Pembroke, Fan. 5.

Merchant ship belonging to Offend, laden with Fish and Oyls, lately taken and made Prize by a French man of Warre, was by the unskilfulnels of the men aboard her deferted, and fince ran afhoar about 6 miles from Tinby where the is feiled as a Wreck.

Swansey, Jan. 6. The first instant, was cast away at Laughorne Sands near Caermarthen-fhire , a French Veffel of 150. Tuns and fix Guns, laden with Bank Fish; fhe had fome dayes before been taken and made prize by an Oftender, but being separated by storm, met with this Wreck, her men getting fafe to the shore with some of the goods, which lay at the mercy of the common people.

^{*} *Plymouth*, *Fan.* 10. The Fleet of Merchant ships that have for some time been confined by ill weather to this Harbor, are this evening fayl'd, bound for the Canaries, Streights,

Cales, and fome for Virginia. Newcafile, Fan. 10. On Wednefday night last, a Great Flyboat from London, intending for this Port, was calt away upon the Sands, call'd the Flack-Madings, under the Ca-file, the men all of them faved. Lyme, Jan. 11. The 9th. inftant arrived here a fhip

belonging to this Harbour, called the Friendship, laden from Malaga; where they speak of a strict Enquiry that is there made after fuch goods as belong to any of the Subjects of his most Christian Majesty, with whom they do not at present entertain any Trade or Commerce. Several of our English Ships in their return from the Streights, have been met by the Turkish Men of War, from whom, notwith-ftanding fome falle Rumors to the contrary, they parted without the leaft trouble or molestation.

The fame day , a Veffel arriving from Morlaix , with linnen, tells us of the great interruption of the French Trade, especially in those Seas, by the Offend Privateers, who are constantly cruiting before their Ports, and hinders all communication between Harbour and Harbour. Several Ships are also this day put to Sea, fome tor Morlaix, St. Maloes, and other French Ports; others for Virginia and Barbados, laden with necessary provisions for those Parts.

Hamburg, Jan. 7. We have now hopes that by the Mediation of the Duke of Holflein, fome good end may in short time be put to the differences between His Majesty of Denmark and this City for which purpose that King has deputed the Sieur de Clingenberg, with one other perfon to pals in few days for this place, to examine what shall be offer'd to His Majefty in the Name of this City.

The King of Dennark has fince his return been Com-plemented, not only by his own Nobility and Magistrates, but also by the Minifters of foreign Princes, upon his happy return and the late Marriage of the Prince's with the Duke of Holftein ; all their men of warr are now dilarmed and laid up for this Winter, but they talk of letting out a con-fiderable fleet of their best ships against the next Spring for the lecurity of their Trade.

From Dantzick + e are told that the Commissioners from his Majesty of Pol nd , have had several Meetings and Conferences with the Deputies of the City, the great bufinels they have as yet infifted on, being their Concern-ments in the Fort of Paulsho, and the fettle nent of the Cuftoms in fuch a manner as the Kings Rights and Pretenfions may not fuffer any prejudice; fo that they are now wholly employed in ftating of Accounts.

In Poland they are every where preparing matters for the General Diet, from which they hope for a happy con-clution , fince the heats among the Nobility, are in a great measure abated, and the discontents of the Army taken off; the fouldiers expecting the Confirmation of the promife made to the great Mareshal of the Crown, have already chosen their Deputies to affift at the Diet; contenting themfelves in the mean while with what Quarters are affigned to entertain them.

From Ruffia we are advited that young Kmelinsky, formerly General of the Rebel Coffacks; who had fince made himfelf a Monke in a Greeian Monaftery, had again left his Covent, and was returned into Ukrania, where he had gotten into a Body about twenty thouland men ; but being timely met withal by Dorofensko General of the Coffacks, was after a little dispute defeated, he saving himself by a timely flight.

Paris, Jan. 18. His Majefty has given order to the Duke Mazarine, to prepare himfelf to undertake the Charge of Grand Master of the Artillery for the year enfueing, in which Quality he is to follow the Army in the room of the Marquils de Louuey, whom the king has ealed from that employment. The Duke in order to is charge, has been already at the Arfenal to make tryal feveral Guns caft there.

The Sieur Pelot, His Majefties Intendant of Juffice in Guinny, has fent 250 Gentlemen of that Countrey to be employ'd in His Majesties Guards, to whom the King has given to each perfon Twenty Piflols and a Horfe

The Sieur de Belle Ille, a Major of the Naval Forces, is by His Majesties order gone for Marseilles to take care for the speedy Equipping of fix new ships 1 tely built there, of one of which the Sieur is to be Captain, and from Rochel we are told, that Mounsieur Colbert de Teron is gone to Rochefort upon the River of Charaste for the fitting up of fix other 'new fi ips for His Majefties fervice.

Our Admiral, the Duke de Beaufort has Orders to be ready to put to fea by the end of the next Month, by which time the Sieur d'Almeras is to be with his Squadron at Mar (cilles.

The Sieur de Verjus, Secretary to the Queen of Portugal, is arrived here with an account of the Reasons of the late Revolutions in that Kingdom. His Majesty has orderd two ships to be spee ily sent for Lisbonne, with Letters to Her Majesty, and Orders for the Sieur d'Almeras and the Count de Schombert,

From Pijon we are informed, that Monfieur the Prince of Conde having visited all the Frontiers of his Government, has affembled the States of that Province, but the Depusies of the County of Burgundy are difpatching the Marquifs d'Aubefpine, and with him a perfon of the long Robe to the Swiffes, to acquain them with the Princes propolals to them concerning their Neutrality, without whole concurrence they intend not to transact any thing of importence. The States of the Dutchy of Burgundy have offer'd to pay in 900 thouland Liures, of the 500 thouland de-manded of them. His Majefty has beftow d the fumme usural given by those States to him, upon the Prince, belides the yearly fumms which they are obliged to pay him towards his expences in his Levies.

Upon intelligence brought to the Marquifs de Crequy, that the Enemy had posseft themselves of the Castle, as well as of the Town of Sirick , the Marquis was drawing all his his Horce's together to recover it; fince which, by a later advice from Thionuille, we are told that he was marched to Maruille in Luxembourgh, with a Body of 1500. Horle, 400. Dragoons ; 1208. For and three pieces of Canon & expecting the affiftance of the Marquiss de Bellefonds, who was lately fallen into a diftemper, which prevented him of that expected fupply; but being re-inforced with fome other Troops, he was marched on towards Luxema bourgh, and lay encamped within a league of the City, whither the Sieur de Poduits a Marefhall of the Camp, was on his march to joyn with him.
