Arm, landed undifluibled, under the Command of Crunt Cd-singlimark, to the number of 8000 Foot and 1500 Horfe, and marched in good order towards Patras. On the 24th we had advice, that the Seralquier with 10000 Foot and 4000 Horle was advancing against us; which did not hinder but that the General ordered 1500 commanded Men to attack fome Out-Posts of the Enemy that lay towards the Sea, our Galleafies playing upon them at the fame time with their great Guns, by which means we became Malters of fome of them, planting there the Standard of St. Mark : A:d the Seof them, planting there the Standard of st. Mark i Ard the Se-rafquier moving on to fall upon us in the Rear, the Fight be-gan with a great deal of Noile on their fide, and Bravery enough in the firlt Onfer; but after having twice returned to the Charge, and finding that their firlt imprefilions met with a firm refiliance, they gave ground, till at laft they were forced to retire, leaving behind them tooo killed up-on the place, and more wounded; with 8 pieces of Cannon, part of their Baggage, the Standard of Mahomet, and the Morfe-Tail, their Enfigns of Command: And they had been ftripped of all, but that they made their Bicapes through a Wood in which it was difficult to follow them. We loft in this Action but 100 Men, with a Colonel killed, and a Major wounded. The Garifon of Patras having an account of this Victory, in a fright, forflook the place; which the Count Coningfinark, difpatched away Soldiers to take poffetfion of. And our General from this unexpected fuccefs; finding he had an opportunity to do his bulinefs all at once, failed on with his Fleet rowards Lepanto; and as he came within Mulquet floot of it, he was ferprifed ro fee the Townas it were emptying it felf, and every Ba-mous Town of Lepanto, which whill it was in the Hands of the Chritians, had refifted a Siege of 4 Months againft the Power of Mahomet the Great, the fame that took Cop-flantinople: And when it was afterwards taken in the year 1499, it was not but by the Empetor Bajazet himfelf, be-fleging it with a Victorious Army, and attacking it at the fame time by Sea with a mighty Fleet; was now recover-ed with no other trouble but that of marching into it : We found there 160 pieces of Bafa Cannon. Nor were thefe the only fuccefies of thefe tew days; but Count Coning-finark having Intelligerce, that Multapha Buffa was en-camped near Recmelia with 6000 Men, he marched againft him, whole Men being feired with the fame panick fear, all forfook him, leaving fustheir Tents and 6 pinceed of Canrafquier moving on to fall upon us in the Rear, the Fight behim, whole Men being feired with the fame pannick fear, all forfook him, leaving us their Tents and  $\delta$  pieces of Can-non: The Baffa himfelf who was thus abandoned, to flew

non: The Baffa himfelf who was thus abaadoned, to flew he was not afteid to dye, though his Men were to fight, is faid to have blown himfelf up, Hague, Augult 24. Yetterday arrived here a Meffenger from Prince Calimir of Naffau, Hereditary Stadtholder of Frizefland and Groningen; with Letters to the States-Ge-neral and the Council of State, acquainting them, That the Princefs was brought to Bed the sam Infant of a Son. Paris Augult 30. The King being diffatisfied with some behaviour of the Moscovite Amballadors, had ordered his Prefents to be carried them by the Master of the Ceremonies, who was at the fame time to fignife his Majeffier Pleasure, that they should retire without expecting an Aupleating, that they house retire without expecting an Au-dience of Leave, which they found themfelves under a ne-cellity to comply with; and accordingly they parted from honce. making a flop again at SL Denis, in order to re-new their collicitations, that his Majeffy would vouchfafe to admir them to his Prefence before they leave his King-dom, several Couriers arrived here on Sunday and Mondom. Several Couriers arrived here on Sunday and Mon-day laft, with the News of the great Victories obtained by the Imperialifts and the Venetians: That the first had routed the Turkifth Army, killing them between 8 and 10000 Men; that as many of them are drowned, having taken their Cannon, feveral Prifoners, all their Baggage, and their Treasure; with the lofs only of 500 Men: That the Elector of Bavaria in this Action was lightly hurt in the Hand; the Prince of Commercy dangeroully wounded in the Thigh; the Count de Lignerille killed; and the Count de Zenzendorf had his Leg thot off: That the Grand Vi-fier was retired to his old Poft near Effeck. That the Ve-netians had taken Lepanto, Patzas, and the two Darda-nelles. nelles.

Gluncefter, August 22. His Majefty left Bath this morning, being waited on to the Gates of the Ci-ty by the Mayor and Aldermen, and afterwards by the High Sheriff and Gentlemen of the County to their utmost Borders. At Land/down His Majefty was met by his Grace the Duke of Beaufort, attended by feveral Gentlemen; and at the Entrance into this County, by the High Sheriff and the reft of the Gentry. His Majefty did the Duke the Honour to Dine with him at Badminton, where was provided an Extraordinary Noble Entertainment. About five this Afternoon His Majelly arrived here, having been met at two miles distance by the Lord Bithop f the Diocefs, and the body of the Clergy, in

a most Dutiful manner. His Majesty was received at the entrance into this City at the South Gate by the Mayor and Magistracy in their Robes on Horseback, the Mayor alighting, and delivering up to His Majefty the Sword and Cap of Maintenance, and from thence riding with his Brethren before His Majefly to the Colledge, all forts of Inftruments playing, the Conduits running with Wine, the Bells ringing, the Streets and Windows throng'd with multitudes of People, loud in their Acclamations, and praying for all Profperity to the King, with all other Marks of rais'd and ardent Affections. The Dean and Prebends waited for His Majefties coming at St. Edurard's Gate leading into the Colledge, where the Dean (as the Lord Bilhop had done before) welcom'd His Majefty with an Elegant Speech; to both which His Majefty returned very Gracious Anfwers: And from thence His Majefty went to the Lodgings prepar'd for him at the Deans Houfe, where he was again attended by the Lord Bifhop and Clergy, and the Mayor and Aldermen, in diftinct Bodies, to exprefs their great Joy for the Honor and Happinefs of feeing His Majefty in this County and City, with all poffible Affurances of a never-failing Duty and Loyalty.

London, August 24. His Majefty having been pleased to appoint the Lord Spencer to go Envoy Extraordinary to make the Compliments of Condoleance, in Their Majesties Names, with his Highness the Duke of Modena, upon the Death of the late Duchefs of Modena: His Lordfhip parted from hence this day in order to his faid Journey.
