NAVAL MEDALS FOR THE INDIAN MUTINY,
1857, 1858.

HER Majesty having been graciously pleased to grant a Medal to the Officers, Seamen, and Marines of Her Majesty's ship Shannon and Her Majesty's ship Pearl, who formed the Naval Brigade in India, under the command of the late Sir William Peel, Knight Commander of the Bath, in the years 1857 and 1858; Notice is hereby given, that all claimants to such Medal, notwithstanding any previous applications, should apply, personally or by letter, to the Accountant-General of the Navy, Admiralty, Somerset-House (with "India Medal" on the outside the written application).

Every applicant must state his rank or rating, and the name of the ship on board which he served; also in the case of every Petty Officer, Seaman, or Marine, it is indispensable that his application should be accompanied by a certificate of service; except in the case of his being on board any of Her Majesty's ships, and the application be made through his Commanding Officer, in which case this certificate will not be required.

When there are several claimants on board the same ship, it would be desirable that they should make their application in one letter, through the Commanding Officer of such ship, in a list alphabetically arranged under the ship to which they belonged at the time, affording the information above required.
