

**COURT FOR RELIEF OF INSOLVENT DEBTORS.**

Richard Gittins, formerly of No. 299, Oxford-street, Foreman to a Brush Maker, and now of No. 26, Great Castle-street, Cavendish-square, both in Middlesex, Brush-Maker and Brush Maker's Shopman.

James Prier, of North-street, Barking, Essex, Grocer, Cheesemonger, and Chandler's Shop-keeper.

Thomas Reesley, formerly of No. 4, St. Martin's-place, Camden Town, St. Pancras, having offices for part of the time, at No. 53, Moorgat-street, in the city of London, and No. 356, Strand, and afterwards at No. 6, Salisbury-street, Strand, and now of No. 55, White Lion-street, Islington, all in Middlesex, Accountant.

William Watkins (sued with H. Marriott, J. Pettie, W. Joanes, William O'Brien, W. J. Hart, Thomas Heseltine Rowley, and George Samuel Jealous), formerly of No. 51, St. Pancras-square, Old St. Pancras-road, then of No. 7, Bayham-place, and next and now of No. 56, King-street, both in Camden Town, all in Middlesex, formerly a Printer, and afterwards Secretary and one of the Directors of the National Industrial and Providential (co-operative) Society, of No. 263, Euston-road, St. Pancras, Middlesex, also during the above period, Statistical and Literary Writer and Compiler of Rules for Societies, and while of No. 56, King-street, Camden Town, Lodging House-keeper.

George Beach, formerly of No. 3, Gaywood-street, London-road, then of No. 26, Market-street, Borough-road, both in Southwark, Surrey, having a workshop in St. George's Market, London-road aforesaid, Wheelwright, afterwards of No. 26, Market-street aforesaid, Wheelwright, then of the same place, and of St. George's Market aforesaid, Wheelwright, and at the same time carrying on the business of a Licensed Victualler, at the Sun Public House, No. 1, Leicester-street, Regent-street, Middlesex, and now of No. 26, Market-street, and St. George's Market aforesaid, Wheelwright.

John Edward Williams (using the name of Edward Codrington Williams, and sued as John Edward Codrington Williams), formerly of No. 19, Charles-street, then of No. 94, Jermyn-street, both in St. James's, then of No. 8, Millan-street, Bedford-row, and next and now of No. 7, Burton-street, Eaton-square, Piccadilly, all in Middlesex, Gentleman, in no profession or employment, but since August, 1860, one of the Directors of the Anglo-Spanish Soda Mining Company (Limited), of No. 10, Old Jewry Chambers, London.

George Kindersley Jackson, of No. 8, Doddington-grove, Battersea-fields, Surrey, out of employment, previously of No. 10, Upper Ebury street, Grocer, Oilman, and General Dealer, before then of No. 5, Stanley-street, and formerly of No. 24, Elizabeth-street South, all in Piccadilly, Middlesex, out of business and employment.

William Bailey, now of No. 27, Ion-square, previously of No. 9, Goldsmith-place, both in the Hackney-road, before then of No. 15, Dean-street, Islington, Clerk in a Furniture Warehouse, and formerly of No. 68, Buttesand-street, Hoxton, all in Middlesex. Looking-Glass Maker.

Charles Strutt, formerly of No. 11, Walbrook-row, East-road, City-road, Whitesmith, Bellhanger, and Gas Fitter, afterwards of No. 2, Mount-row, East-road aforesaid, same trades, and also an Ironmonger, and now lodging at No. 31, Ashford-street, Hoxton, all in Middlesex, out of employment.

Edward Pinn, of No. 4, Artillery-lane, Bishopsgate-street, in the city of London, Grocer and Tea Dealer, and formerly also a Beer-shop Keeper.

Samuel Johnson Skelsey (known as and called Samuel Skelsey), formerly of No. 6, De Beauvoir-crescent West, Hackney, then of No. 17, Hyde-place, Hoxton, then of No. 7, De Beauvoir-crescent aforesaid, then of No. 3, Bridport-place, Hoxton, then of No. 8, De Beauvoir-crescent aforesaid, his wife then residing at No. 16, Hyde-place aforesaid, and then and now of No. 9, Branch-place, near the Rosemary Branch, Canal-bridge, Hoxton, all in Middlesex, during the whole time Journeyman to a Card Maker and Wholesale Stationer, his wife at the last-named place a Dress Maker, and taking in Mangleing.

William Walsh, [formerly of No. 86, Bolsover-street (late Norton-street), and No. 174, Great Portland-street, both in Marylebone, Middlesex, and now of No. 44, Bolsover-street aforesaid, Shoemaker, and letting lodgings.

John Clement, formerly of No. 1, Charles-street, Manchester-square, and also renting the house No. 2, Bolton-yard, Mayfair, both in Middlesex, and next and now of No. 1, Charles-street aforesaid, and during the whole time renting a Coach-house adjoining No. 2, Bolton-yard aforesaid, Carpenter and Undertaker.

Alfred Cornelius Keily (sued as Alfred Keily and as Alfred C. Keily), formerly of No. 14, Silchester-road, Kensington-park, Middlesex, afterwards of Hollier-place, Lewisham, Kent, and then and now of No. 2, Westmoreland-place, Westbourne-grove North, Paddington, Middlesex, Clerk in the War Office.

Thomas Haseltine Rowley, formerly of No. 263, Euston-road, St. Pancras, Manager to the National Industrial and Provident Society, of the same place, and now lodging at No. 32, Frederick place, Hampstead-road, all in Middlesex, in no employment.

George Harcastle, of No. 1, Wharf-road, Pritchard's-road, Hackney-road, Middlesex, Dyer, and Letting Lodgings.

N.B.—1. Any creditor may attend and give evidence and produce witnesses. Opposition can only be made by the Creditor in person or by Counsel appearing for him.

2. The petition and schedule, and all books papers, and writings filed, will be produced by the proper officer for inspection and examination until two clear days before the hearing.

3. Creditors' assignee may be chosen according to the Statute.

4. Persons indebted to the said Insolvent Debtors respectively, or having any of their effects, are to pay and deliver the same to the Official Assignee being the Professional Assignee of the Court, at the said Court, and to no other person.
