THE following Address of Condolence on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, which has been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been laid before the Queen by Sir George Grey, and has been received very graciously by Her Majesty :

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

AMIDST the sounds of mourning which are coming up from every quarter of the land, we, the Vice-Presidents, Committee, and Subscribers of the Windsor Royal Association, humbly pray to be allowed to approach your Majesty with the expressions of our heartfelt sympathy and condolence under the irreparable loss which your Majesty has so recently sustained.

Our words which can be no common words, even as our grief can be no common grief. We cannot forget that while others have known our much-loved Royal President, chiefly as the enlightened Prince,—as the thoughtful observer of the wants of all classes in his adopted country,—as the wise originator of plans for their social advancement by a rare combination of intellectual and moral excellencies, proving himself the fitting coadjutor to your Majesty in promoting the happiness of your people;—to us has been conceded the privilege of a nearer and more intimate knowledge. It is in this and its kindred associations that he has come among us here in Windsor, giving life to the pictures of the interdependence of classes which in his spoken addresses he has so often drawn; stimulating the higher ranks by his presence, encouraging the working man by his words of kindly sympathy, and causing us for the moment to forget his noble qualities of mind in the gentler and more endearing ones of heart.

It is because he has thus won on our own best affections that we think we can form some truer conception of the severity of the blow which has fallen upon Your Majesty.

We have looked—and not in vain—for topics of consolation. With the one great consolation of Christian hope, indeed, opening so abundantly to your Majesty, with the assurance that his early removal from duties so well discharged in this world, is but an early admission to a higher service, and that such a separation can be but for

a time, all other consolations may seem poor and beside the mark; yet, if others can at all find a place, we see them already in that appreciation of his great services to England, which, with a unanimity as touching as it is unparalleled, the combined voice of England and the civilized world is now recording; we believe that they are destined to attain to yet larger proportions, when the several efforts which have received their impulse from him shall be found to be spreading through ever-widening circles, and shall come back to your Majesty in the ever-deepening acknowledgments of the grateful hearts of your subjects.

For ourselves we can but begin to give effect to our words to-day. Deprived of our great patron and head we enter upon a new era of our associated existence; but we think we can promise your Majesty that in this and its sister associations if the name is wanting the spirit of our late president will be found among us, and that the works which we have received from him will be cherished by us as a sacred trust, to be carried out now, to be handed down to our children, as at once the bequest and the memorials of the great and good life from which they sprung.

That He who "comforteth those that are cast down" may be with your Majesty in this and "in all time of your tribulation;" that He may give you strength and wisdom for the arduous duties which will now devolve upon you, and may at last re-unite husband and wife, parents and children, in His own everlasting kingdom, will be the prayer of your Majesty's humble and devoted servants.

HER MAJESTY'S COURT OF PROBATE.

THE PRINCIPAL REGISTRY.

Rules Orders, and Instructions as to Personal Applications for Grants of Probate or Letters of Administration.

THE following Rules, Orders, and Instructions shall come into operation on Wednesday, the ninth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two :—

1. Persons wishing to obtain Grants of Probate or Letters of Administration without the intervention of a Proctor, Solicitor, or Attorney, must apply in person at the Department for Personal Applications, and not by letter.
2. No such Application will be received through an Agent of any kind (whether paid or unpaid).
3. The Applications of parties who are attended by a person acting or appearing to act as their adviser in the matter will not be entertained.
4. All Fees are to be paid in advance in Probate Court Stamps.
5. Applications which have in the first instance been made through a Proctor, Solicitor, or Attorney at the Principal Registry, or at a District Registry, cannot be transferred to this Department.
6. Applications for Grants of Probate or Administration in cases which have already been before the Court (on motion or otherwise) will not be entertained at this Department, but must be made through a Proctor, Solicitor, or Attorney.
7. Whenever it becomes necessary, in the course of proceeding with an Application which has been entertained at this Department, to obtain the directions of the Court, the Application will not be proceeded with, but must be placed in the hands of a Proctor, Solicitor, or Attorney.
8. The papers necessary to lead the Grant applied for will be prepared in this Department. An Applicant is, however, at liberty to bring such papers, or any of them, filled up, *but not sworn to*, and the same, if correct, may be received (the usual Fee for perusal being charged). All further papers which may be required will be drawn in this Department. Testamentary Papers once deposited in this Department will not be given out unless under special circumstances, and by permission of one of the Registrars.
9. When it is necessary to administer an Oath or take an Affirmation, the party shall be sworn or affirmed before some proper Authority of the Principal Registry, or of a District Registry, unless otherwise permitted by one of the Registrars.
10. Every Applicant for a first Grant of Probate or Letters of Administration must produce a Certificate of the death or burial of the Deceased, or give a reason to the satisfaction of one of the Registrars for the non-production thereof.
11. Every Applicant must be prepared with a reference to some person of position or character, to establish his or her identity.
12. The Engrossments of Wills and Testamentary Papers will be made in the Registry.
13. Every Applicant for a Grant of Probate or Letters of Administration shall give under his or her hand a Schedule of the Property to be affected by the Grant in the form hereunto annexed, marked A. (The necessary forms will be provided in the Registry).
14. Legal Advice is not to be given to Applicants, either with respect to the Property to be included in the above-mentioned Schedule, or upon any other matter connected with the Application, and the Clerks in this Department are only to be held responsible for embodying in a proper form the instructions given to them, but they will, as far as practicable, assist Applicants by giving them information and directions as to the course which they must pursue.
15. A Receipt or Acknowledgment of each Application will be handed to the Applicant, and the production of such Receipt will be required of the person who attends to obtain the Grant when completed.
16. No Clerk or Officer of this Department is to become Surety to any Administration Bond.
17. All Administration Bonds in cases of Personal Applications are to be executed in this Department, or in a District Registry; if executed in this Department the Bond must be attested by the Chief Clerk or Senior Clerk in attendance:

PROCLAMATION*

WHEREAS his Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to delegate, under "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," to the Superintendent of the Province of Southland, the several powers vested in the Governor by the 2nd, 4th, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 10th sections of the said Act, subject to the regulations contained in the Order in Council of 1st October, 1861;

And whereas by a Proclamation given under my hand, dated 2nd October, 1861, it was amongst other things declared that the Inspector was thereby prohibited from granting a Certificate to

land any cattle imported from the colony of Victoria; and whereas it is expedient to make further provision in that behalf;

Now therefore I, the said Superintendent, in virtue of the powers vested in me, do hereby proclaim that the Inspector of Cattle under the said Act shall not be authorized to grant a Certificate to land, in the province of Southland, cattle coming from any of the Australian colonies, namely, Queensland, New South Wales (excepting as hereinafter mentioned), Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, and Tasmania, from the date hereof: Provided that cattle arriving in the province of Southland from the port of Newcastle, in the colony of New South Wales, in a vessel which shall have put to sea with the same on or before the 24th of December current (and which shall not thereafter have touched at the same, or at any other port, until her arrival at a port within the province of Southland), shall, under the provisions of sub-section d, section 4, of the said Act, be permitted to land upon the Quarantine Ground, as the same has been defined in the Proclamation of 2nd October, 1861, as aforesaid, there to remain until the said Inspector shall permit the same to be removed from thence; the said Quarantine Ground being bounded on the west by the *Bluff Harbour*, on the north by the eastern arm of the said harbour, and by a right line extending due east from its eastern extremity until it intersects the east boundary of the *Campbelltown Hundred*; on the east by the east boundary of the *Campbelltown Hundred*, from the said point of intersection to the sea coast; on the south by the ocean.
