MEMORANDUM.

Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to approve of Rudolph William Basil, Viscount Feilding, resuming his Commission as Captain in the 4th Flintshire Rifle Volunteer Corps, at the same time retaining his Commission as Major in the 1st Administrative Battalion of Flintshire Rifle Volunteers, and to approve of his bearing the title of Captain Commanding of the 4th Flintshire Rifle Volunteer Corps.

By the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, cap. 159, intituled, "An Act for the better Regulation of the several Ports, Harbours, Roadsteads, Sounds, Channels, Bays, and Navigable Rivers in the United Kingdom, and of His Majesty's Docks, Dockyards, Arsenals, Wharfs, Moorings and Stores therein, and for repealing several Acts passed for that purpose." It is enacted (among other things) that no person or per-

sons shall take any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks of any port, harbour, or haven of this Kingdom, from which the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom for the time being, shall find it necessary for the protection of such port, harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by Order under their hands, or the hand of their Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, shall prohibit the taking or removing of such shingle or ballast upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence the sum of ten pounds.

And whereas we, as Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom, have found it necessary for the protection of the harbour of Paignton and the roadsteads adjoining in Torbay, in the county of Devon, to prohibit the taking or removing of any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks at Goodrington, Paignton, and Livermead sands, communicating with the said harbour between the southern extremity of Goodrington Sands and Corban Point on the north. And we do hereby Order that no person or persons shall take or remove any ballast or shingle from such shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks aforesaid.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 24)—MEDITERRANEAN—ADRIATIC.

Fixed Light at Rimino.

THE Minister of Public Works at Turin has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of September, 1862, a light would be exhibited from a light-house, recently erected in the harbour of Rimino, on the west coast of the Adriatic.

The light is a *fixed* white light, placed at an elevation of 70 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 9 to 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

The tower is in lat. $44^{\circ} 4' 39''$ N., long. $12^{\circ} 34' 14''$ East of Greenwich.

Lights at Fiume.

Information has also been received at the Admiralty, that two lights in the town clock tower, and the light at the mole head at Fiume, in the gulf of Quarnero, on the east coast of the Adriatic, are now exhibited all night.
