THE following Address hath been Presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble and Thankful Address of many of Your Majesties Loyal Subjects, commonly called Anabaptists, met together in the City of London, from the Counties of Middlesex, Hertford, Bucks, Oxon, Warwick, Northampton, Lincoln, Huntington, Bedford, Cambridge, Essex, Kent, Surrey, Sussex, Southampton, and Dorset.

May it Please Your Majesty,

WE many and great Sufferings which we have sustained for several years past, and the Apprehensions which we had, that our Troubles would still have increased upon us, caused us to fear, that they would not have ended short of the ruin of us and our Families. But the All-wise God, whose Providence is over all, hath Graciously disposed Your Majesties tender Heart to consider the Groanings of the distressed; and unexpectedly to interpose between us and those threatening Calamities, by Your never highly enough to be valued Clemency; expressed in Your most Gracious Declaration for Liberty of Conscience. In which Your Majesty hath Voluntarily, and of Your own Goodness, Granted us all that our Hearts could wish.

Great SIR, Under the strongest Obligations of Gratitude, we come to Your Feet with Hearts filled with Joy, to render our unfeigned Thanks for this general Ease and Quiet, which we, and all other of Your Majesties Subjects now enjoy; and of which Your Majesty hath given Assurance by Your Royal Word, unto us and all Your Subjects during Your whole Reign.

Now, that the God of Heaven will graciously Repentance into Your Bosom, all the Blessings of the distressed; That Your Government may be ease above all Your Royal Ancestors, to the convincing the whole World, that Your Majesty in this General Liberty hath fixed upon such Principles as are able to support their own Weight. And that the Wisdom of the Nation, when they shall meet in Your Two Houses of Parliament, will cheerfully agree to pray Your Majesty, that all this may be confirmed unto the present and after Ages by Law. That a universal Smile may appear in the Faces of all Your Loving Subjects, having now nothing to do but to Fear God Honour the King, and every one to be cheerfully industrious in his Calling. And that from the mutual Happiness both of Prince and People, the Reputation of Your Majesties just and wise Government, may spread throughout all the World: That Your Maje-

sties Reign over us may be long: And that God would bless Your Majesty, and Your Royal Posterity, with all Blessings both Temporal and Everna.

Légborne, June 11. A Vessel arrived here from Smyrna met the Pope's and Maltese Gallies on their way towards the Levant; They parted from Messina the 20th of the last month: And the 25th, the Gallies of the Great Duke of Tuscany arrived there: And by the same Vessel we have Advice, that several new raised Troops were arrived at Smyrna, who having received their Pay, were sent from thence to Constantinople. The Bassa of Napoli di Romania is come from Venice to Florence, with a Retinue of about 40 Persons; He is expected here in few days, to embark from hence for Barbary.

Rome, June 14. The Marquis de Cogoludo, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of Spain, having thought fit to expect the return of a Courier he has sent into Spain, before he undertakes his Journey hither, he has in the mean time appointed Don Frederick Sforza, to make the usual Presents to his Holiness on St. Peter's Eve, in Acknowledgement of the Homage due for the Kingdom of Naples. The Sieur Seylez, Envoy from the Elector Palatin to the Pope, is lately arrived here.

Venice, June 14. By a Vessel arrived from Zant, we are informed, that the Serafquier of the Mirea had taken the Field with 10000 Men, and that it was believed he had a design upon Napoli di Romania. That General Morosini having left Orders for the Landing of the Troops that were to be sent from hence to St. Maurizio, was sailed with the Gallies towards the Archipelago to join the Sieur Venier, who commands the Fleet. That the last Convoy with Ammunition and Provisions arrived at Corfu in 7 days after they parted from hence. That 400 Foot of the Garison of Navarin, had beat a Party of Turks, killing many and bringing away several Prisoners. By a Vessel from Dalmatia, we have advice, that the Bassa of Arcegovina (who was marching towards Narenta with his Troops) had not yet made any attempt upon the Fortresses of Opuscb; But since the Proveditor-General Cornaro had sent the Count de St. Paul with some Troops that way: He seemed rather to intrend intrenching himself at the Tower of Novin, and to send out Parties only to oppose the Morlaques. In the mean time the Bassa of Bosnia continues at Chim with 400 Horse and 200 Foot, as well to waste the Territory of Zara, as to put a stop to the Excursions of the Morlaques, who have been abroad in several Parties, and lately one of them commanded by the Chevalier Janco, met with a Convoy, which they attacked, and carried away 60 Horses

Horses laden with Provisions, besides several Prisoners.

Warsaw, June 6. The Letters from *Jawarw* tell us the King had been somewhat indisposed; And that the youngest of the three Princes had been Christned there, and Named *Maximilian Philippe Vladislas*, by the Cardinal *Radzicki*. And that the Palatin of *Kjonia* had sent 18 pieces of Cannon, and good store of Ammunition to *Tarnopol*, where the Polish Army continued encamped; And that a Detachment from thence had met with a considerable Party of Tartars, which they routed, taking several Prisoners, the most considerable whereof were sent to the King. They write from *Leopoldstar*, that the Turks were gathering together in great numbers in the *Ukrain*. The Troops of *Lituania* have now joined the Polish Army, which is also augmented with between 4 and 5000 Cossacks.

Vienna, June 19. We have this following List of the Imperial Army Commanded by the Duke of *Lorrain*: The Infantry consists of the Regiments of Count *Ernest de Staremberg*, *Leslé*, *Keyserlein*, *Croy*, *Baden*, *Mansfeld*, *Salms*, *Maximilian de Staremberg*, *Serini*, *Newbourg*, *Souches*, *Scherfemberg*, *Stadel*, *Diepenthal*, *Ibingen*, *Meternich*, *Beck*, *Wallis*, *Aspremont*, *Nigrelli*, *Heussler*, *Aversperg*, the Prince of *Lorrain*, *Houfchim*, *Furstenberg*, *Straffer*, and *Guy de Staremberg*; The Complement of these Regiments is 1500 Men each, except *Maximilian Staremberg's*, and *Stadel's*, which are 2000 Men each. The Cavalry is composed of the Regiments of *Saxe Lawembourg*, *Caprara*, *Dimevild*, *Palfi*, *Caraffa*, *Gondola*, *Taaff*, *Newbourg*, *Montecuculi*, *Veterani*, *Piccolomini*, *Heussler*, *Commercy*, *Gozz*, *Hanouer*, *St. Croix*, *Furstenberg*, *Pax*, and *Trucks*; And they are of 800 Men each. The Regiments of Dragoons are those of *Ledron*, *Schim*, *Castelli*, *Serau*, *Herleville*, *Suvoy*, *Thun*, *Magni*, and *Cirsei*; which are also of 800 Men, except the first which ought to have 1100.

Heydelberg, June 24. On Monday next the Marquis de *Villa Mayor*, Extraordinary Ambassador from the Crown of *Portugal*, will make his publick Entry into this City; And the next day he is to have his Audience of his Electoral Highness, to demand the Princess *Maria Sophia* in Marriage for the King his Master.

Cologne, June 27. The Cardinal of *Furstenberg* is gone to make a visit to the Elector at *Bowie*; And in a few days he will return again to *Liege*. Our last Letters from *Vienna* brought Advice of the Duke of *Lorrain's* march on the 8th Instant towards *Essicke*, and that on the 14th, the Imperial Army was advanced as far as *Taina*. That the Troops upon the *Drave*, commanded by General *Demenil*, consisting of the Regiments of *Newbourg*, *Montecuculi*, *Aspremont*, *Heussler*, and *Herleville*, were the 5th Instant at *Verouitz*, and the 7th at *Turamowitz*, and having laid a Bridge there over the *Drave*, they passed the River, and joining the *Melitia* of *Croatia*, they marched together towards *Five Churches*. We have a Confirmation of Major-General *Thunnen's* Expedition to *Valpe*: And it is further added, That the said General having since met with a considerable Party of the Enemy that had passed the *Drave*, and were advancing towards *Five Churches*, he had routed them, many of the Turks being killed, and several taken Prisoners: By whom he was informed, that there were 3 Balfas's who had the Care of the Repair of the Bridge of *Essicke*, which was prosecuted with all possible diligence, and that fresh Troops arrived there daily from *Be grade* to reinforce them. They write from *Upper Hungary*, that Count *Caraffa* had employed all fitting Care for supplying the Army about *Zolnock* with Provisions, and that 140 Boats laden with all things necessary, were arrived at *Tockay* on their way to *Zolnock*: And that the Boats when unladen, were intended to be made use of to make Bridges over the *Theysse*: as there shall be occasion. Gene-

ral *Heussler* keeps the Garrison of *Agria* in continual Exercise, for since the Skirmish he had with them on the 9th Instant (which is now confirmed) wherein he brought away 113 Turks heads, and 45 Prisoners. He had been abroad with a Party on the 11th, and the Turks Sallying out upon him, he beat them back, killing 11, and carrying away several Prisoners: By whom it is confirmed, that that Garrison is reduced almost to extremity for want of Provisions, and that they are forced to eat Horses and Dogs for want of other Sustenance.

Paris, July 5. The King went on Wednesday last to *Marli*, and returned again to *Versailles* yesterday. The Sieur d' *Aubouvie*, Envoy Extraordinary from this Crown to the Republick of *Genoua*, dyed there the 12th of the last month in the 77th year of his Age; And his Majesty has appointed the Sieur du *Pre* to succeed him in that employment. We have advice of the Duke of *Mortemar's* arrival at *Alicant* with the Ships under his Command.

Whereas the Post from Tunbridge has never yet come from thence on Mondays during the Season of Drinking the Waters there: It is Ordered, that for the future, it shall come from thence for London on Mondays, as well as on every other day of the week.
