop of Ripon is seized in fee, in right of his see, of the patronage of the

several benefices specified in the two parts of the schedule hereto annexed, marked B.

"And whereas the Right Honourable Henry John, Viscount Palmerston, the First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable John, Baron Campbell, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, have signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said several benefices may be exchanged as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange, and the relative values of the said benefices and patronage; and we do hereby certify to your Majesty, that after making all proper deductions and allowances, the value of the benefices, specified in the first part of the said schedule marked A, and of the patronage thereof, is equivalent, as nearly as may be, to the value of the benefices specified in the first part of the said schedule marked B, and of the patronage thereof; and that the value of the benefices specified in the second part of the said schedule marked A, and of the patronage thereof, is equivalent, as nearly as may be, to the value of the benefices specified in the second part of the said schedule marked B, and of the patronage thereof; and that the particulars of such benefices are as set forth in such schedules.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Henry John, Viscount Palmerston, First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as patron in right of the Crown of the several benefices set forth in the first part of the said schedule marked A, and with the consent of the said John, Baron Campbell, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as patron in right of the Crown of the several benefices set forth in the second part of the said schedule marked A, and of the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon, as patron in right of his see of the several benefices set forth in the two parts of the said schedule marked B, in testimony whereof the said Henry John, Viscount Palmerston, and the said John, Baron Campbell, have respectively signed, and the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon, hath signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any assurance or conveyance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the patronage of, or right of nomination to, the said several benefices specified in the said first part of the schedule hereto annexed, and marked A, shall be assigned and transferred from your Majesty and your successors and shall become and be vested in, and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon and his successors in the said see for ever, and that in exchange for the same the patronage of or right of nomination to the benefices specified in the first part of the said schedule hereto annexed, marked B, shall be assigned and transferred from the said bishop and his successors, and shall in like manner become and be vested in, and may from time to time be exercised by, your Majesty and your successors for ever; and that the patronage of, or right of nomination to, the said several benefices specified in the said second part of the schedule hereto annexed, marked A, shall be assigned and transferred from your Majesty and your successors and shall become and be vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon and his successors in

the said see for ever, and that in exchange for the same, the patronage of, or right of nomination to, the said several benefices specified in the second part of the said schedule hereto annexed, marked B, shall in like manner be assigned and transferred from the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon, and his successors, and shall become and be vested in, and shall and may from time

to time be exercised by, your Majesty and your successors for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas by the third section of the above-recited Act it is enacted that "the word 'person' shall include any corporation, and the master, provost, warden, or head of any college or collegiate establishment, and the master, guardian, or head of any hospital, and the governing body respectively entitled in his or their corporate capacity to any such patronage, and shall also extend to and include the Queen's Majesty, as well in respect of patronage vested or to be vested in or exercised by Her Majesty in right of the Crown, as in right of the Duchy of Lancaster or of the Duchy of Cornwall; and in every case of exchange in right of the Crown, where the benefice is above the yearly value of twenty pounds in the Queen's Books, the assent of Her Majesty shall be testified by the signature of the Lord High Treasurer or First Commissioner of the Treasury for the time being, and when such yearly value shall be twenty pounds or under such assent shall be testified by the signature of the Lord High Chancellor, and the assent of Her Majesty, when the patronage is in respect of the Duchy of Lancaster, shall be testified by the signature of the Chancellor of the Duchy; and when the patronage is in respect of the Duchy of Cornwall, such assent shall be testified by two or more of the principal officers of the said Duchy, to be appointed in manner provided for appointment of officers to grant leases under the provisions of an Act passed in the session held in the first and second years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter five, which assent they are hereby authorized and empowered to give; and in every case of exchange in right of the Duchy of Cornwall, when there is a Duke of Cornwall, the assent of the said Duke shall be testified in writing under the privy seal of the said Duke first had and obtained for that purpose."

And whereas the assent of Her Majesty to the above exchange hath been duly testified by the signatures of the First Commissioner of the Treasury for the time being, and of the Lord High Chancellor, respectively, to the said scheme, as on reference thereto appears.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the several dioceses of York, Durham, and Ripon.

An Act to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Fund and the surplus of ways and means to the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this session of Parliament.

An Act for raising the sum of two million pounds by Exchequer Bonds or Exchequer Bills for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on wine licenses and refreshment houses, and for regulating the licensing of refreshment houses and the granting of wine licences in Ireland.

An Act for defraying the expences of constructing fortifications for the protection of the Royal Arsenal and Dockyards and the ports of Dover and Portland, and of creating a central arsenal.

An Act to consolidate the duties of customs.

An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties of stamps, and to amend the laws relating to the stamp duties.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Manila, enclosing a copy of the regulations established by the French authorities for the port of Saigon, in Cochin China. By the above regulations all vessels anchoring at Saigon, will be required to pay, within eight days after their arrival, anchorage dues at the rate of two piastres per ton, the measurement for sailing vessels being fixed in accordance with the ordinance of the 18th November, 1837, and for steam vessels by that of the 18th August, 1839; the anchorage due will cover all customs duties, whether of importation or of exportation, as regards every kind of merchandize, except opium, upon which an import duty of 20 per cent. *ad val.* will be levied.

Any person throwing ballast overboard in the port, will be liable to a penalty of 50 piastres. The captain of the port will indicate places where ballast may be deposited.

Should any death occur on board a vessel anchored in the port, the master of the vessel is required to give immediate notice of the occurrence to the captain of the port, and to act in conformity with the rules established in respect of such matter.

Any master of a vessel quitting the place of anchorage assigned by the captain of the port will be liable to a penalty of 10 piastres.

If a vessel should require repairing, fumigating, or caulking, the master is required to inform the captain of the port, who will prescribe the regulations necessary to prevent accidents. Every infraction of this rule will entail a penalty of 50 piastres.

No merchant vessel will be allowed to anchor or moor below the south fort.

No vessel will be permitted to quit the port of Saigon without the authority of the captain of the port, to whom masters of vessels are required to exhibit their bills of lading and a list of passengers, signed by the director of the affairs of Cochin China, as also the receipt of the officer charged with the collection of the anchorage due.

The pass of the captain of the port is to be signed by the captain of the guard-ship of St. Jacques.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to them in and by the said two before mentioned Acts, by a certain Warrant in writing duly made, and bearing date at Whitehall, Treasury Chambers, the 21st day of July, 1857, did order, direct, and declare (amongst other things), that all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, therein mentioned and described, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the Colonial Legislatures, might be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the several places mentioned and set forth in the Schedule A, to the said now reciting Warrant annexed, and all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the Colonial Legislatures, might be transmitted by the post, between the several Colonies and places mentioned and set forth in the Schedule B, to the said now reciting Warrant annexed, and that all such respective packets should be so transmitted respectively, in conformity with and under, and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions, thereinafter respectively mentioned and contained, and that the single rate of postage for the transmission thereof respectively, should be that which was mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively, in the said Schedules A and B, and that all such respective packets so transmitted, should be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage therein-after mentioned.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in further exercise of the powers reserved to them, in and by the said several before recited Acts of Parliament, by two other Warrants in writing duly made, and bearing date respectively at Whitehall, Treasury-chambers, one of the said two last-mentioned Warrants the 19th day of June, 1858, and the other of the said two last-mentioned Warrants the 1st day of July,

1859, and respectively reciting (amongst other Warrants), the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, did make and declare certain other regulations, orders, directions, and conditions therein mentioned, respecting certain of the said packets, in and by the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, authorised to be transmitted by the post as aforesaid.

And whereas it is expedient to authorise the transmission by the post of packets of a like kind between any part of the United Kingdom and the island of Saint Thomas and other Danish colonies in the West Indies, and also between the said island of Saint Thomas and the other Danish colonies in the West Indies, and the British colonies in the West Indies, and to fix certain rates of postage at which such packets may be so transmitted, in the manner hereinafter mentioned and contained.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said two hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners (by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. All packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or the Colonial Legislatures, may be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and the island of Saint Thomas and the other Danish colonies in the West Indies, and also between the said island of Saint Thomas and the other Danish colonies in the West Indies and the British colonies in the West Indies (without passing through the United Kingdom), the sea conveyance being by British packet-boat, and on every such packet so transmitted under the provisions of this Warrant as aforesaid, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, an uniform single rate of postage of three pence; and on every such packet so transmitted under the provisions of this Warrant as aforesaid, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the progressive and additional rates of postage, and according to the scale of weight mentioned and contained in, and directed to be charged, taken, and paid on and in respect of the several packets exceeding four ounces in weight, authorised to be transmitted by the post under the said recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857.

2. The terms "books, publications, or works of literature or art," in this Warrant used, shall, for the purposes of this Warrant, mean and comprise all such articles as are declared to be meant and comprised in and by the like terms used in the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, and all letters, notices, and other communications (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum), partly printed or partly lithographed, and partly written, which, if wholly written, would not be considered letters or communications in the nature of letters, shall and may be transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, but any letter, notice, or other communication (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum), partly printed or partly lithographed and partly written, which, if wholly written would

be considered a letter or communication in the nature of a letter, shall not be entitled to the privilege of being transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, provided, nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorise the sending by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, of any patterns or books of patterns, or papers of patterns, of any article or thing whatsoever.

3. Every letter, notice, or other communication (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum), partly printed or partly lithographed and partly written, which, if wholly written, would be considered a letter or a communication in the nature of a letter, sent by the post, shall be deemed and considered to be a letter or a communication in the nature of a letter, and shall be charged and chargeable with postage as a letter, and shall be transmitted by the post, in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions, relating to letters posted and addressed in like manner.

4. If any question shall arise whether any such letter, notice, or other communication as is last hereinbefore mentioned, is entitled to the privilege of a printed paper so far as respects the transmission thereof by the post, or of being sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, or is chargeable as a letter, the same shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General, whose decision thereupon shall be final.

5. All packets to be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be so transmitted respectively, in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained; that is to say: all such packets so to be transmitted between any part of the United Kingdom and the Island of Saint Thomas and the other Danish Colonies in the West Indies shall be subject as well to the several progressive and additional rates of postage mentioned and contained in the said recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, as also to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions respectively mentioned, expressed, and contained in and by the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, with respect to the several packets therein mentioned and authorized to be transmitted between any part of the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned in the said Schedule A to the said recited Warrant annexed (except such as relate exclusively to packets posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales, addressed to the United Kingdom), and all such packets so to be transmitted between the Island of Saint Thomas and the other Danish Colonies in the West Indies, and the British Colonies in the West Indies (without passing through the United Kingdom), shall be subject as well to the several progressive and additional rates of postage mentioned and contained in the said recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, as also to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions (except as aforesaid) respectively mentioned, expressed, and contained in and by the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, so far as the said several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions are consistent with, and are not repugnant to, the provisions of this Warrant in like manner in all respects, and as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes as if the said several progressive and additional rates of postage, and the said several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions respectively

mentioned and contained in the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857 (except as aforesaid), and so far as the same are consistent with, and are not repugnant to, the provisions herein contained, were inserted, expressed, and repeated in this present Warrant.

6. Provided always, that in all cases where any packet may be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant, and any such packet shall be so transmitted as not to be transmitted in conformity with the provisions thereof, and under and subject to the regulations, orders, directions, and conditions herein contained or referred to, and shall by reason thereof have become liable, under or by virtue of this Warrant, to be charged with the like rate or amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, or with any higher rate or amount of postage the Postmaster-General shall, and he is hereby authorized and empowered at his discretion, either to charge any such packet with the rate or amount of postage to which it shall have become liable under or by virtue of this Warrant as aforesaid, or to charge any such packet with any other rate or amount of postage which he shall think proper, not exceeding the rate or amount of postage to which such packet shall have become liable under or by virtue of this Warrant as aforesaid, nor less than the rate of postage which such packet would have been chargeable with if transmitted in conformity with the provisions thereof, and under and subject to the regulations, orders, directions, and conditions herein contained or referred to.

7. The rates of postage chargeable on books, publications, or works of literature or art, and other printed papers transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be in lieu of any rates of British postage now chargeable by law thereon.

8. The terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed in like manner as the like terms and expressions used in the said recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, so far as they are applicable to and consistent with, and are not contrary or repugnant to the intent and meaning of this Warrant.

9. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

10. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of October, 1860.

TREASURY WARRANT

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according

to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the post office," further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and power is also given to the Postmaster-General (amongst other things) to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post and also with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to require the postage, British, Colonial, or Foreign, of any letters sent by the post to be prepaid either in money or in stamps, as he might think fit, on the same being put into the post office, and also with such consent to abolish or restrict the prepayment in money of postage on letters sent by the post, either altogether, or on certain letters, and to require the prepayment thereof to be in stamps, and also to refuse to receive or send by the post any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made, and power is also given to the Postmaster-General and any officer of the post office to detain any letters which should be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations therein mentioned, and to open such letters and either to return them to the senders thereof, or to forward them to the places of their destination, charged in either case with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury should from time to time direct.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have, by divers Warrants under their hands, fixed, made, and established certain rates of British postage, payable on the transmission by the post of certain colonial letters therein respectively mentioned, and it is expedient to make regulations for the prepayment of the several rates of postage payable on letters posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Bermuda, in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us, in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this present Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows, that is to say :

1. On every letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Bermuda, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.

2. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Bermuda, without any postage having been paid thereon, every such letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of postage to which it would have been liable, if the postage had been paid when posted, together with a further and additional rate of postage of sixpence.

3. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Bermuda, and the postage

paid thereon shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable under, or by virtue of the regulations in force relating thereto, every such letter shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the postage paid thereon and the postage to which it would have been liable if the postage had been paid when posted, together with the further and additional rate of postage of sixpence.

4. Nothing hereinbefore contained shall in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege granted by the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, in favour of petitions and addresses forwarded to Her Majesty by the post, nor the privilege granted by the same Act to Members of each House of Parliament to receive by the post petitions and addresses to Her Majesty, and petitions addressed to either House of Parliament, not exceeding thirty-two ounces in weight, nor the privilege granted to printed votes or proceedings of Parliament, nor shall anything in this Warrant contained in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege which seamen and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's service now by law enjoy, of sending and receiving by the post letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

5. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant, shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

6. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke, any of the orders, directions, or regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other orders, directions, or regulations in lieu thereof.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October next.
