**T**HE following Address, Unanimously Signed, was Presented to His Majesty by the Lord Bishop of Durham, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty, The Humble Address of the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, of the Cathedral Church of Durham, and the rest of the Clergy of that Diocess.

**W**Hereas in Your Majesties Royal Declaration lately Published, You have been Graciously pleased to Declare, That Your Majesty will protect and maintain Your Archbishops, Bishops, and Clergy, and all other Your Subjects of the Church of England, in the free Exercise of their Religion as by Law established, and in the quiet and full Enjoyment of all their Possessions without any Molestation or Disturbance whatsoever :

*We cannot but think our Selves obliged in Duty and Gratitude, to return Your Majesty our hearty Thanks for those Gracious Expressions of Your Kindness, and for all Your former Assurances of Your Royal Favors to the Church of England, and humbly to express our Loyalty as becomes the true Sons of the Church of England, and Your Majesties most obedient Subjects and Servants.*

This other Address which follows, has been likewise Presented to His Majesty, who received the same very Graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty, The Humble Address of the Independents, Baptists, and many others of Your Majesties Subjects in the County of Gloucester.

Great Sovereign,  
**W**E Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects, have fresh in our Memory Your Royal Proclamation for a General Pardon, whereby You opened the Prison doors to them that suffered for Conscience Sake; And Your Majesty hath now by Your Royal Declaration assured the World from Your own Princely Experience and Wisdom, That Conscience is not to be Forc'd; By which Your Majesty hath given new Life to Trade; and to many Thousands of Your Loyal Subjects.

Great Sir, As You are, by the Providence of God, the Sole Monarch, of many Kingdoms and Dominions, so by this Your Gracious Declaration, You have made Your Self the Rightful Father of them too; And as such, we humbly prostrate our selves at Your Majesties Feet, with Hearts more full of Joy than our Tongues can express, to give Glory to God, and to Your Majesty our most hearty Thanks; that You have thus delivered us from the jaws of Ruine and Destruction, of which none will complain; but such who made Gain of pretended Godliness; And we hope Your Two Houses of Parliament will Address to Your Majesty, to complete this Your Christian and

*Wise Declaration, by humbly beseeching Your Majesty for a Total Abolishment of the Penal Statutes concerning Religion, that so Your good Subjects and their Posterity may from Age to Age contemplate Your Majesty as the First and happy Instrument, under God, of the present and future Peace and Prosperity of Your Dominions.*

For our Selves, we are resolved to be Exemplary in our Loyalty, and do hereby wish and heartily invite all Your Majesties Subjects to join with us in one Heart and Mind to pray, Long Live and Reign King JAMES the Just.

Legborne, April 27. The Squadron which our great Duke sends to the assistance of the Venetians, will sail from hence the next week, composed of five Gallies, two Galiots, and two large Merchant Ships that have been hired to carry the Ammunition and Provisions, and 500 Soldiers raised in this State for the Service of the Republick.

Rome, May 3. On Monday last the Pope held a private Consistory, where some new Bishops were proposed, but 'tis not yet known when there will be a Publick One, to give the Hats to the Cardinal de Medicis, and the other new Cardinals, who in the mean time continue here Incognito. On Wednesday last the Earl of Castlemain, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, had his Audience of Leave of his Holiness; His Excellency is now making his Visits, and intends about three weeks hence to begin his Journey homewards. The Cardinal d'Estree has caused Te Deum to be sung in the Church of St. Louis, and in the Church of Sancta Trinita da Monti, with extraordinary Solemnity, and afterwards made a very magnificent Feast, for his most Christian Majesties Recovery. His Holiness has given Orders for the remitting 100 thousand Crowns to the Emperor, towards the supporting the Expences of the next Campaign. We had lately an account from Malta, that the great Master of that Order had, at the Instance of his Majesty of Great Britain, caused the Turkish Passengers, with their Goods, which had been taken out of an English Ship by the Marquis Fleuri, and put ashore there, to be delivered to the Commander of His Majesties Ships, who were sent on this occasion to Malta; And we are since informed by Letters from Legborne of the 30th past, that Captain Killegreen with 3 Men of War were arrived there from Tripoly, whither they had carried the said Turkish Passengers with the Monies and Goods belonging to that Bassa.

Venice, May 16. The 28 Instant, a Vessel arrived here from Dalmatia with Letters from the Provveditor General Cornaro, which give an account, That having drawn together the Forces of the Republick to the Number, of about 10000 Men, the Horse commanded by General Zepo, and the Foot by General S. Paolo, he advanced towards Sign, which the Enemy had Besieged; That being come near the place;

place, he caused 200 Men to advance in the Night, and from a Hill to give the Besieged notice by a Signal of their Approach; which the Turks understanding, and fearing they should be assaulted in their Camp, they resolved to raise the Siege, and to retire with all the diligence they could; They accordingly sent away their Cannon and Baggage, and Decamping very silently, retreated in much disorder towards the Bridge Cetina, where they made a Halt, to expect the rest of their Baggage, which was covered by a Body of Spanish Tartars; At Break of Day the Besieged made a vigorous Sally upon the Infidels, set Fire to their Camp, filled up their Works, and attacked their Rearguard; The Chevalier Jance fell likewise into their Rear, but the Provveditor General Cornaro not thinking fit to engage with them in a Battle, they being 15000 strong, gave them leisure to repass the River Cetina with their Cannon and Baggage. We are assured that the Enemy have lost in this Siege, which lasted 24 days, and in their Retreat, above 2500 Men, of which Number are Ali Bassa, Arlam Beg of Arcegovina, Alai Beg of Bosnia, and several other Officers of Note among the Spahis and Janisaries; During this whole Siege there were but three Men killed in the place, but many wounded; The chief of these are the Governor the Marquis de Borri, the Provveditor Antonio Bolani, and the Lieutenant Colonel Pizzamano; General Cornaro having reinforced the Garrison of Sign, and given the necessary Orders for the repairing the Fortifications, returned to Spalatro.

Vienna, May 8. The Moscovite Ambassadors had the 5th Instant their Audience of Leave of the Emperor, with the same Ceremonies that were observed at their first publick Audience. The same day their Imperial Majesties returned to Luxemburg. The Troops of Suabia and Franconia which are to serve in Hungary, are expected here in two or three days, they coming by water. Yesterday arrived here an Express from Buda, with advice that the Grand Visier having taken a Review of his Troops at Belgrade, had ordered them to march towards Essecke; and that they had accordingly passed the Save on a Bridge of Boats. The Pope's Nuncio has given 25000 Florins towards the repairing the Fortifications of Buda.

Cologne, May 18. The Elector of Mayence has named the Baron d' Ingelheim, to go and Compliment in his Name the most Christian King, upon his arrival at Luxemburg.

Brussels, May 23. The Cavalry and Dragoons are encamped near Stevenswert in Gelderland, but it's believed they will in a very short time be sent back to their Garisons, by reason of the Scarcity of Forage. The Letters from Vienna of the 11th Instant, confirm the News we had by our former, that the Grand Visier was marching towards Essecke; For the rest, they give an account of the great Preparations that are making in Hungary for the opening of the Campaign; And that they had advice from Croatia, that the Turks had been forced to abandon the Siege of Sign with the loss of 2000 men. They write from Spain, that the Moors retired from before Penon, so soon as they knew that Succors were entred into the place.

Hague, May 23. The Prince and Princess of Orange went on Tuesday last to Honnlaerdike, to pass part of the Summer there. The States of Holland who Adjourned the 16th Instant, will meet again to Morrow. It blew here yesterday a very violent Storm.

Paris, May 24. The 14th Instant the King parted from Vertus, and lay that Night at Chalons; The 15th his Majesty came to St. Menchoud, where he stay'd the next day, and arrived the 17th at Verdun, the 18th, being Whitsunday, his Majesty went to the Cathedral Church and assisted at High Mass, Celebrated by the Bishop of Verdun; The same day his Majesty named the Abbot of St. George for the Archbishoprick of Tours, the Abbot de Champigny Sarron for the Bishoprick of Clermont, and the Abbot Feydeau de Brou for the Bishoprick of Amiens; The King having visited the new Fortifications, and taken a Review of the Garrison, parted from Verdun the 19th, and lay that Night at Etain, the 20th at Longwy, and arrived the 21 at Luxemburg; In his Majesties return from thence, he will go in one day from Longwy to Verdun, and likewise in one day from La Ferte Sous Jouarre to Versailles; where the Court is expected the second of the next month. The Marquis de Lavardin, the King's Ambassador, will not begin his Journey to Rome till towards September. We have advice by the way of Marseilles, that the Algerines have depoled Merxometto, because he would have released some French Barks that had been taken and brought to Argiers by a Sally Man of War, and that they had made one Ibrahim Dey in his place; but it seems those People have however no mind to break the Peace with this Crown, for two of their Ships who came from Argiers after this hapnood, meeting a Vessel of Marseilles Richly laden from Smirna, let her pass without any molestation.

*Part-Royal in Jamaica, Feb. 9. Colonel, Mofworth His Majesties Lieutenant-Governor of this Island, having received advice that one Banister a*

notorious Pyrat was cruising near the Bay of Honduras to surprize some Vessels that were to pass that way, he sent Capt. Sprag, Commander of the *Drake* Brigat, with Orders to pursue the said Pyrate, and having taken him, to cause him to be hanged at the Yard-arme, and accordingly on the 28th past Capt. Sprag having met with and taken the said Pyrate, and his Crew, entred this Port with *Banister* and three others of his Conforts, hanging at the Yard-Arm; a spectacle which gave great satisfaction to the Planters and Merchants of this Island.

Deale, May 16. There are arrived in the *Downes* the *Persia* Merchant from the Bay of *Bengala*, and the *Society*, and *China* Merchant from *Suratte*, being all three very Richly laden. They left the *Kemphorne* and *Chandoy*s coming home from *Fort St. George*, the 12th of *April*, in 30 *Degrees* No. Lat.
