

Feutwar, eight Leagues from hence, having there received certain advice, that a Body of about 10000 Turks had passed the Danube near Peter Waradin, with Orders from the Grand Visier to attempt the relief of Agria, and that it was believ'd, that he was himself following in Person: His Highness hereupon immediately assembled a Council of War, where it was resolv'd, that the Army should return to Tolna, and that a Bridge of Boats should be made there over the Danube, for the convenience of joining the two Armies as there should be occasion. And at the same time it was order'd that an Express should be dispatched to the Elector of Bavaria to give him Notice hereof, and to press his Highness to quicken his march to the Army in Upper Hungary, there to oppose the Enemies designs. And it is also said, that the Ottoman Troops begin to be in motion about Great Waradin.

Vienna, June 22. Two Regiments of Foot belonging to the Circle of Suabia, consisting of 3000 Men in 20 Companies, under the Command of Prince Baden Dourlach, arriv'd here the 19th Instant, and were encamped that night in the Island of Tabor: The next day they march'd into this City in two Battalions, and were Exercis'd before the Palace, to the great Satisfaction of his Imperial Majesty: And the next day they continu'd their march down the Danube towards Hungary. The Elector of Bavaria, who parted from hence the 17th Instant, arriv'd at Buda the 19th; And the next day pass'd the River towards Pest, with Intention to go in all haste to Zolnock; His Electoral Highness having received advice from the Duke of Lorraine, that the Turks had pass'd the Danube over their Bridge at Peter Waradin, and were marching with Cannon and Waggon's laden with Provisions towards Agria.

Vienna, June 26. The Duke of Lorraine has alter'd his Resolution of passing the Danube to join the Elector of Bavaria, and now intends as soon as the Bridge is finish'd over the River near Tolna, with small Forts for the security thereof, to leave 2000 Hungarians and some Companies of Germans for its defence, and continue his march with the rest of the Army towards *Essfcke*; Having sent Orders in the mean time to General *Dunwald*, that he should, in conjunction with Count *Scherffenberg* and Count *de Thun*, endeavour to destroy what the Turks have been repairing of the Bridge of *Essfcke*. The Duke of Lorraine received advice by a Dragoon arriv'd yesterday from *Upper Hungary*, That the Elector of Bavaria was arriv'd at *Zolnock*, and entred upon the Command of the Army (which was 12000 strong;) That the Turks who had lately pass'd the Danube and the *Theysse*, upon Notice of his Highness's arrival, and his beginning to march towards them, were retreated back over the *Theysse*. In the mean time the Turks and Tartars were continually making Excursions between the *Theysse* and the Danube. A Party of about 4000 Tartars who (as it is believ'd) were marching to the relief of *Agria*, each Man having behind him a Sack of Meal on his Horse, met on their way with General *Husser*, who attack'd them so vigorously, that he killed 600 of them, but the rest by the goodness of their Horses escap'd to *Keskenme*, leaving behind them, for halfe, most of their Provisions. His Grace the Duke of *Berwick* is arriv'd here on his way to the Army.

Hamburgh, July 4. His Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark* arriv'd yesterday at *Gluckstadt*, and went this day to *Itzehoe* on his way to *Copenhagen*. They write from *Moscow*, that the Inhabitants of *Kiev* making their usual annual Procession to *Pieczarow* in great numbers, and with a strong Convoy, were attack'd in the way by the Tartars, who killed 5000 of them upon the place, and carried away most of the rest Prisoners.

Brussels, July 8. Our last Advices from *Hungary* are, that the Duke of Lorraine march'd with the Imperial Army on the 19th past, and encamp'd that night at *Buttesfck*, where he intend'd to pass the *Sarnutz* on his march to *Essfcke*. That the Army on the *Drava*, with the Militia of *Croatia*, and the Troops Commanded by General *Dunewald* making in all 16000 Men; were marching likewise to join the Duke of Lorraine, whose Army upon the

arrival of the said Troops would amount to above 50000 Men.

Windſor, June 28. Captain *William Phipps* being this day Presented to the King by his Grace the Duke of *Sibmarle*, His Majesty received him very Graciously, and was pleas'd to Confer upon him the Honour of Knighthood, in Consideration of his Loyalty and good Services in a late Expedition, having brought home a very considerable Treasure which was taken out of the Sea, after it had lain there 44 years.
