The wreck lies in about $23\frac{1}{3}$ fathoms water, with Cape Garajoa bearing S.E. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E.; Ilheo do Gorgulho, W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.; Pico da Cruz, N.W. $\frac{5}{3}$ W.; the Cathedral, N.E.; and the right extreme of the Loo rock, N. $\frac{5}{8}$ E., and in line with the house west of the flagstaff.

Mariners are cautioned not to anchor near the wreck, as H.M.S. *Egmont* by doing so lost an anchor and a portion of cable.
