Windsor Castle, December 3, 1860.

THIS day had audience of Her Majesty:
His Excellency the Count de Persigny,
Ambassador from the Emperor of the French, to
deliver his letter of recall;

And His Excellency the Count de Flahault de la Billarderie, to deliver his credentials in the same character;

To which audiences they were respectively introduced by the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

The Queen has been pleased to appoint John Maclean, Esq., C.B., to be Lieutenant-Governor of the Territories of British Kaffraria.

Foreign-Office, December 7, 1860.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to appoint Lieutenant-Colonel Edward Stanton, C.B., to be Her Majesty's Consul-General at Warsaw.

Whitehall, November 23, 1860.

The Queen has been pleased to give and grant unto George Christian Wilson, of Benton House, in the county of Northumberland, Esquire, late Captain in Her Majesty's 7th Royal Fusileers, and Jane Adelaide his wife, only daughter and heiress-at-law of Robert Anthony Atkinson (formerly Purvis), of the town and county of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Gentleman, by Ann his wife, Her Royal licence and authority, that they may, in compliance with a request contained in the last will and testament of Ann Atkinson, of Long Benton, in the county of Northumberland, Widow, deceased (the mother of the said Jane Adelaide Wilson), henceforth assume and use the surname of Atkinson in addition to and after that of

Wilson, and that the said George Christian Wilson may also take and use the arms of Atkinson quarterly with those of Wilson, and that the surname and arms of Atkinson may, in like manner, be borne by the issue of their marriage, such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise Her Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

To the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

I, the undersigned, the Secretary and Treasurer for the time being of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the Augmentation of the Maintenance of the Poor Clergy, do, by this writing under my hand, and intended to be published in the London Gazette, certify to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, that by a deed poll, bearing date the twenty-first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, under the hand and seal of Sir Oswald Mosley, of Rolleston Hall, in the county of Stafford, Baronet, and intended to be under the common seal of the said Governors, the said Sir Oswald Mosley did give, grant, and convey to the said Governors tithe commutation rent charges of the annual commuted value of one hundred and ten pounds and one shilling, being part of the rectorial rent charge of the parish of Tutbury, in the said county of Stafford, to be by them, the said Governors, applied and disposed of for and towards the augmentation of the maintenance of the Vicar of the vicarage of Tutbury, in the said county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield.
