Venice, June 14. The Moscovite Ambastador, who lately arrived at the Lido, has been conducted from

thence to the Palace provided for him in this City, and will have have his Audience of the Senate on Monday next. The remainder of the Troops of Have er amounting to 2500 Men are arrived here, and will part within few days for the Merea with 200 Horte, which have been here fince Monday laft; with whom also goes the General d' Aurla, and the Count St. Felice, and we are in daily expectation of the Regiment raised by the Landgrave of Hesse. The Pope's and Maltese Gallies arriving at Corfu, they met there with Orders from General Morofini to continue their Voyage to Climno, which is the place appointed for the general Rendezvous of the Auxiliary Forces. They write from the Morea, that she Serasquier was very intent upon the fortifying of Patrasso; and that a Party of 400 Foot of the Garison of Navarin meeting with another of the Enemies of a far greater number, they had attacked them with fo much resolution, that they return'd Victorious, bringing back with them several prisonets, 130 Heads of those that were slain, and good store of Cattle. We have advice from Dalmaria, that there were about 5000 Turks moving to and again towards Opusch (which had been lately supply'd with all things necessary by the Proveditore-General Cornaro) and that they expected the coming up of other Troops to make in all 13000

Buda, June 10. The Duke of Lorrain arrived here the 4th Instant, and was received with three Difcharges of the Artillery of this Place; The next day he affifted at a Solemn Procession, together with the General Officers, both of the Army and Garison; After which, he was to visit the Old and New Fortifications, as well without as within the Town, which he found well advanc'd, and in a good condition. On the 6th, his Highness went to Old Buda, where were arrived 24 Regiments of House and Foot; And the same day the Bridge between Buda and Pest was finish'd. On the 7th the Army decamp'd and march'd towards the River Sarowitz, where they arrived the 8th. And the next day his Highness continued his March with 12000 Horse directly towards Effeck, leaving Orders for the Foot and the rest of the Hosse to follow him. In the mean time we hear that the Turks are very bufie in repair-They the Bridge of Effecke, which they hoped to finish in 8 days; and that the Grand Visier had sent from Belgrade feveral Troops to reinforce those that were already posted on each fide of the Drave, under the Command of 4 Bassa's. General Dunewaldt who Commands the Imperial Forces on the Drave (over which River he has laid a Bridge) is on his march towards Five Churches, in order to joyn the Duke of Lorrain. General Caraffa continues about Oned with 12 Regiments of Horse and Foot, besides Hungarians, to observe the Enemy, who are posted at Peter Waradin. And the Regiments that are now upon the Frontiers of Transylvania have Orders to

joyn him.
- Vienna, Jame 19. The Elector of Bavaria partto Command the Army there. The Duke of Lorrdin having given all necessary Orders to the Baron de Beck Governor of Buda, concerning the Fortifi-eations of that place (the Lower Town whereof, with the Vienna Gate, and Water-Town are to be flighted) On the 9th Inflant he Commanded the Infantry of the Imperial Army to march to Adon, two Leagues beyond Bida on the way to Efficke; and the next day he followd in Person with the Horse. His Highness continued his march the 11th and 12th Instant along the fide of the Danube., that he might have the conveniency of Boats to attend him with Provisions: And according to our last advices, his Highness was encamp'd the 10th Instant at Tolna. We have advice, that the Duke of L rrain being informed that 8000 Turks, with 400 Tartars had passed the Danube on the Bidge at Peter Waradin, with

Orders to attempt the relief of Agria at any rate, had given Notice of it to Count Caraffa, with directions to be very careful to observe their motions. And there is a report that a Body of Thrks advan eing towards the Theysse, over which River they had laid a Bridge, they were attackt by the Imperialists, and put to hight, 100 of them being killed, and teveral prisoners taken, with their Carnon and Baggage; and that the Imperialitis had postest them-

selves of their Bridge over the The sse.

Brussels, June 27. They write from Francfire, that Prince Leaves of No. bong, Great Master of the Teutonick Order, and Prince, Phi ip Il'illiam his Brother, were both gone to pass the Campagne in Ilungary. And by an Express of the 19th Instant from Vienna we are told, that the Elector of Bavaria parted from thence on the 18th, to Com-

Hague, Juy 1. The Heer Hee, Envoy Extraordinary from this State to the Elector of Branden. bung, will in few days begin his Journey to Berlin. Yetterday passed in fight of Sciocveling, two Duich men of War, coming from the Midele, who with severel others that are now at Sea, are to cruise to the Northwards for the fecurity of our Commerce.
