Warsaw, *May* 12. The Letters from *Zolkiew* of
 the 6th Instant tell us, the Court would remove
 in few days for *Zawarzew*; from whence the
 King intended to go to the general Rendezvous
 of the Army, and the Queen to the *Bath* at *Hirschberg*
 in *Silesia*. It's said that the Forces of the
 Crown, after their conjunction with those of *Lithuania*,
 will advance towards the Forest of *Buckovina*,
 to endeavour to draw the Enemy to a Battle.
 In the mean time there is a report that 40000 *Tar-*
tars have passed the *Boristhenes*, and that a detach-
 ment has been sent from this Body, under the Com-
 mand of *Sultan Nuradin*, to make new incursions
 into the Frontier Provinces of this Kingdom; where-
 upon, the *Polsk* Garisons on the side of *Volhynia*,
 which Province seems to be the most threatned,
 have not only been reinforced, but Orders have
 been sent to the *Cossacks* Commanded by General
Mobila, to have a watchful Eye upon the Enemies
 motions. These Letters from *Zukiew* inform us
 farther, that the Officer who had been sent by the
 Crown-General to Prince *Galitzen* General of the
Moscovite Forces, was come back, and reported,
 that he met the said General at *Kjersko*, on the other
 side of the *Boristhenes*, and having delivered the
 Letter he was charged with, was directed to follow
 him to *Achriska* on the Frontiers of the *Crimee*, the
 place of their general Rendezvous; That arriving
 there, the General took a Review of his Forces in the
 presence of the said Officer, whom he dispatched some
 days after with an Answer to the Letter he had
 received by him; wherein he gives the Crown-
 General an account, That the *Moscovite* Army
 was composed of Two hundred thousand fighting
 Men, besides Servants; That the *Cossacks* made
 a Body of 100000; and that they had with them
 a Train of 400 pieces of Cannon and Mortars;
 That he intended to decamp the 3d of this Month,
 and to enter into the Territories of the *Precopian*
Tartars, and to send at the same time a strong
 detachment to attack *Affake*, and the other places
 on the *Boristhenes*; in which the *Turks* have Gar-
 isons, that thereby a passage might be opened to the
Cossacks to enter into the *Black Sea*, and to make
 their incursions as far as *Constantinople*; But he
 concludes his Letter with a Declaration; That he
 would not put these designs in execution, till he
 understood that the Army of this Crown was like-
 wise in the Field, and marching into the Enemies
 Countries.

Vienna, *May* 29. The Imperial Forces are, it's be-
 lieved, by this time at the General Rendezvous near
Boriskin. The main Army commanded by the
 Duke of *Lorraine*, will be composed of between 40
 and 50000 Men; That which is to act in *Upper*
Hungary, under the Orders of the Elector of *Bava-*
ria, will be of 20000; And the Body in *Croatia* is to
 be of 8000 Men. His Electoral Highness is expect-
 ed here the beginning of the next Month; and in
 the mean time his Infantry that had their winter
 Quarters in *Hungary*, are marching towards *Zol-*
nicze, where the Forces that are to serve on that
 side are appointed to assemble. We have an ac-
 count from *Fru: Churches*, that a Party of Horse
 and Dragoons of that Garison, commanded by the
 Baron *d'Orich*, had taken 40 Horses and Oxen,
 and 200 Sheep, from under the Walls of *Sepeth*, af-
 ter having defeated 200 Spahis, who sallied out of
 that place to attack them; being supported by

a detachment of *Jac:seris*, who had posted them-
 selves very advantageously behind the Hedges; The
Turks came on with great fury, but after several Char-
 ges found themselves obliged to retreat to the Town,
 which they did in great disorder, having had between
 40 and 50 of their Men killed, and many wounded;
 of the Imperialists there were 11 killed, and a Com-
 pany with several others wounded. These advices add,
 that the Grand Visier had sent several thousand Ja-
 nisaries, with a great many Wagons, laden with Ma-
 terials, to repair the Bridge of *Esfacky*, on which
 they began to work the 16th instant, a Body of
 Horse and Dragoons being posted near *Esfacky* to
 cover the Workmen. The *Turks* had likewise orders
 from the Grand Visier to lay a Bridge over the
Drav, but Major-General *Dunewaldt* was march-
 ing that way with several Imperial Regiments to ob-
 serve them.

Hamburg, *May* 27. The Letters from *Potsdam*
 tell us, that the Electoral Prince and Princess of
Brandenburg were gone to the *Bath* at *Carelbad* in
Bohemia; and that they arrived the 16th Instant
 at *Leipsic* in their journey thither. The two Deput-
 ies which the Magistrates of this City sent to *Vien-*
na about a year ago, returned hither yesterday. The
 Advices from *Poland* say, the Troops of that Crown
 were all arrived at the general Rendezvous, where
 they expected the Forces of *Lithuania*, who were
 on their march to joyn them.
