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Windſor, June 4.

THE following Adreſs has been Preſented to the King, which His Maſteſty received very Graciously.

To the King's Moſt Excellent Maſteſty,

The Humble Adreſs of ſeveral of Your Maſteſties Loyal Subjects, of the Presbyterian Perſuaſion in the City of Norwich, on the Behalf of Themſelves, and the reſt of their Brethren.

May it Pleaſe Your Moſt Sacred Maſteſty,

TO believe the Thankfulneſs of our Hearts, beyond any Expreſſions of our Lips or Pens, for Your moſt Gracious Declaration for Liberty for us, in the Worſhip of God, which we truſt we ſhall ever value above our Property, as that without which we could enjoy nothing which we could call our own, without the greateſt uneaſineſs imaginable: But Your Maſteſty having in the ſame Declaration alſo ſecured that unto us, both by Your Royal Word and Act: What could Your Maſteſty have done more for us? Or what is left for us further to aſk of the King? And, forasmuch as it hath pleaſed Your moſt Excellent Maſteſty, to give this ſafe Port to Your poor Subjects, ſo long toſſed with Tempeſts; and juſtly to believe, that Loyalty is not intailed to a Party, as we hope we ſhall ever juſtify the Credit, which Your Maſteſties Charity in that point hath given us; So we ſhall not ceaſe to bow our Knees to the God whom we ſerve, and by whom Kings Reign, beſeeching him to recompenſe this Royal Favour to Your Maſteſty, with length of days, uninterrupted Health, Felicity in Your Royal Relations, Succeſs in Your Great Councils and Affairs; and finally, with the moſt Glorious Liberty of the Sons of God, heartily crying, as with one Voice, Let the KING live for ever.

Legborne, May 14. An Expreſs arrived here the 12th inſtant from Florence to haſten the departure of the four Gallies which our Great Duke ſends to the aſſiſtance of the Venetians. Two great Merchant Ships have been hired to carry the Land Soldiers, which are in 10 Companies 70 men in each, beſides thoſe on board the Gallies, and the Knights of St. Stephen, and the other Volontiers, who make in all about 1000 men. The Bark that attends theſe Gallies is laden with Ammunition, Bombs, and Grenadoes, and has likewiſe on board 30 Soldiers, ſeveral Bombardiers, and a German Ingenier.

Venice, May 24. We have an Account by the laſt Letters from the Morea, That Captain-General Morofini had appointed the Rendezvous of the Gallies and Galeaſſes of this State to be at the Ile of Sapienza; Whether he himſelf had taken his Courſe with the

Gallies that were at Napoli di Romania. That Signior Venier Captain-Extraordinary of the Ships, having Advice, that the Ottoman Fleet was at Sea with Orders to make all the diligence they could to join the Ships of Barbary, and afterwards to direct their Courſe towards the Venetian Fleet and to fight them, he was preparing to ſail with 30 Men of War, reckoning the Ships of the Chriſtian Privateers (which were about 12 in number,) to ſeek the Enemy and attack them before their conjunction; Or elſe to endeavor to intercept the great Convoy that was bound from Alexandria to Conſtantinople. Theſe Advices ſay farther, that the new Fortifications which the Captain-General had cauſed to be made at Napoli di Romania, and on the Hill Palamuda, were quite finiſhed, and were of ſo great advantage to the place, that they rendered it almoſt inacceſſible, as well on the ſide of the Sea as the Land: And that General Coningſmark was arrived there with the new raiſed Troops from Zant. We have Advice from Zara, that the Proveditor-General Cornaro was making new Levies at Spalacro, and expected a Reinforcement of Foot from hence, in order to the putting in execution his deſign upon the Forties of Chin. The Biſhop of Primiſia, Ambaſſador Extraordinary from the King of Poland, will make his publick Entry to Morrow. Signior Franceſco Savorgnano has taken Poſſeſſion of his new Dignity of Procurator of St. Mark, with the uſual Ceremonies.

Madrid, May 20. The King is returned hither from Aranjuez in perfect health. His Maſteſty has conferred the Office of Chancellor of Brabant, upon the Sieur Chriſtin, formerly one of the Plenipotentiaries for this Crown at the Treaty of Nimeguen. The Command of General of the Coaſt of Andaluſia, vacant by the death of Don Veſpaſiano Genzaga, Count de Paredes, is given to the Count d'Aquilar, General of the Fleet. And Don Guido Meca, is made Preſident of the Council of the Hazienda, upon Don Pedro de Oreytia's ſurrendering that Office. They write from Alicant, that the Duke de Monfeleon, and the Marquis de Cogolludo, parted from thence the 27th of the laſt month for Italy. The Fleet deſigned for New Spain, will not ſail from Cadiz till towards the end of the next month.

Ratisbonne, May 23. The Biſhop of Paſſau, the Emperor's Firſt Commiſſioner at the Dyet, is gone to his Dioceſs, and it's believed, he will not return to reſide any mote here in this Quality, by reaſon of his great Age. The Expreſs which the States of the Circle of Franconia ſent lately to Vienna, is come back; They deſired that their Troops which are to ſerve in Hungary might paſs through Bohemia; But the Anſwer the Expreſs has brought, is, That 'twill be better they take their march to Viſtoven, which is within 4 Miles of Paſſau; where the
