Pendennis, Jan. 6.

THis last week arrived safely here one vessel belonging to this Port from the *Canaries*, and another from *Moderas*; and one Friday last a ship from *Bilbao* bound for *London*. Several ships from *London* and other Ports are here outwards bound, expecting only favourable weather.

Minehead, Jan. 7. The *Fortune of Cork* with the *Abraham* of this Port, arriving the 4th instant, laden with *Wooll* from *Ireland*, informs us of a Spanish vessel bound for *Bristol*, which having spent her fore-Mast and Mizzen, was riding under the *Ile of Lundy*, but the next night proving more then usually stormy, they fear she may have ran much hazard.

Turin, Decemb. 17. The Pope having taken notice of the Duke of *Savoy's* Resolution of recalling the Marquess *Ville* from the Venetian Service, and considering how usefull and advantageous the presence and conduct of the said Marquess has been to the long besieged City of *Candia*, was pleas'd by his Nuncio to signify to the Duke his desires, that the Marquess might still continue his Employment in *Candia*, at least for so long time as the danger of that place should require the assistance of so able a person; which was accordingly obey'd by the Nuncio, and as willingly descended to by the Duke; especially the same instances having been made to him by the Cardinal *Rospigliosi*, and confirmed by a Brief from the Pope to the same effect: but the danger being in some measure past over, the Duke has now declared a necessity of his presence at home, with the forces which he there entertain'd under his Command; whose return is in little time expected; but as yet it is not known how far the Duke may be perswaded to engage himself in the Interests of his most Christian Majesty.

Rome, Decemb. 24. On Sunday last, the Pope, with the Colledge of Cardinals, heard Masse and a Sermon in his own Chappel, and the same afternoon passed in his Coach to visit *St. Peters Church*, accompany'd by the Cardinals *Corpigna* and *Saluzzo*, and followed by a great Train of the Princes and Nobility on Horse-back.

His Holiness has lately disposed of several Officers and Commands; having declared Sr. Cavaliere *Nicolo Banchieri*, Lieutenant-General of his Gallies, Seignior *Baldassani Panciatichi* Lieutenant of his Guards, Seignior *Emilio* Captain of the two Companies of his Launces, *Antonio St. Croce* of his Horse-Guards, and Cavaliere *Spinola* Captain of his Troop of Cuirassiers; besides which he has conferred the Charge of Deputy-Governour of the Fort *di St. Angelo*, upon Cavaliere *Montevocchi*; the Government of his Maritime and In-land Provinces, upon Cavaliere *Theodoro Celleso*; the Government of the Arms in his Patrimonial Province upon Seignior *Lansfredino Cillesse*; the Serjeant-Majorship for the same place upon *Sebastiano Gallo*, the same employment in *Romagna* on Seignior *Vincenzo Celleso*, the Command of a Troop of Horse in *Avisnon* upon Cavaliere *Maidachino*; making the Sr. *Ottavio Adami*, Serjeant-Major of the Armes in *Dalmatia*, and the Abbot *Scarlatti* Auditor for the Gallies.

On Thursday morning the Pope held a Publick Consistory, where the New Cardinals *Rospigliosi* and *Sigismundo Chigi*, were introduced by the Deacon Cardinals to kiss the Hand, Eye, and Foot of his Holiness; who embracing them with the rest of the Cardinals, all of them together went thence into the Popes Chappel; where at

the Altar the New Cardinals took the Usual Oath, with the accustomed Ceremonies; which done, they returned again to his Holiness, who gave them and put on their Hatts; which Solemnity ending, Cardinal *Rospigliosi* returned to his Apartment, where he treated with an Extraordinary Banquet the Cardinals *Flavio* and *Sigismundo Chigi*, with several persons of his Kindred, and the same afternoon, the two New Cardinals gave their first Visit to *St. Peters Pallace*.

This Week the Ministers of Forreign Princes residing here, made their private Visits to the New Cardinal Patron, who received them to their great satisfaction; the French and Spanish Ambassadors are daily dispatching Conriers to their respective Masters; which gives the Generality some reason to believe the Treaty between them may advance, the Pope using all diligence imaginable to encourage it. The Nuncio's for *Spain*, *France*, and other places, are not yet declared, nor will be till after the Holy-days.

Dantzick, Decemb. 28. Letters from *Thorne* confirm to us the Reception of the King of *Poland's* Letters; by which he assures them of his readines to with-draw his Garrison out of that Town, upon condition that the Burgers shall for the future quit all their pretensions to *St. Jacobs Church*, permit the Jesuits the liberty of making their Processions, and promise to take in another Garrison, when it shall be found convenient.

From *Warsaw* we are advised that the Tartarian Ambassador is dismissed from that Court, with an answer to this effect, That his Majesty will endeavour at the next ensuing Diet, to procure from the States a Ratification of the Treaty of *Podaiatz*.

The Ambassador from the *Czar of Muscovy* is treated with more than Ordinary Entertainment at the Court, where he endeavours to have the Ratification of the Treaty of Peace lately concluded with his Master, confirmed by his Majesties Oath, and 'tis said, promises his assistance to the Crown of *Poland* of 30000 men, which shall be ready the next year in the Field, if the affairs of *Poland* require it; which offer 'tis believed may find acceptance, they having but little confidence that the peace lately made with the Tartars, can be of any long continuance.

The Army of the Crown is now retiring towards the *Rhine*, intending to take up their Quarters in *Prussia*; of whose arrival, those Countries are extremely apprehensive, by reason of the great Disorders and little Discipline used amongst them.

The Land-day for *Prussia* is to begin the third day of the next month at *Marienburgh*, in Order to the General Diet; but what Propositions his Majesty intends to offer them, is not said.

'Tis said, There is not yet a right understanding between his Majesty and the States of *Poland*, the latter being somewhat jealous least the French interest be more prevalent at the Court then they desire.

Vienna, Dec. 30. The Internuncius from His Holiness is with much earnestness endeavouring to create a right understanding between the Spanish and French Ambassadors, and to bring them to a Conference, but both of them excuse themselves upon pretence that they have not as yet any instructions from their Masters, that can admit of a new familiarity, and in the mean time to order affairs, that they seldom or never meet. The Marquess *de Guisny* hath endeavoured to assure His Imperial Majesty, that the King his Master intends not the least hostility against the Empire, in

case he were not provoked by the Princes interesting themselves in the wars of the *Netherlands*, where notwithstanding his Master will be ready to give up all his Conquests upon the payment of 16 Millions of Gold.

The beginning of the next Month, all the General Officers of the Army, with the Colonels of Horse and Foot, are to make their appearance in this City, to consult about the Military affairs, and to receive such Orders as his Imperial Majesty shall find convenient to give them.

We have here much discourse of a League betwixt the Emperour, the Crown of *Swedenland*, the Marquis of *Brandenburg*, and the Dukes of *Lunenburg*, but as yet we suspect the certainty of it.

The Duke of *Wurtemberg* is now upon his return homewards, to whom the Emperour has order'd to be paid a considerable number of Ducats, partly as a Present, and partly for the defray of the expences of his voyage.

The Marquis de *Guitty* has again left this place, and is returning homewards, carrying with him the Pictures of their Imperial Majesties, which are to be presented to their Most Christian Majesties.

Some few days since, the Secretary of the Embassy from *Venice*, having had a long Audience from the Emperour, did therein very pathetically express the great dangers which threaten'd not onely the Republick of *Venice*, but the whole Christian world, if the City of *Constantinople* should fall into the hands of the Turk, effectually representing to His Imperial Majesty, how much it was the Interest of all the Christian Princes to be watchful over their Common Enemy, and by their timely assistance to prevent so great and irreparable a Calamity, as would be the loss of that important Island; to which the Emperour return'd a very satisfactory answer, with a promise to take that business so effectually into his consideration, that Forces should be in little time in readiness for their succours.

The Spanish Levies for *Milan* are much advanced, the Officers being in all places very diligent in listing Souldiers for that Service. Several Reformed Officers are lately entertain'd by the Emperours command, and order'd to raise men for his service.

From *Hungary* we are advertis'd that a party of Turks sent out from *Newhausel*, surpriz'd 10 of the Hussars who were abroad searching for some Booty, and carried them away prisoners, but at their return, presenting them to the Governour of that place, they were immediately order'd to be cut in pieces in his presence, only one of them pardon'd.

Since the recalling of the great Bassa to *Constantinople*, the Hungarians are somewhat apprehensive lest the Quiet of that Countrey may in little time receive some disturbance by the change, his successor being reputed a person of great severity, and a known Enemy to the Christians.

Hamburg, Jan. 4. Our neighbouring forces still continue their old Quarters, but talk high, as if they suddenly expected employment, and might in little time make themselves merry with the Emperours money. Count *Coningmark* is daily expected with impatience from *Swedenland*: some reports there are, that the Swedes intend to raise fresh forces to be join'd with their Army in the Duchy of *Bremen*, for the pursuance of some designe of importance. From *Stockholm* they tell us, that the Birth-day of the young King of *Sweden* was the 4th of *December* celebrated with extraordinary signes of joy, he then entering into the 14th year of his age, and that the Count *Magnus de la Garde*, Great Chancellor of that Kingdom, made that day an extraordinary Treat to the King and Queen; with most of the principal Senators of that Kingdom, and the great persons of the Court, concluding his entertainment with a Ball, at which there was a great appearance of Ladies, of the most eminent Quality.

On *Christmas* evening happened here a great and sudden Fire, beginning in a Dye-house, upon the *Holland-Rye*, which continued above 4 hours, consuming great quantities of Goods the whole loss amounting to a very considerable sum.

Bruges, Jan. 10. These Countreys are every where much

tired out and harass'd by the Enemies forces which are daily abroad in Parties, fetching in contributions, and imposing burthens upon the people, which makes them with much impatency, expect the success of the so long discourse of Mediation and Treaty between the two Crowns, for which 'tis said His Excellency the Marquis de *Castel Rodrigo* is furnish'd with power as Plenipotentiary to attend the Treaty at *Aken*, though others as much doubt the success, as they do as yet of the place design'd for that great work: in the mean time by an Express arriv'd at *Brussels* from *Madrid*, we are put into great hopes of a timely and vigorous assistance before Spring, which is much encouraged by the safe arrival of the Gallions at *Cadix*, which will infinitely encourage the advance of Moneys for the better carrying on of the Warre.

The same Letters confirm to us the report of a late indisposition into which his Catholick Majesty was lately fallen, which in the end broke out into the Small-pox, but that he was past all danger, and in a fair way of recovery; that the Marquis of *Caracene* was arriv'd at *Madrid*, having left the Army behind him on the Frontiers in good order, and the Countrey every where in a quiet posture, expecting the issue of the Negotiation for a peace with *Portugal*, to which the Court of *Spain* seem much inclin'd, and had given full power to the Marquis de *Liche*, Son to the late *Dox Lewis de Haro*, with some other Ministers of State residing at *Lisbon*, to draw that business to a period.

Deal, Jan. 9. There are now riding in the Downs a Fleet of between 20 and 30 Merchant ships, with their Convoys, outwards bound, which in few days may begin their Voyage. The 7th instant came in here the *Algier* Merchant of 300 Tuns laden home with Currants from *Zant*.

Harwich, Jan. 9. The weather having hitherto continu'd stormy, the Fleet of Colliers are still confin'd to this Harbor. By the arrival of the *Flanders* Pacquet-boat on Tuesday last (being diverted from her usual Road by stress of weather) we are inform'd that the French were on Monday last before *Nieaport*, where great shooting had been heard from about that place, and that at the parting of the Boat, they were told that the French had seized upon some Passes, and were approach'd near the Town. We hear of several wrecks off *Tarmouth*, but as yet no particulars. The weather clearing, the Colliers are preparing to put out, and may depart with the first fair wind for the River.
