THE following Address of Condolence on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, which has been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been laid before the Queen by Sir George Grey, and has been received very graciously by Her Majesty:

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Principal of King's College, London, the Head Master of King's College School, the Professors, Lecturers, and Officers of the College, and the Vice-Master and Masters of the School, desire respectfully to approach your Majesty with the expression of our heartfelt condolence on the irreparable loss which your Majesty has sustained in the decease of your Majesty's Illustrious Consort.

Without presuming to intrude upon the sanctity of your Majesty's private and domestic sorrows, which the God of Patience and Consolation can alone assuage, we venture to assure your Majesty that, in common with every household throughout the country, we sympathize with your Majesty in the sudden calamity which has befallen the happy home of the greatest Sovereign in the world,—a home long and justly regarded as a pattern for imitation to every family in England.

But it is not only as individuals, but as members of a College, of which your Majesty is the gracious Patron, and which the lamented Prince Consort likewise was graciously pleased to countenance, that we desire to place on record the profound regret with which we regard this your Majesty's sad bereavement. By ever active and vigilant personal attention to the moral and material welfare of the kingdom; bý munificent and discriminating aid to works of charity; by enlightened patronage systematically extended to art, literature, and science; — in a word, by the recognition and encouragement of all that can promote the progress and education of the world, the Prince Consort won for himself a position of commanding influence, unexampled in the history of this country.

The memory of such a character cannot perish. The Prince Consort's name will go down to posterity associated with that of your Majesty, not only in the tenderest relations of mutual affection, but in that advancement of true civilization which distinguishes your Majesty's glorious reign.
