THE following Addresses and Resolutions of Condolence, on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness The Prince Consort, have been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, to be laid before the Queen.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge, humbly beg leave to approach the Throne with the expression of our deepest sympathy and condolence in your sad bereavement by the death of His Royal Highness Prince Albert, your Majesty's Royal Consort.

It would scarcely become us, in addressing your Majesty, to dwell upon the private and domestic virtues of that august Prince; but we may be permitted to express how greatly, in common with all England, we revere the memory of him who, for so long a period, shared in the joys and participated in the cares of your Majesty. We cannot refrain from bearing testimony to the lively interest which the deeply-lamented Prince Consort took in all that concerns the welfare of this University, and to the encouragement which he afforded to our pursuits in science and literature during the years in which His Royal Highness was our Chancellor, and we assure your Majesty that by no body of your Majesty's subjects is the loss sustained by the nation more deeply deplored, or the sympathy for your Majesty's grief more heartfelt than by the University of Cambridge.

We are fully aware that as none were so acquainted with this worth, none can feel his loss to the same extent as your Majesty.

It must, however, be a consolation to your Majesty to know, although in some respects a melancholy one, that the untiring zeal with which His Royal Highness devoted his vigorous understanding and his high intellectual attainments to the moral and social improvement of the country, excited the warmest admiration among all classes of your Majesty's subjects, and has secured for him a name that must ever rank as one of the

most illustrious and beloved in the annals of British history.

In the midst of the darkness of human suffering God, in His mercy, sheds some ray of comfort. The Almighty disposer of events does not leave us under the pressure of the deepest affliction to sorrow as without hope. By the favour of your Majesty, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was recently a student in this University, and from the knowledge of his noble qualities, which his residence among us enabled us to acquire, we feel assured that both in domestic cares and in the administration of the affairs of the State your Majesty will receive from him all the comfort and assistance which a loyal, dutiful, and loving son could afford.

It is our humble and earnest prayer to Almighty God that your Majesty may be long preserved to reign over a contented and religious people, and that your Majesty and your Royal House may be ever sustained by His grace, protection, and blessing.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Caracas, enclosing translations of Venezuelan Decrees, fixing, as follows, the export and import duties to be levied in that country.

EXPORTS.

ART. 1. From the publication of the present Decree the following duties will be collected in all the Customs of the Republic on all national productions and manufactures exported:

§ SOLE ARTICLE.—The ad valorem duty to be settled between the collector, deputy-collector, and the importer, by majority.

ART. 2. The exportation of cows is prohibited.

ART. 3. The Export duties will be paid at once in specie or notes of the Bank of Venezuela.

ART. 4. The Subsidiary duties of 10 per cent. on Exports, in accordance with the law of the 25th of May, 1857, and those established by the law of May 17, 1860, are abolished.

IMPORTS.

ART. 1. All goods subject to the payment of import duties, introduced from foreign countries, will pay, besides the duties fixed by the tariff, an extraordinary one of 50 per cent. on the amount of the said duties.

ART. 2. Goods free from import duty according to the tariff, will pay as extraordinary duty fifteen per cent. ad valorem.

§ SOLE ARTICLE.—Are exempted from this duty, gold or silver coins, bullion, and gold and silver dust, as also the following; viz: printing-presses, books, machines, and other articles which were released from all duties by Decree of the 22nd February, of 1851, in favour of public works; and the grain and other provisions exempted by the Decree of the 1st of October last.

ART. 3. This contribution will be paid in specie or notes of the Bank of Venezuela, cash, if not

exceeding four hundred dollars, and at thirty days if exceeding the above sum, the payment thereof being guaranteed in the same way as the import duties.

§ SOLE ARTICLE.—Until the loan of October, 1859, be paid up, one half of the duties laid down by this Decree will be paid in specie or in notes of the said loan.

ART. 4. This contribution will be collected from the 1st of next month from vessels arriving from the West Indies; from the 16th of the same month from vessels arriving from the United States; and from the 1st of January, 1862, from vessels arriving from any other place; the subsidiary duties established by the law of 25th of May, 1857, and the extraordinary contribution established by the law of May 17, 1860, being at the same time abolished.

NOTE.—By a subsequent arrangement the above import duties are to come into operation, so far as regards vessels arriving from Europe, at the expiration of 120 days from the date of the above decree.
