ORDERS for the Court's going into Mourning on Thursday next, the 27th instant, for His late Royal Highness The Grand Duke of Mecklenburg Strelitz; viz.:

The Ladies to wear black Silk, fringed or plain Linen, white Gloves, Necklaces, and Ear-rings, black or white Shoes, Fans, and Tippetts.

The Gentlemen to wear Black full-trimmed, fringed or plain Linen, black Swords and Buckles.

The Court to change the Mourning on Thursday, the 4th of October next; viz.:

The Ladies to wear black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippetts, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuffs, with black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black Coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Sunday, the 7th of October next, the Court to go out of Mourning.

Osborne House, September 20, 1860.

This day had audience of Her Majesty:

Monsieur Frederick von Voss, Grand Veneur and Chamberlain of the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, to deliver a letter from His Royal Highness notifying the death of the late Grand Duke and his own accession:

To which audience he was introduced by Viscount Palmerston, K.G., acting for Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

Whitehall, September 18, 1860.

The Queen, taking into Her Royal consideration that upon the decease of Thomas Anthony third Viscount Southwell, without issue male, on the twenty-ninth day of February last, the title and dignity of Viscount Southwell devolved upon his nephew Thomas Arthur, now Viscount Southwell, as eldest surviving son and heir of Arthur Southwell, Esquire, commonly called the Honourable Arthur Southwell, a Lieutenant-Colonel in the Army, next brother of the said Thomas Anthony Viscount Southwell; and that according to the ordinary rules of honour the younger brother and sisters of the said Thomas Arthur,

now Viscount Southwell, cannot enjoy that place and precedence which would have been due to them in case their late father Arthur Southwell had survived his brother the said Thomas Anthony third Viscount Southwell, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Viscount Southwell, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Charles Francis Xavier Southwell, Esquire, Marcella Mary Agnes Southwell, Spinster, Jane Mary Matilda, wife of the Right Honourable John David Fitzgerald, one of the Judges of the Court of Queen's Bench in Ireland, Mary Paulina Southwell and Margaret Mary Southwell, Spinsters, brother and sisters of Thomas Arthur, now Viscount Southwell, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-eminence and precedence, as if their late father the said Arthur Southwell had survived his brother the said Thomas Anthony Viscount Southwell, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Viscount Southwell:

And Her Majesty has been further pleased to command that the said Royal order and declaration be registered in the College of Arms.
