Plymouth, Jan. 14.

THis day arrived here a Vessel of this Town from *Malaga*, and this afternoon that part of the Fleet which was on Sunday last put back into this Port by contrary Winds, went out again with a fair gale.

Hull, Jan. 14. The 10th instant the Employment of this place, laden with Lead and Cloth, put to Sea, intending for *Hamborough*. Sixteen Light-Colliers intended for the Northwards, have been by a late storm of wind forced into *Bridlington Bay*, and 'tis feared least some of them may have ran much hazard. The 7th instant a Fly-boat belonging to *Newcastle*, was cast away about *Hornsey*, of twelve men onely two escaping. Another large Fly-boat having lost most of her Anchors and Cables, was forced with some danger to put into *Bridlington*.

Weymouth, Jan. 15. This day came in a ship belonging to this Port, in six weeks from the *Barbados*, where she left all things in a quiet posture; they inform us alio of the safe arrival there of Sir *John Harman*, with the Squadron under his Command; and that upon the Proclamation of the peace in that place, above 300 prisoners were immediately restored to their liberty.

Lyme, Jan. 15. On Monday last arrived here the *Sarah* of this place, and the *Baptist* of *Bristol*, both of them laden with Linnen from *Morlaix*; the first was examined by two Officers outwards bound, but again dismiss without further disturbance. The great numbers of those privateers which are continually cruising upon the French Coasts, infinitely disturb their Trade, and fill them with Complaints. The French are still raising fresh forces in those parts, at their departure from *Morlaix*, 500 Foot were then in the Town, waiting Orders to march for *Flanders*. Several Merchant Ships are now in view, coming into this Harbour from several parts of *France*.

Madrid, Jan. 7. Since the return of the Marquis de *Caracene*, the Portuguez have made a great inroad into old *Castile*, appearing within a little distance from *Salamanca*.

We have now certain advice of the safe arrival of all our Gallions and Merchant ships, the greatest part of them in the Bay of *Cadiz*, the rest at *St Lucar*; their Cargo esteemed to amount to 11 millions of pieces of 8.

The 5th instant, his Excellency the Earl of *Sandwich* left this place, and is now onwards his way for *Portugal*: all persons impatiently expecting the success of his Negotiation in that Court.

Yesterday being the 6th instant, dyed the Marquis de *Caracene* of an Imposthume in his breast, which was thought to have been occasion'd by an old wound received in that part; by his death, the Presidency of the Council of *Planters* which was a little before conferred on him by the Queen, is again vacant.

Venice, Jan. 7. Our former News of the Retreat of the Grand Visier from the Siege of *Candia*, is sufficiently confirmed to us by the Chevalier *Grimani*, who arrived the fifth instant from the Fleet having left his charge of the Gallies to the care of Seignior *Molino*; assuring us farther that the Grand Visier is retired with the greatest part of his Army into the Vale of *Giofiro*, with the 6000 men he left behind him, still continue the defence of those Posts with which they left posses'd, but that little nor no Action had lately pass'd on either side; and that the besieged being now at leisure, were wholly intent upon the reparation of their Works, and clearing their Trenches.

The Senate being informed that the Duke of *Savoie* intended in little time to call home the Marquis *Ville* to his own Service, were considering of a fit person to be sent to *Candia* in his place. The Sieur de *St. Andre*, and General *Suze* having been propos'd for that employment, but as yet they have not fix'd on either of them. The Sieur *Desmarets* is arriv'd here in Post from *Vienno*, to offer his service to the Republique.

Our General *Consrini* being lately dead, the Senate have made choice of Seignior *Pietro Desfint* to succeed in that Charge; and being informed that Seignior *Priuli*, General of *Dalmatia* has been lately dangerously ill of an Apoplethical distemper, they have made choice of Cavalier *Cornaro*, to be employ'd thither as Proveditor Extraordinary; that the said *Priuli* may with greater conveniency, return home for the recovery of his health.

In few days we may expect the arrival of General *Barbaro*, and Seignior *Labia*, who are both of them upon their way homewards. We are inform'd that Seignior *Molino* being enter'd upon his Charge of the Gallies, was gone out with a strong Squadron, to take an account of the Turke Convoy from *Barbary*, which having met with extraordinary ill weather at sea, and suffer'd much damage, was put into the Port de *Novarrino* to repair.

Bruges, Jan. 22. The French still continue their severity to all places subject to their Power, summoning in the Bailiffs of the several Parishes, and imposing Oaths on them, not to execute any Warrants that shall be sent to them out of the Spanish Quarters, which they strictly press them with, by displacing all those who refuse to take it.

The Hollanders have lustily reinforced all their Frontier Garrisons bordering upon these Countreys, adding 2 or 3000 men to each Garrison. From *Germany* we are fed with hopes of a powerful assistance this next Spring, a strong Army being design'd to pass into *Alsacia*, and with them ('tis believ'd) a considerable body of the Duke of *Brandenburghs* Forces.

A Courier lately arriving at *Brussels* from *Madrid*, informs us of the imbarking of 7000 men bound for these parts, 3000 of which number were some time since put to sea, but 'tis feared may have met with many difficulties in their passage, by reason of the late tempestuous weather.

The so much discours'd of Treaty or Mediation between the Two Crowns is not yet much advanced; the Sieur *Franciotti*, the Popes Nuncio and Plenipotentiary continuing still alone at *Aix la Chapelle*. The 13th instant he testified the satisfaction he received for the late promotion of Cardinal *Rospigliosi*, with extraordinary signs of joy, adorning all his windows with Torches fixing over the Gate of his Lodgings t' e Popes Picture, and under it, that of the Cardinal his Nephew, exhibiting a fountain of Wine to the People, which they dr. nk by beat of Drums and sound of Trumpets, in the mean while ordering the Canon to be twice discharged round the City, and several pieces of siver to be thrown amongst the people; The Nobility all this time being entertain'd by him in the Palace, with a rich banquet and excellent Wines and Musick.

The Marquis de *Cassel Rod.igo* has lately given our many Commissions for recruiting the Old, and raising New Companies, designing to have in readi' else against the next Spring a Body of 24000 able Souldiers, besides the Assistance expected from *Spain* and *Germany*; he has also put out 10000 Garrison into several Castles about the Countrey, to hinder the Incurfions of the English; he has lately been at

Answer, where 'tis said he has agreed with the Merchants for the return of three Millions of Crowns from **Spain**, and displaced the **Bourgomaster**, whom he suspected to have been less active than he ought in encouraging the service. 'Tis also said that he has ordered the return of a considerable sum of moneys to the Duke of **Holstein Ploen**, for the raising of more forces about **Hambourgh**, that Duke having already compleated two Regiments, and finding much readyness in the people thereabouts to list themselves under his Command.

Bruges, Jan. 25. There are within few dayes arrived at **Tournay** 2000 fresh Horle, and as many more at several other of the French Garrisons, which makes us believe they will be early in the Field.

From **Luxembourg** we are told that the Marquis *de Crequy* having with 36 Troops of Horse, and four Regiments of Foot appeared before the place, and given them some warm Allarms, was since retired to **Echternach**, where he as yet keeps his post; and that the Spanish Cavalry issued out of **Luxembourg**, intending to have engaged him in his retreat, but finding the Enemy too strong, were forced to give over that design. The Marquis expects the addition of more force, and particularly two Regiments raised by the Bp. of **Strasbourg** about **Regenbourg**.

Hambourgh, Jan. 14. The Duke of **Holstein Ploen** is gone for **Magdenbourgh**, by his presence there to encourage his Levies, which are already advanced beyond expectation. General *Wrangl* has been lately very much indisposed, but is again on Recovery. General *Wurtz* is still here, and Count *Conningmarck* daily expected from **Swedenland**.

From **Denmark** we are told that the Seas being in those parts frozen up, their Trades are at present at a stand; and that the Court is in few dayes removing from **Copenhagen** to **Fredericksbourgh**.

Paris, Jan. 21. On Tuesday last the Chief President, followed by the Deputies of the Parliament, according to Order, went to receive his Majesties Commands, who told them that he desired they would send him their Registers from the year 1645. till 1652. The Chancellor afterwards more largely telling them, that his Majesty having fully forgotten all things which had been done amiss in those years, during the disturbances which were then in the Kingdom; desired that all Records which then had passed, might be effaced and taken away; which the Chief President answer'd, that he desired that this business might be first deliberated and debated of in their full Assembly; which was granted, and the next day an Arrest of Parliament passed for the Delivery of their Registers into his Majesties hand, to efface which part of them he pleased.

His Majesty has sent Orders also to all the other Parliaments throughout the Kingdom, to raze out of their Registers all Acts passed in those years against the Authority of the Regent.

To morrow his Majesty resolves to go from hence to **St. Germans**, and from thence on Thursday following to begin his intended journey. The Regiments quarter'd in **Auvergne**, and formerly design'd for **Catalonia**, are now order'd to march away for **Franche Comte**; so that 'tis believed the design of sending *Monsieur* into **Catalonia**, is for some time suspended.

All the Teams of Horses about **Paris** are pressed to attend the Artillery, which within three dayes is to march, four pieces of Canon being already gone. Yesterday in the Evening were sent away the Bridges of Boats, with a part of the Artillery, which are to be conveyed by the River of **Marne**. 'Tis also said, that the Duke of **Savoy's** Forces, which were employed about **Geneva**, are ordered to march to **Franche Comte**.

From **Copenhagen** we are told that the Brother to the Constable of **Denmark**, has obtained leave from the King his Master, to raise a Regiment of a thousand Foot upon his private account, to serve his most Christian Majesty in his Wars in the **Netherlands**.

The Cardinal *de Vendosme* is arrived here, and preparing to enter into Orders of the Priesthood.

Here are lately arrived two Envoyes Extraordinary from his Electoral Highness of **Brandenburgh**, one of them the Master of his Horse: the 19th. instant, they were with the Usual Ceremonies, conducted to their Audiences of both their Majesties, where from the Marquis their Master, they presented his Majesty with a rich Suit of Harners for his Coach-horses, and the Queen with a Cabinet of Amber of great value.

Paris, Jan. 25. Letters from **Thoulon** inform us of the arrival there of *Monsieur D'Almeras*, with his Squadron of twelve Men of War, having spent some time in cruising, expecting the return of the Spanish Gallions from the **Indies**.

The Count *de Chamilly* is by Order from the Prince of **Conde**, passed to **Soleure** in **Switzerland**, to endeavour to divert the *Swisses* from opposing his Majesties designs upon **Franche Comte**; assuring them that his Majesty has reposed so much confidence in them, that he intends to commit all the places he shall reduce in the Countrey, to be garrisoned by *Swisses*.

On Saturday last in the Afternoon, was celebrated the Baptisme of Little *Madamo*, the Name of *Maria Theresia* being given her, by *Madam Dowager of Orleans*, and *Monsieur the Duke d'Enguien*, in presence of both their Majesties and all the Princes and Princesses about the Court, with several Prelates, who assisted at the Ceremony in the Chappel of the **Louvre**.

On Sunday, His Majesty went from hence to **St. Germans** but has deferred his great journey till the 3 of **February**, by which time the Artillery may have made some considerable advance.

Yarmouth, Jan. 15. On Thursday last several Light Colliers sailed out of this Road for the Northwards, but by a sudden storm four of them were forced on shore about **Wells**, and of them three lost, but the other a Ketch belonging to this Town, 'tis hoped may be brought off with little damage. Yesterday sailed out of this port several Laden Colliers, with two Barks laden with Goods, bound for **London**.

Harwich, Jan. 16. A French Fly-boat of 16 Guns and 50. Men, laden with Masts, intended for **Brest**, having been forced to put in here by the late ill weather, is now confin'd by a Spanish privateer, which lies off from this place, expecting her coming out.

London, Jan. 18. The 13th instant, in pursuance of the late Act of Parliament for lessing Trade between **England** and **Scotland**, the Commissioners of both Kingdoms met in the inward Starre-Chamber in **Westminster**, where they opened their Commissions, and adjourned till the 17th instant; appointing their second meeting to be at the Chamber of the Right Honourable the Lord Keeper.

Whitehall, Jan. 19. This Morning arrived here Mr. *Temple*, dispatched Express from the **Hague**, by his Brother Sir *William Temple*, his Majesties Envoye Extraordinary to the States General of the **United Provinces** of the **Low Countries**; bringing with him the Treaties newly made by the said Envoye, between his Majesty and the said States General; which to the great joy of that people, was some dayes since concluded and signed at the **Hague**; whereof we may hereafter give some account of the particulars. On the same Yacht which brought over the said Mr. *Temple*, arrived likewise the Count *de Dona*, sent Ambassador to his Majesty from the King of **Sweden**.
