pink,) and that the said parts of the new parish so dissevered therefrom as last-mentioned, should be re-annexed to, and again form part of the parish of Saint James, Paddington aforesaid.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed alteration of the boundaries of the new parish of Christ Church, Paddington, in the county of Middlesex, be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the "laws concerning the burial of the dead in "England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discon-

tinuance of burials in such churchyards and burialgrounds be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In family vaults and graves in the churchyard of All Saints, Chorlton, in MANCHESTER, from the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, provided that every such vault or grave be re-opened only for the burial of widowers, widows, parents, children, brothers, or sisters of those previously buried therein, and provided that each coffin be embedded in charcoal, and entombed in an air-tight

burial-grounds in that consolidated chapelry, from the first of July to the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; and, in the meantime, one body only shall be buried in each grave, and no grave that has been buried in shall be re-opened, unless it be free from remains, and not less than four feet deep, except a vault or walled grave in which the coffins are entombed in an air-tight manner.

In the parish churchyard of Dalston, Cumberland, with the exceptions, and on the conditions, contained in an Order in Council of the seventh of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, from the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, to the first of January, one thousand eight hun-

dred and sixty-two.

In the parish churchyard of OTLEY, Yorkshire, from the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and

sixty-two.

In the churchyard of St. Mary, BATTLE, from the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixtytwo, on the same conditions as those contained in an Order in Council of the thirtieth of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in respect of the said churchyard and burial-grounds.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the. twenty-fourth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, burials were directed to be discontinued (with certain exceptions) in the churchyard of St. Bartholomew, BIRMINGHAM, on and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight; and whereas, by another Order in Council of the twentieth of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, burials were directed to be discontinued on and after the said thirty-first of December in the churchyards or cemeteries of St. Martin and St. Paul, BrR-MINGHAM, except as was therein excepted, which Orders have since been varied, and the time for discontinuing burials has been extended to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, by an Order in Council of the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty; and whereas it seems fit that the said lastmentioned Order should be varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that interments in the churchyards of St. Bartholomew, St. Martin, and St. Paul, BIRMINGHAM, be discontinued on the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, except in vaults and walled graves existing on the twentieth of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately entombed in an air-tight manner; and that, in the meantime, only one body be buried in each grave, that no grave that has been buried in be re-opened, except to inter another member of the same family, and unless the grave be free from remains to the depth of five feet.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, two former Orders in Council of the second of December, one thousand eight hundred and fiftyseven, and third of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, relating to burials in the General Cemetery and Church of England Cemein the Ebenezer and Irwell Terrace Chapel I tery, Birmingham, were varied, and the operation
