Venice, May 17. We have Advice by a Veffel from the Morea, that Captain-General Moro/mi was arrived with 48 Sail at Navarin, which place he thought the most convenient for the general Rendezvous.

the general Rendezvous. Vienna, May 22. The Imperial Regiments are march-ing from their feveral Quarters to the general Rendezvous, which will be held towards the end of this month near Bar-kan. The Troops of Bavaria begin to pais down the Da-nube; And the Elector himfelf is expected here the next week. The Duke of Lorrain will part for Hangary on Monday or Tuefday next. The Turks continue to allemble near Efficike, but are not fo ltrong as was reported; How-ever feveral Imperial Regiments are ordered to march towards the Drave, under the Command of Major General Dunewald, to observe and hinder them from passing that River. The Bridge which the Grand Visier has cauled to be made over the Danube at Peter Waradin, is finished, and fot it's Security, the Turks are building a Port, in which for it's security, the Turks are building a Fort, in which will be pulted 5 or 600 Men. They have provided great Magazines at Temelwaer, which makes it thought the Grand Vizier's defign is to act with his main forces on that fide, to divert the Imperialities from the Siege of Alba Regalis; and at the fame time keep the Tran-fylvanians from joyning with them.
