WHEREAS, by the 40th George Third, chapter 84, commonly called "The School of Physic Act," it is enacted, that it may be lawful for the President and Fellows of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland to direct that any of the Professors shall continue to hold their Professorships for another term of seven years, after the expiration of the term for which they were elected, provided that the said President and Fellows do give three months' notice previous to the time at which the election to such Professorship would otherwise have been held, in the Dublin and London Gazettes, of such their direction: And whereas one of the said Professorships, to wit, "The King's Professorship of Materia Medica and Pharmacy in the city of Dublin, on the foundation of Sir Patrick Dun," now held by Dr. Jonathan Osborne, will become vacant on the 13th day of October next, this is to give notice that the President and Fellows of the said College of Physicians have, at a meeting held on the 3rd of July, 1861, directed that the said Dr. Jonathan Osborne shall continue to hold the said Professorship of Materia Medica and Pharmacy for a further term of seven years, to commence from the 13th of October next, pursuant to the powers vested in them by the said recited Act.

CONTRACTS FOR WHEAT, COCOA AND SUGAR.

Department of the Comptroller for Victualling and Transport Services, Somerset-House, July 2, 1861.

THE Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby give notice, that on Wednesday the 17th instant, at half past one o'clock, they will be ready to treat with such persons as may be willing to contract for supplying and delivering into Her Majesty's Victualling Stores at Deptford, the undermentioned articles; viz.:

Wheat, 3,000 quarters; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards, or earlier if preferred by the party tendering.

Cocoa, 150 tons; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards, or earlier if preferred by the party tendering.

Sugar, 200 tons; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards, or earlier if preferred by the party tendering.

Tenders may be made for the whole or any portion of the articles.

Their Lordships reserve to themselves the power, when the tenders are opened, of contracting either

for the whole, or for such part thereof only as they may deem fit, or for a greater quantity, or of not contracting for any, and also an unlimited power of selection.

The cocoa and sugar to be exempted from the Customs' duties, and parties tendering are to state where they are respectively lying.

Samples of the wheat (not less than two quarts), and of the cocoa (not less than 2 lbs.), must be produced by the parties tendering.

Each tender for sugar must specify the mark and landing number of each cask or package, the ship in which imported, and the country or place of its growth or produce, and an average sample (not less than 2 lbs. for each import mark) must be produced by the parties tendering, and not an average of different marks or several imports, and any parcel that is found not to be of the same mark or average quality as the samples tendered and accepted, will be rejected by the officers.

The samples produced by persons whose tenders are not accepted, are requested to be taken away by them immediately after the contracts have been decided.

No tender will be received unless made on the printed form provided for the purpose, and which may be obtained on application at the said office, or to the Officer conducting the Packet Service at Liverpool, or to the Collector of Customs at Bristol.

Particular attention is called to the recent modification of the conditions of the contracts, which may be seen at the said office, and at Liverpool and Bristol.

No tender will be received after half past one o'clock on the day of treaty, and it will not be required that the party tendering, or an agent on his behalf, should attend at the office on the day of contract, as the result of the offer received from each person will be communicated to him and his proposed sureties in writing.
