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THE following Addreſſes have been Preſented to the King, which His Maſteſty received very Graciouſly.

The Humble Adreſſ of the Biſhop and Clergy of the Dioceſs of Coventry and Liſtchfield.

May it Pleaſe Your Sacred Maſteſty,

WHereas in Your Maſteſties Royal Declaration lately publiſhed, You have been Graciouſly Pleaſed to declare, That Your Maſteſty will Protect and Maintain Your Archbiſhops, Biſhops, and Clergy, and all other Your Subjects of the Church of England, in the Free Exerciſe of their Religion as by Law Eſtabliſhed, and in the quiet and full Enjoyment of all their Poſſeſſions, without any Moleſtation or Diſturbance whatſoever: We cannot but think our ſelves oblig'd in Duty and Gratitude to return Your Maſteſty our hearty Thanks for theſe Gracious Expreſſions of Your Kindneſs, and for all Your former Aſſurances of Your Royal Favours to the Church of England, and Humbly to expreſs our Loyalty, as becomes the True Sons of the Church of England and Your Maſteſties moſt Dutiful Subjects and Servants.

To the King's Moſt Excellent Maſteſty,

May it Pleaſe Your Maſteſty,

WE Your Maſteſties Loyal and Obedient Subjects, having ſome of us endured a ſharp Storm of Sufferings for our Nonconformity, are now, through the reſreſhing Beams of Your Maſteſties Clemency and Grace, enjoying the Free Exerciſe of our Religion, together with Your Maſteſties moſt Gracious Promiſe of our future Protection herein during Your Reign: Your Royal Favours affect our Hearts with a deep ſenſe of God's Goodneſs to us, and begets in us unexpreſſible Thanks to Your Maſteſty; and though we come behind others in Verbal Acknowledgement, yet we hope not to be out-ſtrip in imploring Divine Goodneſs for the enriching Your Royal Perſon and Family, with the beſt of Bleſſings, that You may be more renowned both in Goodneſs and Greatneſs. And as we are in Conſcience bound, ſo ſhall we always endeavour (God aſſiſting) both in our Prayers and Practices, to promote Piety, Loyalty, Peace and Charity, always approving our ſelves to Your Maſteſties Loyal, Thankful, and Obedient Subjects.

To the King's Moſt Excellent Maſteſty,

The Humble Adreſſ of Your Maſteſties Loyal Subjects the Diſſenters of Your Ancient Corporation of Malden, Great Cogſhall, Chelmsford, Brantrey, Wiſham; and Halſted, with divers other adjacent Towns in the County of Eſſex.

May it Pleaſe Your Maſteſty,

YOUR moſt Humble Subjects have thoſe miraculous Providences ſhew'd in our Eye, that

preſerved Your Royal Perſon from imminent Danger at Sea and Land; that were the certain Wrecks of great Services the Almighty had deſign'd You unto: The bloſſoming wherof is now made viſible in Your celebrated Wiſdom; in having upon His moſt melodious Harp to charm all our Spirits, that many other Princes had no ſkill to uſe; and in conſidering ſeveral Interests to go on together upon one Path. As alſo, in Your unparalleled Clemency, by which You have ſuſpended Your diſtreſſed Subjects from the Juſt and legal Execution of ſome of the ſevereſt Sentences of Religion, and at once conſtituted a new Order and Order Properties; for which, with an unanimous hearty Acclamation, we render firſt unto Almighty God, and next, unto Your Sacred Maſteſty, our greateſt Thanks; and the rather for Your acknowledging the Superior Sovereignty of the eternal Monarch in His reſtor'd Empire over Conſcience that is accountable to him alone.

In this doing, Great SIR, declaring againſt force with the greateſt, yet ſofter of Princely Love, You have made Your ſelf an univerſal Conqueror, beloved at home, and formidable abroad, You have put ſhame upon Tyranny; and are become a Pattern of the juſteſt Goodneſs and ſaſeſt Policies: You have added a fourth Kingdom in Your Subjects Affections to Your other three in Subjection, and have given vent to our latent Affections, that kept their Cave during the renting Wind and Earthquake. You have made an Harmony fir Your ſelf and People, in the diſſent ſounds from divers Strains, by the gentle touch of Your moſt ſkilful Hand.

And next, Great Sovereign, we ſhall pray the Father of Mercies, to Bleſs Your Royal Perſon, Your Illuſtrious Family, and Honorable Undertakings; and that Your Life and Reign, like the Sun in Gibeah, may have a long ſtand ſtill over us, till after the Continuance and Enlargement of Your Royal Grace, in making Your ſelf Famous in Your Kingdoms, flouriſhing by the multitude of Your Subjects; Divine Mercy ſhall Crown You with eternal Glory.

From the Imperial Camp at Darda, June 25. The Duke of Lorraine arriv'd the 22th at Mohacz, where his Highneſs commanded a Bridge of Communication to be made over the Danube, and at the ſame time diſpatched Orders to the Generals of the Army on the Drave, to ſecure themſelves of the Bridge made over that River near Syclo, and to make another joining to it with what Boats they had with them: All which being performed, accordingly his Highneſs continued his march toward this place, where he arriv'd yeſterday; and the ſame day he was reinforced by 4 Regiments, viz. two of Cuiraffiers, one of Dragoons, and one of Foot. And the 2 Regiments that were on their march from the Frontiers of Tranſylvania, were hourly expected. At the approach of the Imperial Army, the Turks retired in great diſorder out of the Low Grounds about this place, and made no ſtop till they had paſſed the River over their Bridge of Boats. His Highneſs has given command; that the Army be in a readineſs to march to-morrow; intending to paſs the Drave with his whole force and Artillery; and advance directly to the Town of Eſſicke.

Buda, June 27. We do not hear but that the whole Country between the Theiſſe and the Danube is now freed from all Excuſions of the Enemy, ſince General Heuſler's late Rencontre with the Tartars near Keſkumer. It is now ſaid, they did not make a ſtand long enough to looſe many of their number; but that upon the firſt appearance of our Troops, they betook themſelves to the ſpeedy flight.
