WE, the President and Members of the Royal Academy of Arts, humbly beg leave to approach Your Majesty, with the dutiful assurance of our devoted loyalty, gratitude, and attachment, and to offer to Your Majesty our most respectful and heartfelt congratulations on the happy occasion of the Marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales with Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandra of Denmark.
