E thy Peaceable and Dutiful Subjects the People called Quakers of the City of Dublin, together with the reft of our Society in this thy Kingdom of Ireland, do find our feloes deeply engaged to make our Acknowledgment, and return the King our humble and hearty Ihanks, for his most Christian and Gracious Declaration, which up ves a free Teleration to all his Subjects for the exercise of their Consciences, in matters relating to the Worship : of God, which thing we have all along defired, (it being agreeing to the Principles of true Chieftianity, and concurring with the Royal Law of Christ Jefns who Commanded, faying, All things whatloever ye would that men thould do to you, do ye even foto them, for this is the Law and the Prophets, Mar 7. 12.)
