

absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Algernon, Duke of Northumberland, his heirs and assigns.

"And we further recommend and propose that, in consideration of the transfer to us of the sum of seven hundred and seventy-five pounds, five shillings, and seven pence, Three pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, as aforesaid, there shall be paid by us, out of the common fund aforesaid in each and every year by equal half yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the minister for the time being of the said district of South Charlton, the sum of twenty-four pounds, and that in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister succeeding to such district: Provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister of the said district, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister and his successors in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-third day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the

Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint James, situate at High Wych, in the parish of Sawbridgeworth, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint James, situate at High Wych aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Sawbridgeworth, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint James, High Wych.'

"And with the like consent of the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint James, High Wych, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Sawbridgeworth, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester (including an isolated portion of such parish), which is situate to the west of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary dividing the same parish from the parish of Harlow, in the county of Essex, and in the said diocese of Rochester, at a point in the centre of the bridge which carries the turnpike-road leading from Epping to Sawbridgeworth over the Old River Stort, and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the middle of such turnpike-road for a distance of one thousand five hundred and sixty yards, or thereabouts, to its junction with the road leading from Sawbridgeworth to High Wych, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such last-mentioned road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of the road forming the south-western boundary of Manfield Common, and extending thence, still north-westward, to and along the middle of such last-described road, and along the middle of the path or road, forming the southern boundary of the allotment in Manfield Common, numbered 509 on the title map of the said parish of Sawbridgeworth, and upon the map hereunto annexed, to a point in the middle of the southern end of the fence which divides the allotment numbered 509 as aforesaid from the
