North Somerset Railway.

(Alteration of Line during progress of Bill.)

W HEREAS, a Bill is now pending in Parliament, intituled "A Bill for Incorporating the North Somerset Railway Company, and for authorizing them to make and maintain the North Somerset Railway, and for other purposes."
