

AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 30th day of *August*, 1862,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Stourbridge, in the parish of Oldswinford, in the county of Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Stourbridge aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Worcester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Oldswinford, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John, Stourbridge.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Henry, Bishop of Worcester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint John, Stourbridge, being:—

"All that part of the township of Stourbridge, in the parish of Oldswinford, in the county of Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is situate to the east of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish from the new parish of Amblecote, in the county of Stafford, and in the said diocese of

Worcester, at a point in the centre of the bridge which carries the turnpike road from Wolverhampton to Stourbridge over the river Stour; and extending thence, first southward, along the said bridge, and along the middle of High-street; and then southeastward, along the middle of such street, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of Hagley-street; and extending thence, first southward, to and along the middle of the last named street, and then south eastward, along the middle of the same street, to the boundary which divides the said township of Stourbridge from the township of Oldswinford, in the parish of Oldswinford aforesaid."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof; and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Stourbridge, in the parish of Old Swinford, in the county of Worcester, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint John, Stourbridge," be accordingly made; and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.
