I HAVE the honour to forward the annexed list of casualties amongst the allied forces engaged this morning, at the assault and capture of Kahding; in transmitting which, it affords me much pleasure to be able to report for the information of the Brigadier-General Commanding, that nothing could be more satisfactory than the sanitary state of Her Majesty's Troops since leaving Shanghai, there being at the present time but two men non-effective from sickness, namely, soldiers of the 67th Regiment, suffering from ophthalmia.

RECAPTURE OF KADING.

 MY LORD, *24th October, 1862.*

YOU will be pleased to acquaint the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that the force noted underneath moved out of Shanghai on the 22nd instant, under the command of Brigadier-General Staveley, Captain Faucon, and Colonel Burgevine, of Ward's Chinese Corps; and that Kading was retaken this morning after a feeble resistance.
