To the King's most Excellent Majesty,
The Humble Adrefs of several of Your Majesties Loyal Subjects, dwelling in or near *Willingborough, Kettering, Rothwell, Wellford, and Creaton*, in Your County of Northampton.

Most Dread Sovereign,

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects, whom the free and undisturbed Exercise of our Religion towards God, the quiet and peaceable Enjoyment of our Goods, Estates, Rights and Properties, the reviving and increase of our Trade, the ease and serenity of our Minds, do already reap the Fruits, and sensibly feel the happy Effects of Your Majesties late most Gracious Declaration for Liberty of Conscience, do most Humbly acknowledge we cannot sufficiently admire Your great and Princely Wisdom, in finding out a way so conducing to the Establishment and Happiness of Your People.

For if we respect the Principles on which it is founded, they immediately flow from the eternal Laws of Reason, which are immutable: If the matter thereof it is Balm to our Wounds: If the extent thereof it is comprehensive of all Persons and Conditions; so that there remains nothing further for us to desire, nor room left for Fears and Jealousies in any: If our Security for the Duration and Continuance thereof we have Your Royal Word; Your Royal Word, Sir! which when we reflect on Your former Promises for the good of Your People on several Occasions, most Freely and Graciously made, we find it like the Laws of the Medes and Persians unalterable. Great Sir, we do with all Humility own our inability thankfully enough to express our sense of this Your Royal Bounty, Goodness, and Compassion, so largely conferred on us. Yet the sincerity of our Hearts in Presenting at this Time our Humblest Thanks to Your Majesty, gives us some Humble Hopes, that Your Majesty will Graciously be pleased to accept the same as such: And we further hope we shall Evidence, that Loyalty and Obedience to Your Majesties Government by our Dutiful Demeanor during our Lives, that Your Majesty shall never have cause to repent of Your great Favours bestowed on us. And that we shall convince all the World thereby, that the same Conscience You have disintangled and set free from all Impositions in matters of meet Religion, obliges us to give, as to God, the things that are God's; so to Cæsar, the things that are Cæsar's. And in performance of some part of that Duty, we do most heartily Pray, That Almighty God would Bless Your Royal Person; Family; and Government.

Lemberg, June 16. To prevent the like mischiefs as have lately hapned near *Kiovia*, whereof we have this Confirmation, that a Party of 6000 Tartars had killed and carryed away about 10000 Mosco-

vites; there are now 4 Regiments of Cossacks ordered to encamp between *Bug'sim* and *Corsin*, to be in a readines against any sudden Interruption on that side. They write from *Biaocerkiem*, that the Moscovite Army was decamp'd, and having passed the Rivers of *Orfel* and *Sgmaria*, which run into the *Boristhenes*, they were near to the Borders of *Crum-Tartary*. One lately arriv'd from thence, who was carryed about by the General's Order to view the whole Army, reports, That they reckon themselves to be about 30000 fighting Men; and that the Train of Artillery consists of 800 pieces of Cannon, besides 90 Mortar-pieces. The Crown-General having advice, that a great Convoy was conducting by the Tartars through *Moldavia* to the relief of *Caminec*, he sent out a strong Detachment of Horse from the Camp at *Tarnopol*; with Orders to attack them.

Buda, July 1. Two days since was seized here a Person accused to have a design of blowing up two Boats lying in the River laden with Provisions and Ammunition for the Army. Count *Caraffa* having resigned up his Command at *Zo.rocke*, returned to *Esperies*, where he arrived the 22d part. The Elector of *Bavaria* was the 29th of the last month at *Czongrad* near *Segedin*, with an Army of 16000 Men. The six Regiments of Horse being included that came from *Transilvania* with Count *V. ten* who had Orders immediately to join the Duke of *Lorraine*. His Highness intends to continue his march towards the Bidge of Communication at *Niobatz*, either to pass the River as the Service shall require it, or descend lower to destroy the Turks Bridge over the *Danube* at *Peter Waxadin*, with another on the *Theysse*. In the mean time the Marquis *Doria* hath Orders with the Regiment of *Caraffa*, and what Hungarians he can draw out of the Garisons near to *Agria*, to destroy the Country round that place: They being thought a sufficient number to keep that Town blocked up; though it is said the Bassa of *Great Waxadin* hath Orders to attempt the Relief of it. We hear, that the Turks and Tartars in conjunction with the Hungarian Rebels, making in all 5000 Men, had besieged *St. Job*, and that the Imperial Troops in those parts were assembling to relieve it: 800 Hussars commanded by the Counts *Bargorzi* and *S. Janski*, meeting with a Party of Tartars near their Bridge on the *Theysse*; they killed 400 of them, and took 36 Prisoners, with the loss only of 15 Men.

Vienna, July 6. This day came an Express from *Salzbourg* with the News, that the Chapter there being assembled in the Presence of the Bishop of *Bantz*, Commissioner from his Imperial Majesty, had made choice of the Count de *Thun*, Bishop of *Secovie*, for their Prince and Metropolitan, who is a Person highly esteemed in this Court for his Extraordinary Qualifications. Here arrived lately the Duke of *Saxe-Coberg*, and Duke *Ernest* his Brother, with a Retinue of about 40 Horse; and having had Audience of their Imperial Majesties, they are gone for *Hungary*. They write from *Croatia*, that the Chief Governor, Count *Ezadeadi*, by advice of the Estates assembled at *Zagravia*, had published an Edict, requiring the Militia of the Country not to fail to appear at the Rendezvous appointed

the 27th of June at Turpoli; with which he intends to pass the River Kulp, and enter into the Enemies Country.

From the Imperial Camp at Essecke, June 26. Upon the arrival of the Duke of Lorraine at Darda, the 24th Instant; The Turks that were before busie on the Repairs of their Bridge over the Moras, left working, and retired to their Retrenchment at the foot of their Bridge of Boats over the Drave, leaving some few Men only posted in the Moras to defend the Passes. His Highness having encamped, sent to discover in what Posture the Enemy lay, and then gave Order to General Souches to attack them this day with 1500 commanded Men, under Count Guido Staremberg as Colonel, Count Dietrichstein of the Regiment of Mansfeld, as Lieutenant-Colonel, and the Major of the Prince of Salms Regiment, as Major: They fell upon the Turks early in the morning before they seemed to expect them; and soon forced them to quit their Posts, and retire to the Fort that covered their Bridge, and after a little resistance, they drove them out of that also, and over the Bridge of Boats, pursuing them to the Entrance into Essecke: The Orders were to make themselves Masters of their Boats; but in that they were prevented by other great Boats sent on purpose down the River at the same time heavy laden, which coming down the Current with so great a weight, broke the Bridge on Darda-side, forcing away some of the Boats, so that nothing more could be done then to set fire to some few of them: The Enemy is reckon'd to have lost on this occasion near 400 Men, and of the Imperia-lists there are a Captain and a Lieutenant killed, with 47 more killed and wounded.

Hague, July 17. The States-General having notice of the Queen of Portugals Intentions to pass down the Rhine through their Territories, have appointed the Sieurs Wreckendam, Odyke, and Berckensstein their Deputies to receive her Majesty at Skenck Jckans, and Conduēt her to Rotterdam, with Commands to pay her Majesty in all places where she passes, the same Honours and Ceremonies that were formerly paid to the Queen of Poland as she went through these Countries in her return from France, in the year 1645. The Sieur Hop, Extraordinary Envoy from this State to the Elector of Brandenburg, took his leave this day of the States-General. Don Emanuel de Coloma, Envoy from the Court of Spain, hath given Notice of his arrival here.

Paris, July 19. The Duke of Mortemar according to our last advices, was at Cadix; the two Vessels he had sent to Tangier, were returned, with which went the Sieur de la Croix to confer with the Alcaide Haly. The Moscovite Ambassadors are arriv'd at Dunkirk.

Plimouth, July 8. Yesterday arriv'd here a Ship from Galipoli, the Master whereof reports, That off the Lands end, he met with seven Men of War belonging to Algiers.
