Vienna, June 22. The Elector of Bavaria, who parted from hence the 17th Inflant, arrived at Buda the 19th; And the next day palled the River towards Pett, with Intention to go in all hafte to Zolnock; His Electoral Highness having received advice from the Duke of Lorrain, that the Tirks had palled the Danube over their Bridge at Peter Wardin and parted to the Party had been and the Care and the Ca Waradin, and were marching with Cannon and Waggons la-den with Provisions towards Agria.

Vienna, June 26. The Duke of Lorrain has altered his Resolution of passing the Danube to join the Elector of Bavaria, and now intends as foon as the Bridge is finished over the River near Tolna, with (mall Forts for the security thereof, to leave 2000 Hungarians and some Companies of Germans for its defence, and continue his march with the rest of the Army towards Efficke; Having sent Oiders in the mean time to General Dun wald, that he should, in conjunction with Count Scherffenberg and Count de Thun, endeavour to destroy what the Turks have been repairing of the Bridge of Effecke. The Duke of Lorrain received advice by a Dragoon arrived yesterday from Upper Hung ry, That the Elector of Bavaria was arrived at Zolno.ke, and entred upon the Command of the Army (which was 12000 strong;) That the Turks who had lately passed the Danube and the Theyssi, upon Notice of his Highnesses arrival, and his beginning to march towards them, were retreated back over the Theysse. In the mean time the Turks and Tartais were continually making Excursions between the Theysse and the Danube. A Party of about 4000 Tartars who (as it is believed) were marching to the relief of Agria, each Man having behind him a Sack of Meal on his Horse, met on their way with General Houfler, who attacked them so vigoroufly, that he killed 600 of them, but the rest by the goodness of their Hortes escaped to Keskeme', leaving behind them, for hatte, most of their Provisions. His Grace the Duke of Berwick is arrived here on his way to the Army.

Hamlurgh, July 4. His Royal Highness Prince George of Dimnirk arrived yesterday at Glickstal, and went this day to lizeboc on his way to Copen-They write from Moscovy, that the Inhabitants of Ks. vis making their usual annual Proceision to Pieczarow in great numbers, and with a throng Convoy, were attacked in the way by the Taitars, who killed 5000 of them upon the place, and carried away most of the rest Prisoners.

Brussels, July 8. Our last Advices from Hungary are, that the Duke of Lorrain marched with the Imperial Army on the 19th past, and encamped that night at Battefeck, where he intended to pass the Sarnutz on his march to Effecke. That the Army on the Dr. ve, with the Militia of Croatia, and the Troops Commanded by General Dunewald making in all 16000 Men, were marching likewife to join the Duke of Lorrain, whose Army uppon the

arrival of the faid Troops would amount to above 50000 Men.
