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Windsor, June 20.

THE following Address to His Majesty from the Presbyterian Ministers, and their Congregations in and near the City of *Dublin*, was transmitted hither by his Excellency the Earl of *Tyrconnel*, Lord-Deputy of *Ireland*, with another Address presented to his Excellency on the same Subject by those of the Congregational Perswasion, in behalf of themselves and others, meeting in *New-Row* in *Dublin*; both which were very Graciously accepted by His Majesty.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of several Presbyterian Ministers, and their Congregations in and near *Dublin*.

Great Sovereign,

Though the benign Effects of Your Royal Inclinations relieved us before any others, yet we thought our highest Acknowledgements too mean for Your Princely Regard, until publick Fame assured us we have a King good enough to accept the Thanks which he extorts by obliging: Emboldened hereby we hasten to cast our Selves at Your Royal Feet, with a Heart as Grateful for our Liberty as they that did need it most, or can express their Resentments best. Our Acknowledgements must bear date long before Your Royal Intentions were most exactly published, and as fully executed by his Excellency Your present Chief Governour here: For we by Your Favour from the beginning of Your Reign, were not interrupted in a great measure of Liberty and Peace we enjoyed above our Brethren, through the moderation of the Government here for many years; And now have our Liberty fully enlarged, and as well secured by the Royal Word of a Prince, esteeming himself great by being Good and Just: A Favour so rich, that to mention it will assure Mankind we must be Grateful. By Your Royal Proclamation it is, that from Corners exposing us to Misrepresentation, we are admitted to tell the World, we Preach the Word of Christ's Kingdom without damage to our Civil Governours, and heartily Pray for our Prince's welfare; we may be useful to the utmost of our Ability, without Offence to our Sovereign, or Detriment to our selves. Great SIR, we Acknowledge Your Influence, surprizing our jealous Minds with Security, by Your Royal Word, and enforcing due Loyalty by making Mens Conditions easie: You will need few Methods to Rule Your Subjects while You thus engage their Hearts; Nor is there room for Fear in Your Royal Breast, whilst Men are thus admitted to Serve their God; and Enjoy their own: Even weak Men will not grow mad when unoppressed; while the World is too full of Instances; that Oppression will hurry the wisest beyond the conduct of Principles of Discretion.

Dread SIR, Esteem our Thanks to Your Majesty, by our Prayers to him who can fully Reward what we are barren in Acknowledging: May Your Glorious Reign convince the World, That Tolleration of the Conscience is a better Instrument of Government, than Persecution. May Your Dominions be enriched and flourish, and You be Great by every degree of their Glory, as the Author of this Tranquility so conducive to it. May our Imprudence or Ingratitude never cause in Your Great Soul the least uneasy Reflection on this Grant; nor any Influence change Your Gracious Resolves concerning us, who have peaceably used a long Connivance, and now are obliged by what is far stronger. May all unanimously conspire to be more truly Religious

towards God, and so more Loyal towards Your Majesty, who thus allow them the utmost means of Improvement in both. These are some of the many Wishes easily flowing from the engaged Hearts of,
Dread Sovereign,
Your most Obliged, Loyal, and Humble
Subjects and Servants.

Florence, June 1. Sir *William Trumbull* His Majesty's Ambassador to the *Ottoman-Port*, having Orders to come to this Court, arrived the 26th of the last month at *Leghorn*, where he was received and Complimented by the Marquis *Borri* Governour of that place: His Excellency went from thence in one of the Great Dukes Coaches to *Pisa*, and lay that Night at a Palace of the Dukes at *Poncedera*; And the next day at *Empoli* he received a Compliment from the Great Duke by a Gentleman sent on purpose. At *Lajira* 7 Leagues from hence, Count *Magalotti* expected his Excellency with fresh Coaches; and without the Gate at *Florence*, he was met by Don *Gaston* the Dukes younger Son (the Prince not being in Town) and Conducted by him to the Palace; At his Entrance into the Town, he was Saluted by the Lower Fortress, and at his arrival at the Palace by the Upper Fortress, the Great Duke met his Excellency at the Gate of the Palace; and Conducted him to the Apartment provided for him: The next day being the 29th of *May*, he had his publick Audience of the Duke, and yesterday of the Duchess Dowager at *Poggio Imperiale*. The Prince, so soon as he came to Town, made his Excellency a Visit with his Brother Don *Gaston*, which he has returned; And this day his Excellency Dined with the Great Duke, the Entertainment being most Magnificent in all the Circumstances of it. His Excellency will be Treated here in the Palace six days, not reckoning the day of his arrival or departure.

Naples, June 5. The Marquis *de Coghulido*, Ambassador Extraordinary from his Catholick Majesty to the Pope, is still here in expectation of farther Orders from *Spain*, upon the occasion of an Express he hath received from *Rome*, acquainting him; That he must relinquish his Pretensions to the Franchises before he can be admitted into the Pope's Territories.

Venice, June 7. The Bishop of *Primsilia*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of *Poland* to this State, made his publick Entry into this City on the 26th past, and had his First Audience of the Senate on the 28th following, he made but a short stay here, and the 4th Instant he parted for *Rome*: The same day the Prince of *Brunswick* sailed from hence for the *Mexen*, with 16 Vessels under his Convoy, carrying 2200 Soldiers, 140 Slaves for the Gallies, 60 Gunners, besides several Masons and Carpenters, with all sorts of Provisions and Ammunition; As also 120000 Sequins in Gold, and a considerable Sum in Silver: We have Advice; that General *Morosini* having Notice that the Ottoman

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leet was come as far as the Island of *Mytilene*; He set sail from *Sapientza*, and took his Course towards the *Archipelago* to go and meet them.

Lemberg, May 28. The *Sieur Bielinski Statoffe de Maréchalburg*, Envoy from his Crown to the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, is returned hither, and has given the King an Account, That his Electoral Highness will send 2200 Foot and 300 Horse drawn out of his old Troops to the Assistance of this Crown, upon Condition, that they be constantly paid out of the Money remitted from *Rome* to Cardinal *Ralavicini* the Pope's Nuncio at this Court. The Tartars have made an Incurfion as far as *Eufis*, but finding that Garifon in a readines to receive them, they retired upon the first shot made from the Town; Yet they did great mischief in their return about *Jaslawitz* and *Podback*, carrying away several Prisoners, and great store of Cattle: They also burn'd a Village belonging to the *Sieur Jablanowski*, Crown-General, and routed two Companies of Soldiers, taking some of the Officers Prisoners. Since which Invasion, the Crown-General has been in those Parts to give Orders for Reinforcing the Frontier Garifons, which are now augmented to two thirds more than they were before. Orders have been sent to the Great General of *Lithuania*, to hasten the march of his Troops to the general Rendezvous, which is appointed to be on the 10th of the next month. Within two days the Queen will begin her Journey for the Baths in *Silesia*.

Gren, June 9. The Imperial Troops as fast as they arrive here are sent as well by Water as Land towards *Buda*, near which place the Duke of *Lorraine* was encamped yesterday with 18 Regiments.

Vienna, June 15. The Elector of *Bavaria* has been indisposed since his arrival here, but is at present pretty well again; His Electoral Highness intends to part hence the next week for *Hungary*. We have an account from *Buda* that the Duke of *Lorraine*, after having visited the Magazines and Fortifications of that place, went from thence the 4th instant to *Old Buda*, where several Imperial Regiments of Horse and Foot were arriv'd; That in the mean time the Bridge of Boats between *Buda* and *Pest* was finish'd for the conveniency of the Foragers; That the 8th his Highness decamp'd and march'd towards the River *Sarowitz*, which he pass'd the 9th, with a resolution to advance with 12000 Horse directly towards the Bridge of *Essecke*, leaving Orders for the Foot to follow him. We have likewise advice that the Imperial Forces on the *Drava* were marching towards *Fjos Churches*; and that General *Caraffa* was encamp'd with 12 Regiments at *Onod*, to observe the Ottoman Troops post'd at *Pater Waradin*. The Turks continue to work with all possible diligence for the repairing the Bridge of *Essecke*, and several Bassa's lye with the Troops under their command at *Darda* and *Essecke*, for the security of their Workmen; The Grand Vicer is still at *Beldgrade*. A Party of the *Capifins* and *Fiza Charbesi* have taken 200 Oxen and 100 Horses from within the Walls of *Wepo*, and burnt divers Houses in the Neighborhood; the Turks who came out of the Town to oppose them, being beaten back with the loss of between 60 and 70 men; on our side there were only three killed, and seven seven wounded. General *Hensler* has likewise had a Rencontre with a party of the Garifon of *Arila*, of whom 100 were killed, and 45 taken prisoner. *Wynegiz* is blocked up by 500 Horse, and 2000 German and Hungarian Foot.

Hamburg, June 24. The last Letters from *Poland* gave an Account, That the Forces of *Lithuania* were joined with those of the Crown; That 5000 Cossacks were likewise on their march

to join them. And that the King was gone to the Army to Command it in Person, as he had done during the former Campaigns.

Hague, June 27. The Deputies of the Admiralties are gone home again, after having had several Conferences with those of the *States-General*. Several Frigats are gone to Sea, and others are preparing to follow for the Security of our Commerce against the Algerines. Don *Emanuel Colonna*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of *Spain*, is expected here the next week.

Brussels, June 25. Yesterday according to Custom the Magistrates of this City were changed. Don *Francisco Henriquez de Avelos* is arriv'd here from *Spain*, to enter upon his Office of *Veedor General*.

Paris, June 28. The Marquis de *Lovardin*, the King's Ambassador to the Pope, has Orders to begin forthwith his Journey to *Rome*. The King appointed five Councillors of State, and five Masters of Requests, who are to go and take an exact Account of the State of the Provinces, and the Conduct of those that are employed in the Receipt of the King's Revenues. The King has given the Government of *Hauve de Grace* to the Duke de *Beauwilliers*, Son to the late Duke of *St. Aignan*. The Troops of the King's Household are to Encamp the 15th of the next month in the Plain of *Acheres*. They write from *Yboulon*, that three Ships more are fitting out there, which are to join the Squadron Commanded by the Duke de *Mortemar*. We have an Account from *Cadix* of the departure of the *New Spain Fleet*.
