H E many and great Sufferings which we have fultained for feveral years paft, and the Apprehensions which we had, that our Troubles would still have encreased upon us, caused us to fear, that they would not have ended short of the ruin of us and our Families. In which Your Majesty bath Voluntarily, and of Your own Goodness, Granted us all that our Hearts could wish.

Now, that the God of Heaven will grassoufly Recompence into Your Bofom, all the Bleffings of the diffressed; That Your Government may be easing 'above all Your Royal Ancestors, to the convincing the whole World, that Your Majefty in this General Liberty hath fixed upon such Principles as are able to support their own Weight. And that the Wildom of the Nation, when they shall meet in Your Two Houfes of Parliament, will chearfully agree to pray Your Majefty, that all this may be confirmed unto the present and after Ages by Lam. That a universal Smile may appear in the Faces of all Your Lowng Subjetts, having now nothing to do but to Fear God Honour the King, and every one to be chearfully industrious in his Calling. And that from the multual Happiness both of Prince and People, the Remoin of Your Majesties just and wise Government, may spread throughout all the World: That Your Majefties Reign over us may be long : And that God would blefs Your Majefty, and Your Royal Posterity, with all Bleffings both Temporal and Eterna.

Léghorne, June 11. A Veffel arrived here from Smyrna met the Pope's and Maltele Gallies on their way towards the Levant; They parted from Mellina the 20th of the laft month: And the 25th, the Gallies of the Great Duke of Thlcany arrived there: And by the faine Veffel we have Advice, that feveral new raifed Troops were arrived at Smyrna, who having received their Pay, were fent from thence to Constantinople. The Baffa of Napoli dt Romania is come from Venuce to Florence, with a Retinue of obout 40 Perfons; He is expected here in few days, to embarque from hence for Barbary.

Rome, June 14. The Marquis de Cogolludo, Ambaffador Extraordinary from the Crown of Spain, having thought fit to expect the return of a Courier he has fent into Spain, before he undertakes his Journcy hither, he has in the mean time appointed Don Frederick Sforza, to make the ufual Prefents to his Holinefs on St. Peter's Eve, in Acknowledgement of the Homage due for the Kingdom of Naples. The Sieur Seylez, Envoy from the Elector Palatin to the Pope, is lately arrived here.

Venice, June 14. By a Vessel arrived from Zant, we are informed, that the Seralquier of the Mirea had taken the Field with 10000 Men, and that it was believed he had a defign upon Napoli di Reina-, nia. That General Morofini having left Orders for the Landing of the Troops that were to be fent from hence to St. Mair, was failed with the Gallies to-wards the Archipelago to join the Sieur Venier, who commands the Fleet. That the last Convoy with Ammunition and Provisions arrived at Corfu in 7days after they parted from hence. That 400 Foot of the Garifon of Navarin, had beat a Party That 400 of Turks, killing many and bringing away feveral Prifoners. By a Veffel from Dalmatia, we have advice, that the Baffa of Arcegovina (who was marching towards Narenta with his Troops) had not yet made any attempt upon the Fortrefs of Opufch ; But fince the Proveditor-General Cornaro had fent the Count de St. Paul with fome Troops that way: He feemed rather to intrend intrenching himfelf at the Tower of Norin, and to fend out Parties only to oppose the Morlaques. In the mean. time the Balla of Bufnia continues at Clim with 400 Horfe and 200 Foot, as well to wafte the Territory of Zara, as to put a ftop to the Excursions of the Morlaques, who have been abroad in feveral Parties, and lately one of them commanded by the Chevalier Janco, met with a Convoy, which they attacked, and carryed away 60 Horles

Horses laden with Provisions, besides several Prisoners.

Warfait, June 6. The Letters from Jawaraw tell us theKing had been fomewhat Indifpoied ; And that the youngest of the three Princes had been Christned these, and Named Maximilian Phillsppe Vladiflat, by the Cardinal Radzicurski. And that the Palatin of Kinesia had fent 18 pieces of Cannon, and good ftore of Ammunition to Tarnopol, where the Polish Army continued encamped; And that a Detachement from thence had met with a confiderable Party of Tartars, which they routed, taking feveral Prifoners, the most confiderable whereor were fent to the King. They write from Leopoldstat, that the Turks were gathering together in great numbers in the Ukrain. The Troops of Lithuaria have now joined the Polish Army, which is alto augmented with between 4 and 5000 Coffacks.

Vienna, Fune 19. We have this following Lift of the Imperial Army Commanded by the Duke of Lorrain: The Infantry confifts of the Regiments of Count Ernest de Seuremberg, Leslé, Keyserstein, Croy, Baden, Mansfeld, Salms, Maximilian de Staremberg, Serini, Neubbourg, Souches, Scherfemberg, Stadel, Diepenthal, Ihingen, Meternich, Beck, Wallis, Afpremont, Nigrelli, Heufler, Averfperg, the Prince of Lorrain, Houfchin, Furstemberg, Straffer, and Guy de Staremberg; The Complement or these Regiments is 1 500 Men each, except Maximilian Sturemberg's, and Stadel's, which are 2000 Men each. The Cavalry is composed of the Regiments of Saze Lawmbourg, Caprara, Dime-nº ld, Palfi, Caraffa, Gondola, Tuaff, Newbourg, Montecuculi, Veterani, Picolumini, Heusler, Commercy, Gotz, Hanouer, St. Croix, Fuffemberg, Pax, and Trucky; And they are of 800 Men each. The Regiments of Dragoons are those of Lodron, Stinum, Caftelli, Serau, Herleville, Su-voy, Thun, Magni, and Curfe; which are also be of 800 Men, except the first which ought to have 1100.

Heydelbarg, June 24. On Monday next the Mar-quis de V. Ila Mayor, Extraordinary Amballador from the Crown of Poreigal, will make his publick Entry into this City; And the next day he is to have his Audience of his Electoral Highnels, to demand the Princel's Maria Sophia in Marriage for the King his Malter.

Cologue, June 27. The Cardinal of Furflemberg is gone to make a visit to the Elector at Bonne; And Our in a few days he will return again to Lacge. last Letters from Vienna brought Advice of the Duke of Lorrain's march on the 8th Juliant towards Efficke, and that on the 14th, the Imperial That the Army was advanced as far as Tolna. Troops upon the Drave, commanded by General D.mem.d.l, confi. ing of the Regiments of Newbourg, Monte cuculs, Afprement, Heufler, and Herbeville, were the 5th Inliant at Verouisz, and the 7th at Turanouitz, and having laid a Bridge there over the Drave, they passed the River, and joining the Melitia of Croatia, they marched together towards Five Churcher. We have a Confirmation of Major-General Ihungen's Expedition to Valpe, : And it it is further added, That the faid General having fince met with a confiderable Party of the Enemy that had paffed the Drave, and were advancing towards Five Churches, he had routed them, many of the Turks being killed, and feveral taken Prifoners: By whom he was informed, that there were 3 Bal-fa's who had the Care of the Repair of the Bridge of Effecte, which was profecuted with all poffible diligence, and that fresh Troops arrived there daily from Be grade to reinforce them. They write from Upper Hungary, that Count Caraffa had employed all fitting Care for fupplying the Army about Zo'nock with Provisions, and that 140 Boats laden with all things necessary, were arrived at Torkay on their way to Zolnock: And that the Boats when unladen, were intended to be made use of to make Bridges over the Theyffe as there shall be occasion. General Heusler keeps the Garifon of Agria in continual Exercise, for fince the Skirmish he had with them on the 9th Instant (which is now confirmed) wherein he brought away 113 Turks heads, and 45 Prifoners. He had been abroad with a Party on the 11th, and the Turks Sallying out upon him, he beat them back, killing 11, and carrying away feveral Priloners: By whom it is confirmed, that that Garifon is reduced almost to extremity for want of Provisions, and that they are forced to eat Horfes

and Do's for want of other Suftenance. Pars, July 5. The King went on Wednefday laft to Marli, and returned again to Verfailles ye-The Sieur d' Aubeuslie, Envoy Extraorfterday. dinary from this Crown to the Republick of Genoua, dyed there the 12th of the last month in the 77th year of his Age; And his Majefty has appointed the Sieur du Pre to succeed him in that employment. We have advice of the Duke of Mortemar's arrival at Alicant with the Ships under his Command.
