THE following Address of Condolence on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, which has been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been laid before the Queen by Sir George Grey, and has been received very graciously by Her Majesty :

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the province of York, in Convocation assembled, desire to approach your Majesty with the expression of our profound sympathy under the sore affliction with which it has pleased Almighty God to visit your Majesty and the Royal Family.

In common with the whole nation, which mourns as one man for the decease of the Royal Consort, we deplore the loss of a Prince who by his ceaseless efforts and his bright example has conferred inestimable and enduring benefits on our country.

Uniting as we do with all our fellow subjects in our admiration of the devoted exertions of the Prince Consort to promote the public welfare by encouraging the progress of arts and the cultivation of science ; by elevating the social condition of the poor, and improving popular education ; we feel that it is from the support he gave to the best interests of morality and of sound religion, by the spotless purity of his life, and his willing aid to the church in spreading the Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ through the world, that he had the strongest claim to our veneration and love.

It is from these and such like services that the Prince whose loss we so deeply lament won the respect and affection of a grateful nation, and his cherished memory will ever serve to remind us that the path of true greatness lies in the direction of self-denial for the good of others, and that happiness is inseparable from an earnest devotion to the call of duty.

We would humbly commend your Majesty and the Royal Family to the keeping of Him who has promised to be a Father to the fatherless, and bids the widow trust in Him, praying that he will grant you, by the spirit of grace, those abundant consolations in Christ Jesus which the faithful in their sorrows never seek in vain. May your Ma-

esty long be spared to rule this Empire with that wisdom which, under God's good providence, has been the stability of our times ; and may you have the comfort of seeing the Royal children tread in the footsteps of their honored father, and thus prove a blessing to their country and generation.

EXTRACT of a Despatch from Lord Lyons, Her Majesty's Minister at Washington, dated March 10, 1862.

THE PASSPORT SYSTEM SUSPENDED.

The following order from the State Department, addressed to the Superintendent of Police in the city of New York, abolishes for the present the

Passport system, which it was deemed necessary to adopt several months ago :

SIR,
I have to inform you that it has been deemed expedient to rescind the order issued in consequence of the state of affairs in this country, making it necessary for all persons leaving the United States to provide themselves with passports, and you will therefore be pleased to consider that arrangement as being terminated. It will therefore be left optional with persons to provide themselves with passports or not, as they may deem necessary for their protection and security abroad. Foreign passports will no longer require to be countersigned.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law, on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage, according to the weight thereof and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid; and it is provided, that the power thereby given should extend to any increase or reduction or remission of postage.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the post-office.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain Warrant in writing under their hands duly made, and bearing date, at Whitehall Treasury Chambers, the 19th day of July, 1852, did direct that certain rates of British postage therein mentioned should be charged and taken upon the transmission of letters between the United Kingdom and any place in the German postal union, and between any foreign country through any part of the German postal union, and any place in the United Kingdom, the said respective letters being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium by packet-boat.

And whereas by a certain other Warrant in writing duly made, and bearing date at Whitehall, Treasury Chambers, the 27th day of June, 1859, after reciting the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 19th day of July, 1852, and that a postal convention had been then recently made and entered into between Her Majesty's Government and the Government of His Majesty the King of Prussia, and that it was expedient that further regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of certain letters in manner therein mentioned, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury did direct that certain other rates of British postage therein mentioned should be charged and taken upon the transmission of letters between the United Kingdom and certain foreign countries, therein also mentioned, if such respective letters should be prepaid, the

said respective letters being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium by packet boat.

And whereas a further postal convention has been lately made and entered into between Her Majesty's Government and the Government of His Majesty the King of Prussia, and it has become expedient, by reason thereof, to extend the provisions contained in the said recited Warrant of the 27th day of June, 1859, to letters transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis, now chargeable with rates of postage under the said recited Warrant of the 19th day of July, 1852, in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us, in and by the said two hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order and direct as follows:

1. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any place in the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis, and on every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom (the said respective letters being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium by packet boat), there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform rate of British postage of two pence half penny, if such respective letters be prepaid, and, if such respective letters be not prepaid, an uniform rate of British postage of three pence half penny.

2. And on every letter transmitted as is hereinbefore mentioned, exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged and taken progressive and additional rates of postage, according to the scale of weight and number of rates following; that is to say:—

On every letter so transmitted, exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every letter so transmitted, exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every letter so transmitted, exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every letter so transmitted, exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken upon every letter so transmitted, two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces, shall be charged as an additional ounce, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight.

3. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis, or if any letter shall be posted in the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis, addressed to the United Kingdom, and the postage paid thereon, shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such

letter would be liable, under or by virtue of this Warrant, every such letter shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the sum paid for postage thereon, and the rate of postage payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant as an unpaid letter, after deducting the amount of postage so paid thereon as aforesaid.

4. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to extend to any letters passing by the post between the United Kingdom and the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis via France, nor to any letters passing by the post between the United Kingdom and the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis via Belgium, sent otherwise than in Prussian closed mails; nor to any letters posted in, or addressed to, any part of the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis, and transmitted by the post between any part of the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom, nor to any letters transmitted between any foreign country, through any part of the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis and the United Kingdom, nor to any letters transmitted between any foreign country, through any part of the postal district of the Prince of Tour and Taxis and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom and Belgium by packet-boat, all which said respective letters shall be charged, and chargeable with the same rates of postage as are now chargeable and payable thereon, and as if this present Warrant had not been made.

5. The term "Postal District of the Prince of Tour and Taxis," used in this Warrant, shall include the States and Countries of Frankfort on the Maine, the Grand Duchy of Hesse, Hesse Electoral, Hesse Homburg, Schaumburg Lippe, Lippe Detmold, Nassau, Reuss, Saxe Coburg-Gotha, Saxe-Meiningen, Saxe-Weimar, Eisenach, Hohenzollern, Schwartzburg, Rudolstadt, and Schwartzburg Sonderhausen, and the other terms and expressions used in this Warrant, shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said recited Warrant of the 19th day of July, 1852.

6. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of April, 1862.

7. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby altered, or the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.
