Interverp, where 'tis faid he has agreed with the Merchants for the return of three Millions of Growns from *Chin*, and difplaced the Bourgomafter, , whom he functed to have been lefs active than he ought in encouraging the fervice. 'T is also faid that he has ordered the return of a confiderable fum of moneys to the Duke of Holftein Ploen, for the railing of more forces about Hambourgb, that Duke having already compleated two Regiments, and finding much readinels in the people thereabouts to' lift themfelves under his Command.

Bruges, Jan. 25. There are within few dayes arrived at Tournay 2000 fresh Horie, and as many more at leveral other of the French Garrilons, which makes us believe they will be early in the Field.

From Luxembourgh we are told that the Marquils de Grequy having with 36 Treops of Holfe, and four Regiments of Foot appeared before the place, and given them fome warm Allarms, was fince retired to Echternach, where he as yet keeps his polt; and that the Spanish Cava'ry iffued out of Luxembourgh, intending to have engaged him in his retreat, but finding the Enemy too fireng, were forced to give over that defign. The Marquils expects the aldicion of more force, and particularly two Regiments railed by the Bp. of Stratsbourgh about Regensbourgh.

Hamborough, +an. 14. The Duke of Holflein Plann is gone for Magdenbourgh, by his prefence there to encourage his Levies, which are already advanced beyond expectation. General Wrangle has been lately very much indisposed, but is again on Recovery. General Wurtz is will here, and Count Conning Smark daily expected from Swedeland.

From Denmark we are told that the Seas being in those patts frozen up, their Trades are at pielent at a fland; and that the Court is in few dayes removing from Gopenhagen to Fredericksbourgh.

Paris, fan. 21. On Tuesday last the Chief President, followed by the Deputies of the Palliament according to Order, went to receive his Majesties Commands, who told them that he defired they would fend him their Registers from the year 1645. till 1652. The Chancellor assess more largely teling them, that his Majesty having fully forgotten all things which had been done amils in those years, during the disturbances which were then in the Kingdom; defired that all Records which then had passed , might be effaced and taken away; which the Chief President answer'd, that he defired that this business might be first deliberated, and the next day an Arrest of Parliament passed for the Delivery of their Registers into his Majesties hand, to efface which part of them he pleased.

His Majesty has sent Orders also to all the other Patliaments throughout the Kingdom, to raze out of their Registers all Acts passed in those years against the Authority of the Regent.

To morrow his Majelty refolves to go from hence to St. Germans, and from thence on Thurlday following to begin his intended journey. The Regiments quarter'd in Auwergne, and formerly defign'd for Catalonia, are now orde'd to march away for Franche Comte; Io that'tis believed the defign of fending Monfieur into Catalonia, is for fome time fulpended.

All the Teems of Horfes about *Paris* are prefied to attend the Artillery, which within three dayes is to march, four pieces of Canon being already gone. Yefterday in the Evening were fentaway the Bridges of Boats, with a part of the Artillery, which are to be convayed by the River of *Marne*. 'Tis allo faid, that the Duke of Savoy's Forces, which were employed about Geneva, are ordered to march to Franche Comte.

From Copenhagen we are told that the Brother to the Constable of Denmark, has obtained leave from the King his Master, to raile a Regiment of a thousand Foot upon his private account, to serve his most Christian Majesty in ⁷his Wa sin the Nemberlands.

The Cardinal de Vendosme is arrived lucre, and preparing to enter into Orders of the Priorthood. Here are lately strived two Envoyes Ex raotdinary from his Electoral Highnels of Brandenbourgh, one of them the Mafter of his Horfe: the 19th. inflant, tiey we e with the Usual Chremonics, conducted to their Audiences of both their Majeflids swhere from the Marquifs their Mafter, they preferred his Maje (iy with a rich Suit of Harnels for his Coach-horfes, and the Queen with a Cabinet of Amber of great value.

Paris, Jan. 25. Letters from Thoulon inform us of the arrival there of Monseur D' Almeras, with his Squadion of twelve Men of War, having spent some time in crusing, expecting the return of the Spanith Galliens from the Indies.

The Count de Chamil y is by Order from the Prince of Conde, passed to Soleure in Switzerland, to endeavour to divert the Swiffes from opposing his Majesties defigns upon Franche Comte; assuring them that his Majesty has reposed to much confidence in them, that he intends to commit all the places he shall reduce in the Country, to be garrisoned by Swiffer.

On Saturday last in the Afternoon, was celebrated the Baptisme of Little Madamo, the Name of Maria I herefia being given her, by Madam Dowager of Or. cans, and Monfieur the Duke d' Enguien, in presence of both their Majesties and all the Princes and Princelles about the Courts, with several Presates, who affisted at the Ceremony in the Chappel of the Louare.

On Sunday, His Majefly went from hence to St. Germains but has deferred his great journey till the 3 of February, by which time the Artillery may have made fome confiderable advance.

Tarmo th, Jan. 15. On Thu Iday last feveral Lighe Colliers failed out of this Road for the Northwards, but by a fudden florm four of them were forced on fliore about Wells, and of them three lost, but the other a Ketch belonging to this Town, 'tis hoped may be brought off with little damage. Yelterday failed out of this port feveral La-'den Colliers, with two Barks laden with Goods, bound for London.

Harwich, fan. 16. A French Fly-boat of 16. Guns and 50. Men, laden with Malts, intended for Brefs, having been forced to put in here by the late ill weather, is now confin'd by a Spanish privateer, which lies off from this place, expecting her coming out,

London, Fan. 18. The 13th inftant, in purluance of the late Act of Parliament for lealing Trade between England and Scot'and, the Commissioners of both Kingdoms mer in the inward Starre-Chamber in Weltminster, where they opened their Commissions, and adjourned till the 17th inflant; appointing their fecond meeting to be at the Chamber of the Right Honourable the Lord Keeper.

Whitehall, Jan. 19. This Morning arrived here Mr, Temple, dilpatched Express f om the Hague, by his Brother Sir William Temple, his Majefties Envoye Extraordinary to the States General of the United Provinces of the Low Countries; bringing with him the Treaties newly made by the faid Envoye, between his Majefty and the faid States General; which to the great joy of that people, was fome dayes fince concluded and ligned at the Hague; whereof we may hereafter give fome account of the particulars. On the fame Yacht which brought over the faid Mr. Temple, arrived likewife the Count de Dons, fent Ambassador to his Majefty from the King of Sweden.
