Warfaw, June 20. The King we hear is ftill at Jawarow; and in the mean time we are told, that the Army is drawing together to make up the compleat number with which they are to ACE: But the Tartars taking their advantage of these delays, have broke into that part of the Uxrain which was quitted to the Mofcovites by the laft Treaty between the two Nations, and confirmed again the laft year; where they have made a horrible ravage, burning, pillaging, and carrying away whatever was for their conveniency: It is faid the Moscovites took the alarm, and got themfelves in a readinefs to fall upon them in their return home, where there was a tharp Fight between them, in which 20000 of the Tartars were killed, and great numbers of the Moscovites; and that there last following their blow, had made themselves Masters of that most important Post the Town of Precop, scituate in the very Ishmus, between the Gulf of Nigropoli and the Lake of Suka Morzi, which has thut up the Crim Tar-tars from all Pallages out of their Country, except it be over the Bosphorus Cimmerius, or the Streights of Kercy, which joins the White and Black Seas, and lets them into Circafia, whither they have already fent most of their Women and Children: But this may want a further Confirmation; as will the other reports concerning any confiderable Action between the Armies in those parts.

From the Imperial Camp near Walpo, July 18. We are approaching to near to the Enemy, that the must either retreat before us, or we shall toon come. to a decifion by Battles we are now within a League and half of their Army, which is not thought to be much above 24000 Men; but they have polled themselves to all the advantage imaginable, having the Drave on their Right, a thick Wood, with fome Works caft up by them on their Left, and the Town of Effeck behind them ; yet notwithstanding these accidental helps, the Duke of Lorrain ( who finds that Alacrity in his Army, that they are imp: tient till they are led on againit the Enemy, ) is refolved to loofe no time to force them from their Holds before the Grand Vifier comes up, who is faid to be expected: But if it be, as we hear, that they have already fent away their Baggage, it may not be improbable that they defign to follow after

it themfelves, and leave us the way open to Effeck. Buda, July 21. That flying ftream of Fire which we mentioned in our laft, took its course far beyond Pest, for though it seemed to us to vanish from thence, yet it was seen and observed by great numbers of Spectators passing through the Air over the Danibe towards Be'grade for 8 Leagues togethers The Count of Cobari is marched with his 2000 Hustars and Heydukes towards Agria to join the Marquis Doria. Count Esterbash, Palatin of Hungary, hath aliembled the Hungarian Militia, with which he designs to help to block up Alba Regalizy and destroy the Fruits growing about it. The Troops
