**W**E Your Majesties Loyal and Obedient Subjects, having some of us endured a sharp Storm of Sufferings for our Nonconformity, are now, through the refreshing Beams of Your Majesties Clemency and Grace, enjoying the Free Exercise of our Religion, together with Your Majesties most Gracious Promise of our future Protection herein during Your Reign: Your Royal Favours affect our Hearts with a deep sense of God's Goodness to us, and begets in us unexpressible Thanks to Your Majesty; and though we come behind others in Verbal Acknowledgement, yet we hope not to be out-strip in imploring Divine Goodness for the enriching Your Royal Person and Family, with the best of Blessings, that You may be more renowned both in Goodness and Greatness. And as we are in Conscience bound, so shall we always endeavour (God assisting) both in our Prayers and Practices, to promote Piety, Loyalty, Peace and Charity, always approving our selves to Your Majesties Loyal, Thankful, and Obedient Subjects.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of Your Majesties Loyal Subjects the Dissenters of Your Ancient Corporation of Malden, Great Cogshall, Chelmsford, Brantrey, Wisham; and Halsted, with divers other adjacent Towns in the County of Essex.

May it Please Your Majesty,

**Y**OUR most Humble Subjects have those miraculous Providences fill fresh in our Eye, that

preserved Your Royal Person from imminent Danger at Sea and Land; that were the certain Wages of great Services the Almighty had bestow'd upon you: The blessing wherof is now made visible in Your celebrated Wisdom, in having upon His most melodious Harp to charm all our Spirits, that many other Princes had no skill to use; and in Your Majesty's several Interests to go on though not one Path. As also, in Your unparalleled Clemency, by which You have so pri'd Your distressed Subjects from the Jawes of Hell; and in Your Majesty's great and actual Liberty of Conscience for the Sentiments of Religion, and at once confirming our Rights and civil Properties; for which, with an unanimous hearty Acclamation, we render first unto Almighty God, and next, unto Your Sacred Majesty, our greatest Thanks; and the rather for Your acknowledging the Superior Sovereignty of the eternal Monarch in His reserved Empire over Conscience that is accountant to him alone.

In this doing, Great SIR, declaring against force with the greatest, yet softest of Princely Love, You have made Your Self an universal Conqueror, beloved at home, and formidable abroad, You have putted Shame upon Tyranny; and are become a Pattern of the truest Goodness and safest Policies: You have added a fourth Kingdom in Your Subjects Affections to Your other three in Subjection, and have given vent to our latent Affections, that kept their Cave during the renting Wind and Earthquake. You have made an Harmony for Your Self and People, in the different Sound from divers Strings, by the gentle touch of Your most skilful Hand.

And next, Great Sovereign, we shall pray the Father of Mercies, to Bless Your Royal Person, Your Illustrious Family, and Honorable Undertakings; and that Your Life and Reign, like the Sun in Gibeah, may have a long stand still over us, till after the Continuance and Enlargement of Your Royal Grace, in making Your Self Famous in Your Kingdoms, flourishing by the multitude of Your Subjects; Divine Mercy shall Crown You with eternal Glory.

From the Imperial Camp at Darda, June 25. The Duke of Lorraine arriv'd the 22th at Mohacz, where his Highness commanded a Bridge of Communication to be made over the Danube, and at the same time dispatched Orders to the Generals of the Army on the Drave, to secure themselves of the Bridge made over that River near Syclo, and to make another joining to it with what Boats they had with them: All which being performed, accordingly his Highness continued his march toward this place, where he arriv'd yesterday; and the same day he was reinforced by 4 Regiments, viz. two of Cuirassiers, one of Dragoons, and one of Foot. And the 2 Regiments that were on their march from the Frontiers of Transilvania, were hourly expected. At the approach of the Imperial Army, the Turks retir'd in great disorder out of the Low Grounds about this place, and made no stop till they had pass'd the River over their Bridge of Boats. His Highness has given command; that the Army be in a readiness to march tomorrow; intending to pass the Drave with his whole force and Artillery; and advance directly to the Town of Eslicke.

Buda, June 27. We do not hear but that the whole Country between the Theysse and the Danube is now freed from all Excursions of the Enemy, since General Heysler's late Rencontre with the Tartars near Keskymer. It is now said, they did not make a stand long enough to loose many of their number; but that upon the first appearance of our Troops, they betook themselves to the speed

dieft retreat towards Peter Waradin, leaving behind them whatever could retard their flight: By which means *Agria* and *Mongatz* are left ftill to connick with their neceffities, which are fo great, That the Baffa of *Agria* hath chofen rather to turn loofe feveral Prifoners than leffen the Provisions of the Garifon by feeding them. The Elektor of *Bavaria* is now encamped about *Segedin*, to be fo much nearer either to oppofe any new attempt of the Enemy on that fide, or to join the Duke of *Lorraine* if it fhall be found neceffary. We have an account that *Tockley*, fince his Alarm at *Kereck*, was gone to *Great Waradin*, and had received fome Money there of the Baffa, which he had diftributed among his Officers; and they had employed it to procure him about 600 Men from the Neighbourhood of *Mongatz*; Infomuch, that he was now at the head of 1500 Men, as well Turks and Tatars, as Hungarians. There is a Report that the Duke of *Lorraine* hath actually paffed the *Drave* between *Syels* and *Five Chmches*. And that the Grand Vifir is likewife marching with a numerous Army.

*Vienna, June 29.* Count *Martinez* parted the 26th Inftant *Post* for *Heydelberg*, to Compliment the Queen of *Portugal* on her Marriage, in the name of their Imperial Majesties. The Prince of *Neubourg*, Grand Mafter of the *Teutonique-Order*, arrived here the 16th Inftant, and is preparing to part again within few days for *Hungary*, whither his Equipage is gone before. The Duke of *Mantua* is daily expected here, who defigns alfo to pafs the Campaign in the Army. They write from *Lower Hungary*, that the Duke of *Lorraine* was kill drawing nearer to the *Drave*: That his Army confifted of 25000 Men, whereof 9000 were Foot, and the reft Horfe and Dragons, and that it was daily augmented by feveral Troops fent down the *Danube*; and it is believed, that it was now joined by the 6 Regiments from the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, under the Command of Count *Veterani*. General *Dernwald* hath another Army of 8000 Men at *Syels*, befides the Melitia of *Croatia*, and the Country about *Careftad*. The Turks have not yet finifhed their Bridge at *Effecke*, as was given out, but were ftill at work on their repairs, and in fortifying themfelves: It is faid there are but 6000 Men at *Effecke* befides the ordinary Garifon.

*Vienna, July 3.* We have advice, That General *Vex* had fet out to acquaint the Duke of *Lorraine*, that by an Albanefe who had rendred himfelf, he was informed, That *Huffan* Baffa was on his march towards *Effecke* with an Army of 50000 Men. It is now faid, that the Elektor of *Bavaria* had paffed the *Danube* with his Army, and was gone to join the Duke of *Lorraine*.

*Heydelberg, July 8.* The Marriage of the King and Queen of *Portugal* was Celebrated the 2d Inftant; the Ceremonies being performed by the Suffragan of *Spire*: The whole time fince has been fpend in great entertainments, Balls, and Operas, with all other agreeable Divertifements that might exprefs the Joy and Satisfaction of this Court. Her Majesty begins her Journey the 10th Inftant, with a fplendid and numerous Train for *Dufeldorf*, in the Duchy of *Berg*, where fhe is expected the 15th Inftant by the Prince Palatin and Arch Duchefs, with Preparations for her Reception fitted to the occafion. Her Majesty intends to continue there fome few days, and thence to proceed on her Journey down the *Rhine* to *Rotterdam*, there to embark on the Ships of His Majesty of *Great Britain*, under the Command of the Duke of *Grafton*, in order to her Voyage to *Portugal*.

*Hague, July 13.* The Prince of *Orange* returned hither yefterdoy morning from *Honslaerdyke*, and having given Audience to feveral Foreign Minifters, his Highnefs parted again the fame day on his Journey to vifit *Maeftricht*, *Boifludue*, *Breda*, and other Garifons belonging to this State. Her Royal Highnefs will continue ftill at *Honslaerdyke*, till towards the end of the next week; at which time fhe removes to *Loo* to meet the Prince of *Orange*, who is expected there about that time in his return from *Maeftricht*, to refide there for fome time.
