Genoua, May 13. The Popes Gallies and thofe of Malea are at Sea, and have been met by fome Veffels that are come in here, taking their Coutle towards the *Levant* to join the Venetian Fleet. There has been a great Earthquake at Naples, which lafted but two Minutes, but was to violent, that it thook all the Houfes' in the City, and threw down fome, and very much endamaged feveral publick Buildings, and among others, the Church of St. Paul, occationing a general Terror among the Inhabitants; It latted longer in the-Country at feveral Miles diffance from the Town, and did likewife much michief' there. This happened the 25th of the laft month between 5 and of the Clock in the Morning:
