**T**HE Queen, Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, having been graciously pleased by letters patent under the Great Seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the Statutes and regulations observed in regard to installation, and to give and grant unto His Royal Highness Frederick William, Reigning Grand Duke of Mecklenburg Strelitz, Knight of the said Most Noble Order, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the said Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if he had been formally installed, any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.
