A PROCLAMATION

For Dissolving this present Parliament.

JAMES R.

WHEREAS this Parliament which was Summoned to begin at Westminster the Nineteenth day of May 1685. hath by several Prorogations been continued to the Twenty Second day of November next ensuing: The King's most Excellent Majesty for weighty Reasons hath thought fit to Dissolve this present Parliament, and doth by this His Royal Proclamation Dissolve the same accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses of this present Parliament are hereby Discharged from their Meeting on the said Twenty Second day of November next ensuing.

Given at Our Court at Hampton-Court the Second day of July 1687. In the Third year of Our Reign.

Here arrive daily the new raised Men that are intended as Recruits for the Army, and are to be disposed of in the several Regiments to make up two Companies more in each Regiment: And as fast as any of them come hither; the old Companies are proportionably drawn out to be sent to the Army.
