May it Pleafe Your Moft Sacred Majefty,

O believe the Thank fulnels of our Hearts, beyond any Expressions of our Lips or Pens, for Your most Gracious Declaration for Liberty for us, in the Worthip of God, which we trust we fall ever value above our Property, as that without which we could enjoy nothing which we could call our own, without the greatest uncafinels imaginable : But Your Majesty having in the fame Declaration also fecured that unto us, both by Your Royal Word and ACt: What could Your Majesty have done more for us? Or what is left for us further to ask of the King? And, forasimuch as it hatb pleased Your most Excellent Majesty, to give this fafe Port to Your poor Subjects, so long tossed the fame for us ; So two hall not cease to bow our Knees to the God whom we ferve, and by whom Kings Reign, befeeching him to recompense this Royal Favour to Your Majesty, with length of days, uninterupted Health, Felicity in Your Royal Relations, Success in Your Great Councils and Affairs, and fir nally, with the most Glorious Liberty of the Sons of God, beartily crying, as with one Voice, Let the KING live for ever.

Leghorne, May 14. An Express arrived here the 12th inftant from Florence to haften the departure of the four Gallies which our Great Duke fends to the affiftance of the Venetians. Two great Merchant Ships have been hired to carry the Land Soldiers, which are in 10 Companies 70 men in each, befides those on board the Gallies, and the Knights of St. Stephen, and the other Volontiers, who make in all about 1000 men. The Bark that attends these Gallies is laden with Ammunition, Bombs, and Grenadoes, and has likewise on board 30 Soldiers, feveral Bombardiers, and a German Ingenier. Venice, May 24. Venice, May 24. We have an Account by the laft Letters from the Morea, That Captain-General Morofini had appointed the Rendezvous of the Gallies and Galeaffes of this State to be at the Isle of Sapienza; Whether he himself had taken his Courfe with the

Gallies that were at Nupoli di Romania. That Signior Venier Captain Extraordinary of the Ships, having Advice, that the Octoman Fleet was at Sea with Orders to make all the diligence they could to join the Ships of Barbary, and afterwards to direct their Courfe towards the Venetian Fleet and to fight them, he was preparing to fail with 30 Men. of War, reckoning the Ships of the Christian Privatiers (which were about 12 in number,) to feek the Enemy and attack them before their conjunction; Or elfe to endeavor to intercept the great Convoy that was bound from Alexandria to Constantinople. These Advices my farther, that the new Fortifications which the Captain General had caufed to be made at Napoli di Romanin, and on the Hill Palamida, were quite finished, and were of so great advantage to the place, that they rendered it almost inacceffible, as well on the fide of the Sea as the Land: And that General Coning mark was arrived there with the new railed Troops from Zant. We have Advice from Zara, that the Proveditor-Gene-ral Cornaro was making new Levies at Spalaero, and expected a Reinforcement of Foot from hence, in order to the putting in execution his defign upon the Fortiefs of Chin. The Bishop of Primiflia, Amballador Extraordinary from the King of Poland, will make his publick Entry to Morrow. Signior Francefco Savorgnano has taken Possefion of his new Dignity of Procurator of St. Mark, with the ufual Ceremonics.

Madrid, May 20. The King is returned hither from Aranjuez in perfect health. His Majefty has confered the Office of Chancellor of Brabant, upon the Sieur Christin, formerly one of the Plenipotentiaries for this Crown at the Treaty of Nimeguen. The Command of General of the Coaft of Andalu-Jia, vacant by the death of Dom Velpaliano Genzaga, Count de Paredes, is given to the Count d'Aquilar, General of the Fleet. And Dom Guido Meca, is made Prefident of the Council of the Hazienda, upon Don Pedro de Oreytia's furrendring that Office. They write from Alicane, that the Duke de Monfeleon, and the Marquis de Cogolludo, parted from thence the 27th of the laft month for Italy. The Fleet defigned for New Spain, will not fail frem Cadiz till towards the end of the next month.

Ratisbonne, May 23. The Bishop of Passau, the Emperor's First Commissioner at the Dyct, is gone to his Direction, and it's believed, he will not return to refide any more here in this Quality, by reason of his great Age. The Express which the States of the Circle of Franconia (ent lately to Vienna, iscome back; They defined that their Troops which are to ferve in Hungary might pass through Bohemia; But the Answer the Express has brought, is, That 'twill be better they take their march to Viscour, which is within 4 Miles of Passau, where the
