**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the eighth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church situate at Great Horton, in the township of Horton, in the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church situate at Great Horton aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those portions of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said Church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Great Horton.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always, that so long as the Reverend John Burnet, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent, a moiety of the fees which shall be payable in respect of the

performance of the said offices in the said church, situate at Great Horton aforesaid, shall be paid by the said minister thereof to the said John Burnet.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Great Horton, being:—

"All these several portions of the hamlets of Great and Little Horton, in the township of Horton, in the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which are situate to the west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the new parish of Saint Paul, Buttershaw, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of Little Horton-lane; and extending thence, first north-westward, along the middle of such lane, and then, north-eastward, along the middle of the same lane as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of Southfield-lane; and extending thence, north-westward, to and along the middle of the last-named lane as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Quaker-lane; and extending thence, north-eastward, to and along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of two hundred and forty-eight yards, or thereabouts, to the boundary dividing the said hamlet of Great Horton from the hamlet of Little Horton before mentioned; and extending thence, first north-westward, and then north-eastward, along the last-described boundary as far as a point in the middle of the footpath leading from Little Horton-green to the Great Horton-road; and extending thence, north-westward, along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of one hundred and ninety-five yards, or thereabouts, to its intersection by another footpath leading from Great Horton to Dirk-hills-lane; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the last-described footpath to a point in the middle of Dirk-hills-lane aforesaid; and extending thence, north-westward, along the middle of the last-named lane to a point in the middle of the Great Horton-road aforesaid, opposite to the middle of the north-western end of the same lane; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the Great Horton-road aforesaid as far as the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew, Bradford, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of such road opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of the road called Summerseat-back-road. And all which said several portions of the hamlets of Great and Little Horton aforesaid, are also situate to the south and west of another imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew, Bradford, as aforesaid, at the before-mentioned point in the middle of the Great Horton-road opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of the road called Summerseat-back-road; and extending thence in a direction, either north-westward or south-westward, along such last-described boundary to its junction in the centre of Thiescore-bridge, with the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford,
