THE following Address of Condolence on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, which has been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been laid before the Queen by Sir George Grey, and has been received very graciously by Her Majesty :

May it please your Majesty,

We, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, met in General Assembly, desire to take this our earliest opportunity of approaching your Majesty with the expression of the deep sorrow which we share, in common with all your Majesty's subjects, on account of the afflicting event by which it pleased Almighty God to remove from this life your Majesty's illustrious Consort, and to deprive this nation of one whose presence and counsels, while they contributed to your Majesty's comfort and happiness, served to advance the honour and prosperity of the British empire.

We shall hold him in remembrance as one who gave a bright example of devoting his high gifts and endowments to the public good, who encouraged and promoted the interests and pursuits of learning and science, who was the patron of every benevolent and patriotic undertaking, and who was the exemplary pattern and faithful guide of the children of your Royal House.

But while we mourn the nation's public loss, we particularly feel the sadness of your Majesty's personal bereavement. We sympathise with the sorrow which has filled your heart, and fervently trust that your Majesty will be sustained under your heavy trial by those consolations which Divine grace supplies to the widow and the fatherless ; and that the same gracious Being who has ordered your present tribulation, will make it effectual for the increase of your faith and hope in him who is the propitiation for sins, and the resurrection and the life to them that believe.

That Almighty God the Father of all mercies may long preserve your Majesty and the children with whom God has blessed you, that He may strengthen and support you in all your arduous duties, and may finally receive you to His Hea-

venly Kingdom, is the sincere and earnest prayer of,

THE following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by Robert Montgomery Lord Belhaven, K.T., Her Majesty's Commissioner, to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., G.C.B., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to the Queen, which Address Her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously :

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, met in this General Assembly, have received with the utmost gratitude and respect the gracious letter renewing to us the assurance of your Majesty's sincere regard for the Church of Scotland, of the interest which your Majesty feels in its welfare, and of your Majesty's determination to uphold it in the enjoyment of all its rights and privileges.

It affords us the highest satisfaction to learn that the many proofs of our loyalty and attachment do persuade your Majesty that we, in common with all our fellow subjects, most sincerely sympathise with your Majesty under the overwhelming affliction with which the Almighty has seen fit to visit your Majesty's Royal House, and the people of this realm.

We are deeply affected by your Majesty's sorrow, and, bowed down by a sense of the irrepara-

ble loss which your Majesty and the nation have sustained, we beg to assure your Majesty that we cease not to pray the Lord, the Great Disposer of events, to support your Majesty by His might, and to supply your Majesty with those consolations which He only can impart.

We earnestly unite in the prayer of your Majesty that our deliberations may be guided by wisdom from above, and that by the blessing of God they may tend to the advancement of true and undefiled religion throughout the land, and to the best interests of all the people.

The re-appointment of Lord Belhaven, Knight of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle, as your Majesty's representative to this General Assembly, gives us the highest satisfaction; and it will be our grateful duty to render to him that respect and co-operation which his past attentions and courtesies, as well as his many services to the Church of Scotland, so justly merit.

We receive with gratitude your Majesty's Royal Warrant for £2000 for the Reformation of the Highlands and Islands; and we will give all diligence in applying it to the purposes for which it has been bestowed, so that it may be the means of extending and maintaining the knowledge of the Gospel of Jesus Christ throughout that interesting part of your Majesty's dominions.

That the God of might and of consolation, who maketh everything work for the good of his people, may sustain and comfort your Majesty; that He may multiply to your Majesty and to your Royal House the earnestness of His love and favour, so "that your strength may be as your day;" that He may bless your Majesty with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ Jesus; and after experiencing the faithfulness of His promises here, that your Majesty may realize the joys of His presence, for evermore, is the earnest prayer of,
