To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of several of Your Majesties Loyal Subjects, of the Presbyterian Persuasion in the City of Norwich, on the Behalf of Themsclves, and the rest of their Brethren.

May it Please Your Most Sacred Majesty,

O believe the Thank fulness of our Hearts, beyond any Expressions of our Lips or Pens, for Your most Gracious Declaration for Liberty for us, in the Worship of God, which we trust we shall ever value above our Property, a that without which we could enjoy nothing which we could call our own, without the greatest uncasiness imaginable: But Your Majesty having in the same Declaration also secured that unto us, both by Your Royal Word and Act: What could Your Majesty have done more for us? Or what so left for us surfer to ask of the King? And, forasmuch as it hath pleased Your most Excellent Majesty, to give this safe Port to Your poor Subjests, so long tossed with Tempests; and justly to believe, that Loyalty is not intailed to a Party, as we hope we shall every justifie the Credit, which Your Majesties Charity in that point bath given us; So we shall not cease to bow our Knees to the God whem we serve, and by whom Kings Reign, beseching him to recompense this Royal Favour to Your Majesty, with len th of days, uninterrupted Health, Felicity in Your Royal Relations, Success in Your Great Councils and Affairs, and fignally, with the most Glorious Liberty of the Sons of God, heartily trying, as with one Voice, Let the KING live for ever.

Leghorne, May 14. An Express arrived here the 12th instant from Florence to hasten the departure of the four Gaslies which our Great Duke sends to the affistance of the Venetians. Two great Merchant Ships have been hired to carry the Land Soldiers, which are in 10 Companies 70 men in each, besides those on board the Gallies, and the Knights of St. Stephen, and the other Volontiers, who make in all about 1000 men. The Bark that attends these Gallies is laden with Ammunition, Bombs, and Grenadoes, and has likewise on board 30 Soldiers, several Bombardiers, and a German Ingenier.

Venice, May 24. We have an Account by the last

Venice, May 24. We have an Account by the last Letters from the Morea, That Captain-General Moro-fini had appointed the Rendezvous of the Gallies and Galeasses of this State to be at the Isle of Sapienza; Whether he himself had taken his Course with the

Gallies that were at Napoli di Romania. That Signior Venier Captain-Extraordinary of the Ships, having Advice, that the Octomm Fleet was at Sea with Orders to make all the diligence they could to join the Ships of Barbary, and afterwards to direct their Course towards the Venetian Fleet and to fight them, he was preparing to fail with 30 Men of War, reckoning the Ships of the Christian Privatiers (which were about 12 in number,) to feek the Enemy and attack them before their conjunction; Or else to endeavor to intercept the great Convoy that was bound from Alexandria to Constantinople. These Advices my farther, that the new Fortifications which the Captain-General had caused to be made at Napoli di Romanin, and on the Hill Pala-Inida, were quite finished, and were of so great advantage to the place, that they rendered it almost inaccessible, as well on the side of the Sea as the Land: And that General Coning mark was arrived these with the new raised Troops from Zant. We have Advice from Zara, that the Proveditor-General Cornaro was making new Levies at Spalacro, and expected a Reinforcement of Foot from hence, in order to the putting in execution his defign upon the Fortiefs of Chin. The Bishop of Primislia, Ambaffador Extraordinary from the King of Poland, will make his publick Entry to Morrow. Signior Francesco Savorgnano has taken Possession of his new Dignity of Procurator of St. Mark, with the usual Cerentionies.

Madrid, May 20. The King is returned hither from Aranjuez in perfect health. His Majesty has confered the Office of Chancestor of Brabant, upon the Sieur Christin, formerly one of the Plenipotentiaries for this Crown at the Treaty of Nimeguen. The Command of General of the Coast of Andalusia, vacant by the death of Dom Vespasiano Gonzaga, Count de Paredes, is given to the Count d'Aquilar, General of the Fleet. And Dom Guido Meca, is made President of the Council of the Hazienda, upon Don Pedro de Oreytia's surrendring that Office. They write from Alicant, that the Duke de Monseleon, and the Marquis de Cogolludo, parted from thence the 27th of the last month for Italy. The Fleet designed for New Spain, will not stail from Cadiz till towards the end of the next month.

Ratisbonne, May 23. The Bishop of Passau, the Emperor's First Commissioner at the Dyet, is gone to his Drocess, and it's believed, he will not return to reside any more here in this Quality, by reason of his great Age. The Express which the States of the Circle of Franconia sent lately to Vienna, is come back; They desired that their Troops which are to serve in Hungary might pass through Bohemia; But the Answer the Express has brought, is, That 'twill be better they take their march to Vissauen, which is within 4 Miles of Passau, where

the Imperial Commissaries will be ready to receive and conduct them at the Emperor's charge to the general Rendezvous. The Troops of Suabia are expected here towards the end of this month.

Bruffels. June 6. The Prince and Princess of Vandemont are returned hither from Aix la Chapelle. Don Emanuel Colomma, Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of Spain to the States-General of the United Provinces, arrived here this week in his way to Holland. The Cavalry and Dragoons which were - encamped in Gelderland, are returned to their respective Garifons. They write from Treves of the first Instant, that the French were forming a Camp at Traerback, of 8000 Foot and 4000 Horse, and that the new Fort they are building on the Mont de Cross near that place, will have 7 Bastions, and that they have given it the name of Mont-Royal. The Letters from Vienna of the 25th past tell us, that the Duke of Lorrain parted from thence the day before for Laxemburgh, and having taken his leave of the Emperor, continued his Journey the next Morning for Hungary; That in the mean time the Imperial Troops were marching from, all fides to the general Rendezvous, but that 'twould be the beginning of the next month before they all arrived there. That the Emperor had given the Government of Waradın in Croatsa, to Lieutenant-General Caprara; And that of Stiria, to the Count de Staremberg, and that Count Rabata was declared Mareschal de Camp General. These Advices add, that the Princels Ragorzi, Count Teckeley's Wife, had written to Cardinal Borvisi, to pray him to intercede with the Emperor on her behalf, that the may have leave to fend Deputics to Vienna, ro treat about the Surrender of Mongatz. They write from Segedin, that the Turks had finished their Bridge over the Danube at Peter-Waradin, and that they had built a Fort to cover it, in which the Grand Vifier had posted 500 Janisaries.

Hugue, June 10. Yesterday arrived here the Duke of Berwick, who having been to wait upon her Royal Highness, and the Prince of Orange, at Honflaer lyke, parted from hence this Evening in the Princes Yatcht for Vtrecht. The Count de Roye atrived here the 8th Instant, and intends to embarque

in two or three days for England.

Paris, 7 me 7. The King returned this Evening to Verfailles; His Majesty during his stay at Luxemburgh, viewed all the new Works that have been added, to be acient Fortifications of that Ciry, which take in . Il the space that was between the Body of the Place, the Paffendall and the Gronde, with several Redoubts to defend the Outworks: And gave his Orders to the Sieur de Vauban, his Principal Ingénier, about the new Fort that's defigned to be built near Traerback; In which feveral Batallions will be employed, who are accordingly marching thither. There are fitting out at Breft, tour Men of War with three Galiots, and forte other Vessels to attend them; This Squadron will be Commanded by the Chevalier de Tourville, and is to join the Duke of Mortemar off of Cadiz, whigh, if his Indisposition continues (he being ill of an Ague) is to return to Toulon. We have an Account from Rome, that the Pope has published a Bull for the suppressing the Franchises of the Ambassadors Quarters.
