

and with the advice of her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that upon the completion and lighting of the said light vessel, there shall be paid for every British vessel, and for every foreign vessel privileged to enter the ports of the United Kingdom, upon paying the same duties as are payable by British vessels, which being navigated to or from any port situated to the northward of a supposed line drawn from Dungeness, in the county of Kent, to Cape Grisnez, in France, may cross a supposed line drawn from Dungeness aforesaid to Cape L'Ailly, in France, for every time of crossing such last-mentioned line, the toll of two-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel, if on an oversea voyage; and the toll of sixpence for each such vessel, if on a coasting voyage; and for every foreign vessel not privileged in manner hereinbefore mentioned, double the amount of the respective tolls hereinbefore specified, according to the voyage on which she may be employed; and that the said tolls, in respect of the said light vessel shall be levied by the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, subject to the gross abatement, or discount of fifty per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of thirty-five per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, mentioned in an Order in Council, made under the authority of the said recited Act, and dated the second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the consolidated tables of Light Duties, sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and to the further exemption sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for permanently annexing a canonry residentiary in the cathedral church of Rochester to the archdeaconry of Saint Albans, in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eighth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, and duly published in the London Gazette on the twentieth day of the same month, it was among other things provided that, upon the then next avoidance of the archdeaconry of Rochester, the said archdeaconry should be suppressed and

the canonry in the cathedral church of Rochester annexed thereto, should become and be subject to the provisions respecting the endowment of archdeaconries by the annexation of canonries thereto, contained in the hereinbefore mentioned Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty.

"And whereas by another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, and duly published in the London Gazette on the twenty-ninth day of the same month, it was provided that an annual sum of one hundred and forty-four pounds should be paid by us to the Archdeacon for the time being of the said archdeaconry of Saint Albans, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in lieu of such annual money payment, the said archdeaconry should be endowed in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas at the date of the said first mentioned Order in Council, the Venerable Walker King was Archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Rochester, and the holder of the said canonry.

"And whereas the said Walker King died on or about the thirteenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, and of the Venerable Anthony Grant, Archdeacon of Saint Albans, testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that in lieu of and substitution for the money payment now payable by us as aforesaid to the said Anthony Grant and his successors, the Canonry Residentiary, in the said cathedral church at Rochester, so as aforesaid held by the said Walker King, shall immediately upon and from the day upon which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, shall be duly published in the London Gazette, become and be permanently annexed and united to the said archdeaconry of Saint Albans, and that the said Anthony Grant, the present Archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Saint Albans, and every person hereafter becoming archdeacon of the said archdeaconry shall be entitled to installation to the same canonry, and shall also be entitled to, and invested with, and shall and may hold and enjoy all the rights, privileges, and emoluments of the same canonry, to all intents and purposes, so long as he and they shall remain such archdeacon and archdeacons, and no longer.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council, now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Rochester.
